This "Boy" Takes 'Em All In, And Can He Tell Fish Stories!

"I make all the legion conventions I can," was the remark of Charles A. Bills, 95-year-old Civil war veteran, as he sat in the Elks Temple and happily "chewed the fat" Thursday morning with veterans attending the convention.

Bills, spry, jovial and taking the world lightly with a smile, declares his home is where his hat's off except during the winter time, which he spends at the soldiers' home at Roseburg.

"I had no home when I was 12 years old and I've been going ever since. I've been foot-loose and I've used the privilege," were his remarks as he told of various travels and fishing trips over the United States.

Bills is the oldest war veteran at the state convention and doesn't want to miss a single happening during the three days.

"I gave up drinking liquor over 20 years ago but this 3.2 beer tastes pretty good," he remarked.

Curious over his slant on President Roosevelt's new deal, Bills was asked what he thought of the administration. His patriotic spirit sparkled when he remarked, "My first presidential vote was cast for Abraham Lincoln and my last to date for Franklin Roosevelt."

When asked on which side he fought in the Civil war, Bills said, "The right side of course! I marched with the Michigan Infantry. And I marched with General Custer and fought with him in the Massacre on Little Rock. We took over 2,000 Indians down through Texas after they had captured two white women. We got 24 Indian chiefs and returned them to headquarters. Of course we didn't get back with all of them as three were accidentally shot."

Bills has a daughter, Mrs. H. D. Bondy, living in Klamath Falls, and said he fished in Klamath county before the place was known.

"I've caught more fish than any man in the state," he proudly declared. "Why in 1883 I

UTILITY FIRMS PLACED UNDER BANNER OF NRA

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10, (AP)—The recovery administration today revealed a ruling whereby all privately owned utilities—whether controlled by the state in which they are located or not—must come under its wage and work time supervision.

In elaboration, Colonel Wilson explained to reporters that a misunderstanding was the result of a misinterpretation in his office of the facts outlined in the NRA in a telegram from the New Hampshire public service commission.

Spirit of Code Observed The letter addressed by his office to the New Hampshire public service commission stated in view of the apparent facts outlined in the commission's letter such utilities would not come under the president's blanket agreement.

It added, however, it was the hope of the NRA officials that such utilities as could be brought under the president's agreement would be included, in keeping with spirit of the NRA.

The text of his ruling today is: "All privately owned utilities whether controlled by the state or not come under the president's reemployment agreement."

This matter emerged as the dominant development of a day filled with continued hearings on codes proposed for the coal and other industries, while Administrator Hugh S. Johnson awaited replies from retailers and grocers to his ultimatum of yesterday.

The New Hampshire public service commission had released a letter from the NRA quoting Wilson's office as having said that public utilities of that state would not be required to come under the president's agreement.
