

SIX MEN OF CAMP ENTERED IN TOURNEY

Fire Organization.
The camp now has an excellent fire organization. Each tent has its station to go to as soon as fire call is sounded. The bulletin board has the following rules for the camp.

1. Spark arresters must be put in all stoves.
2. Smoking will be permitted in camp only where pine needles have been removed.
3. All lighted material must be extinguished before throwing on the ground.
4. Fire drills may be expected day or night.
