JOHNSON APPROVES OIL INDUSTRY CODE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9. (AP)—Temporary effectiveness for a scale of wages and hours for the oil industry pending settlement of the controversial code now under consideration was approved today by Hugh S. Johnson, NRA chief.

Under the temporary agreement, which has been approved by the industry, producers, refiners and dealers will be permitted to sign a modified presidential agreement and receive the blue eagle.

The temporary code provides a 40 hour maximum week for marketing operations and a 36 hour week for all other branches of the industry.

"For employees in filling stations and garages selling gasoline and oil direct to the motorist, the agreement proposed a 40-hour week with a pay scale graduated from \$12 per week to \$15, according to the population of the city."

PENDLETON, Ore., Aug. 9. (AP)—A maximum temperature of 102 degrees was reached here Tuesday, after a period of comparatively cool weather. The higher temperature has enabled ranchers to resume harvesting after a three-day halt caused by rain.

POLICE PREPARE FOR CONVENTION

State Police Officers Will Make Their Headquarters at City Police Bureau During the Days of the American Legion Convention

This will be done to facilitate service and to coordinate all police duties. All calls from any part of the county relative to accidents or other emergencies will be received at the city bureau.

State police forces will be augmented in order to direct traffic during the convention and the city police force has announced several changes to increase efficiency during the next three days.

A used truck recently purchased by the department has been painted and renovated by men on the force, and will be used as a special patrol car. A "wagon man" will be kept on duty consequently to answer calls to accidents or other emergency calls with the patrol car. This will enable the greater part of the police force to patrol downtown districts on foot, instead of with the patrol cars.

The regular police patrol cars will be on duty at night as usual. Chief Shaw stated, and two additional passenger automobiles will be kept at headquarters for use in case of added emergencies.

Although parking of automobiles on Main street will be prohibited during convention, all vacant lots on Pine street and Klamath avenue have been obtained by the police department, and will be available for free parking day or night.
