

COUNTY AGENT HASTENS WORK OF FARM PLAN

With preliminary organization of the wheat adjustment plan rapidly taking shape in this county, wheat growers are in a position to hasten its completion. It is expected that the first cash bonus payments will be made by the county agent in the near future.

A preliminary committee working with the county agent has now divided the county into five communities as required under the organization setup. These communities are Bonanza, including Poe and Langel Valley; Merrill, Malin, Hinesley, Klamath Falls.

Help For Individuals
The next step will be to organize these communities and receive through them the applications of growers for their individual allotments. This will require submission and inspection of past production data. In this way the individual farmer can help himself and his neighbors by having the information in good shape in advance.

Explains County Agent Henderson, by use of threshing machine records, sales records, warehouse receipts or other sources of information, such as testimonials by neighbors, each grower is to figure out not only his acreage but his production for the past three years at least, and preferably for five years. That means first of all for the crop years 1929, 1930, 1931 and 1932, and if possible for the years 1929 and 1928 as well.

While the national plan calls for basing individual allotments on a percentage of the past three years' crops, requests were made from the west that four years be used as the base in summer fallow territory. Indications are that in some instances, four or even five years may be used, hence the advisability of every farmer being prepared with all such production information before the community groups get together.

Once the individual grower's past average acreage and average production are determined and accepted, the assignment of an allotment will be a comparatively simple matter. It is fixed at \$4 per cent of the average annual production—unless crop failure or other special circumstances during the base period makes some adjustment necessary.

Plan Important Here
Similarly his total acreage to be allowed will be easy to arrive at by applying the percentage reduction, to be announced by Secretary Wallace, to his average acreage. Any variation in the acreage reduction up to the maximum of 20 per cent will have nothing to do with the individual allotment of bushels on which adjustment payments will be made.

Klamath county, with a total average annual production of 250,012 bushels, according to government figures, has a real "stake" in the success of the wheat plan, first results of which will be cash payments beginning this fall. The county has been given an allotment of 135,002 bushels which means that this amount times 20 cents or \$27,000.40 is the amount of cash available this fall if all wheat growers in the county joined the plan. In addition, from \$10,890.16 to \$13,500.20 will be forthcoming next spring, depending on the exact payment, announced as from 8 to 10 cents a bushel. The adjustment payments in the 1934 and 1935 marketing years may be more or less, depending upon circumstances and the decision of the Secretary of Agriculture.

Some have asked whether the government will make the total benefit payments to this county regardless of how many farmers join the plan. This is not the case, says County Agent Henderson, as the ruling is plain that no individual gets more than his fixed proportionate share. Cash for any "unused" allotments here will not come to the county at all, but presumably will stay in the United States treasury.

ODELL GRADING SCHEDULED ON FEDERAL LIST

PORTLAND, Aug. 10. (AP)—Bids will be called this month on about \$2,700,000 of the federal highway projects in Oregon, Washington and Montana by the federal bureau of public roads in connection with the national recovery program. Employment will be given to more than 2,000 on direct construction, in addition to those employed in supplying materials and equipment.

GOLD SMUGGLED TO FOREIGN MARKETS

SEATTLE, Aug. 10. (AP)—Enroute to Alaska, former Governor William Sulzer of New York, declared today that despite the gold embargo millions of dollars worth of gold produced there is being clandestinely shipped out of the territory to Canadian and other foreign markets where producers are offered a premium over prices of \$20.67 an ounce in this country. Sulzer has gold mining interests in the north.
