Adeline Houck received a decree of divorce from Earl Houck on a charge of cruel and inhuman treatment. A division of property was granted in the decree.

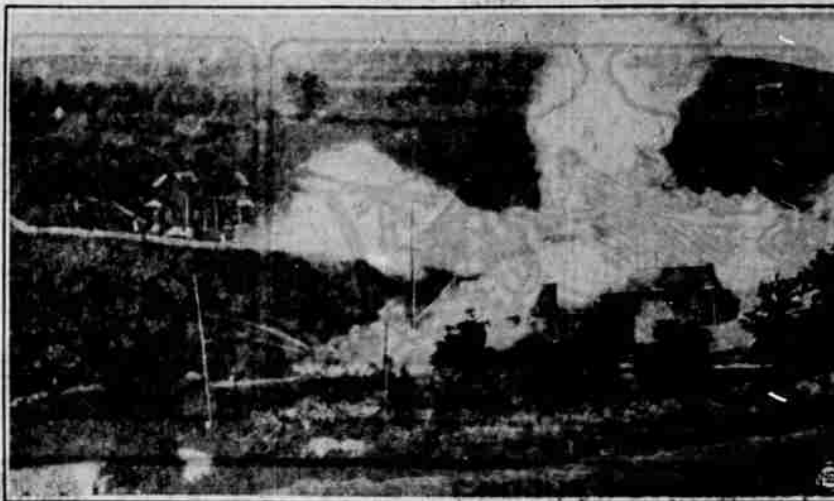

OFFICIALS ANSWER NEW NRA PROBLEMS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9, (AP)—What does the N. R. A. mean? The following questions were developed and answered today by officials of the national recovery administration:

What is the status of service employees such as barbers, beauty shop operators and others who have been working on a straight commission basis for several years? Can they work as long as they want or are they sub-

jected to a 40-hour week and a guarantee of a minimum wage of \$14 weekly by the owner? This question has not been decided and final decision is expected soon from the policy board.

Is there a distinction between an employee working with his hands and one who uses his head? Is the first group classed as mechanical labor and the latter as a white collar employee? No.

Would a worker or common laborer in a department store have the same rating as similar employee in a mechanical establishment? Yes. Ratings are determined by the type of work and not locality.
