The construction end of Civilian Conservation Corps Camp 1642, Lake o' the Woods, supervised by Mr. Hoover, is moving at a rapid pace. Last week the crew finished the road from Rainbow creek to Desolation swamp. Another crew started two new roads to Four-Mile lake. The road from the Police Guard station is practically complete.

There have been a number of advances in pay: five per cent receiving \$45 monthly and 10 per cent receiving \$36.

Commanding Officer F. G. Doshier has allowed as many men as possible to visit Crater Lake for the past three Sundays. These trips were made in the camp trucks.

Library Now Open
The recreation hall and library is now open, and has about 300 books, 200 of which were borrowed by Captain Doshier from the State Library at Salem. The camp has a permanent library of about 60 books and 40 books were loaned from the traveling library, which is managed so each company receives a different set of books every 15 days. A new radio has also been installed, which provides much entertainment.

Deer Is Mascot
"Orphan Ann," a baby deer which is the camp mascot, whose mother was killed by a passing motorist near Fish lake, can be seen playing about camp almost any time. In and out of tents she goes, looking for sail.

The camp has six forest trucks and two C. C. C. trucks. The forest trucks are used mostly for the transportation of men to the various jobs and hauling material for the work. The C. C. C. trucks are used to haul provisions to camp from Medford and Klamath Falls.

After the supper hour most of the boys leave for Lake o' the Woods resort for a swim or dance. Mr. and Mrs. Smith of Medford, managers of the resort, have shown the boys every courtesy, and have given them free access to the lodge except on Saturday nights, when a weekly dance is held.

Some of the older men can be found around the fiddler's tent where the mountain music is made. The camp has a five-piece orchestra, which has broadcast over the Medford and Klamath Falls stations.

2 ARRESTS MADE IN BOND SCANDAL

TOPEKA, Kan., Aug. 10, (AP)—Two arrests have been made in the Kansas municipal bond scandal, at least \$658,000 in spurious bonds have been discovered and three state banks have been closed.

Leland Caldwell, an employee in the office of Ronald Finney, broker, was taken into custody last night on charges of having uttered \$3,000 in forged bonds to the National Bank of Topeka. Finney, previously arraigned on a similar charge, is alleged specifically to have uttered \$20,000 in spurious securities to the same bank.

Meanwhile investigations into the many angles of the case continued. D. A. N. Chase, budget director, and A. R. Jones, state auditor and their assistants were engaged in checking bonds and records in the office of the state treasurer, Tom Boyd. State officials have revealed eight issues of municipal bonds totalling \$329,000 are known to have been forged in duplicate, one set going to the state treasury as security for state deposits and the other set being in the hands of Chicago bankers.

Tax Exemption Is Asked In Amendment

SALEM, Aug. 10, (AP)—An initiative petition seeking an amendment to the state constitution to allow an exemption of \$1,200 on taxable property, was filed with the secretary of state today. Signatures of 26,666 registered voters must be secured before July 5, 1934.

The petition was filed by the home owners tax exemption league. The constitution of the state now does not allow any exemption on homes and property other than personal property.

MEIER URGES HIGH CANNERY STANDARD

PORTLAND, Aug. 10, (AP)—Governor Meier has recommended to President Roosevelt that no cannery be permitted to display the Blue Eagle emblem of the NRA unless he has paid the grower a price at least equal to the cost of production, even though he may comply with the cannery industry labor code.

The governor telegraphed President Roosevelt that "Oregon has taken great pleasure in vigorously backing your full recovery program. It has occurred to me that compliance with the letter of your recovery employment agreement does not always mean that the action is in accord with the broad spirit."

"A food manufacturer may, for example, meet the blanket code . . . while paying a price to the grower which will neither enable him to continue to pay his farm labor nor repay his output of pocket expense borrowed from the agricultural credit administration. Agriculture is the principal industry of Oregon."

The occasion did not pass unnoticed, however. Scores of letters and telegrams reached the former executive from all parts of the country. Mr. Hoover and his wife both returned to their University Campus home last night to be together. The former president had been on a fishing trip in Oregon. Mrs. Hoover had been visiting a friend in another part of California.

INFORMATION ABOUT WHEAT HANDED OUT

EDITORS NOTE: This is the second of three articles explaining in question and answer form details of the voluntary domestic allotment plan now being put into effect for wheat.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10, (AP)—Can a producer who signs an allotment contract stop raising wheat?

No; he must seed the acreage based on his average yield in recent years needed to produce his farm's allotment.

What would happen to a producer who signed and who, because of unfavorable weather, could not seed winter wheat?

In some areas he could seed spring wheat. If he does not seed such acreage as is necessary to produce his farm allotment in terms of average yield, he must return payments made to him.

Must a producer withhold from sale a part of all of his wheat crop until given permission to sell?

No. If the producer's farm is mortgaged, must the mortgagee sign the contract?

Not unless he receives a part of the crop as payment on the mortgage.

If a farm is sold, is the purchaser bound after a contract has been signed?

Yes.

What is the farm allotment? That number of bushels of wheat upon which adjustment payments may be made to the producer, supplementing what the producer obtains from it in the market. It is intended to represent the farmer's share in the wheat required for domestic human consumption.

Will the farm allotment be changed each year?

No; the 1933 allotment will remain unchanged during the 1934-35 crop years, except for correction of errors.

C. C. C. Tool Shed Torn By Explosion

PENDLETON, Ore., Aug. 10, (AP)—An explosion of 1,600 dynamite caps in a garage at the Froghaven civilian conservation corps camp last night destroyed the garage and tool shed. No one was injured, and loss was not more than \$100. Officials today said they were unable to account for the explosion. The powder house is considerably removed from the main camp, but percussion caps had been stored in the nearby garage. The forest workers were called from mess to battle the resulting fire.

DEAN H. S. ROGERS NAMED TECH HEAD

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Aug. 10, (AP)—Harry Stanley Rogers, dean of engineering at Oregon State College, was announced today as the new president of Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute. He succeeds Dr. Parke R. Kolbe, who resigned a few years ago to head Drexel Institute.

In a letter accepting the appointment, Rogers said: "It will be stimulating to work in a college so close to the industrial and professional heart of the nation, where constructive service in the preparation of young men for life careers can be so immediately observed."

CORVALLIS, Ore., Aug. 10, (AP)—Dean Harry S. Rogers, who has accepted the presidency of Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute, effective October 1, has been head of the school of engineering at Oregon State College since 1927. He came here in 1921 from University of Washington as professor of hydraulic engineering and was made dean of the school and director of the engineering experiment station in 1927.

SEA SCOUTS BACK FROM PORTLAND

Through the courtesy of Cooper, the local Sea Scouts were given quarters upon the ship Eagle, from which base they made all their tours of inspection.

In addition to their visits to ships anchored in the Portland harbor, the boys were given several hours shore leave, during which they enjoyed trips over the city.
