Insults Attacked.
The distressed veterans on the speakers' platform received a warm welcome from the 192 official delegates at the business session. Senator Steiwer was given rousing cheers for his stand against the economy act in the United States senate.

"The war veteran is entitled to something besides insult from the United States congress," Steiwer declared. "I urge you veterans to consider the advisability of acquiring a little more starch in your backbones. Disabled veterans should be ashamed to make any attempt at apologizing for demands which are nothing."

In his request that the legion join with all other veteran organizations for a united front against propaganda of the economy league, Steiwer declared "With full respects to President Roosevelt and his recovery program, the American people don't have to stand for any program when they do not know its meaning."

Congressman Mott said only one out of four members in the house of representatives knew the full meaning and conditions of the act when it was presented. Many prominent men were present.

"First we launched a plan of emergency unemployment work through the highway commission. When, because of depleted funds and heavy obligations, the highway commission was not able to go on with this work we set up a volunteer unemployment relief committee in each county."

Facing Serious Problem
"These committees were made official and given statutory authority at the last session of the legislature, with a supervisory state committee."
"Nearly \$4,000,000 of federal funds have been brought into Oregon and expended for direct relief and work relief under the supervision of these committees. At one time 14,000 Oregon families were receiving relief."
"Due to seasonal employment and the general pickup in business and industry this number has been greatly reduced at the present time."

"The federal relief administration is making it very clear to us that from now on federal funds will be available only where the state and local agencies make similar contributions. That is a problem we must face in Oregon before next winter sets in."

Program Assembled
"For the last four months we have been hard at work shaping up a program which will secure for Oregon her just share of federal funds made available to the states for public works."

"Through the reconstruction advisory board, of which the governor is chairman, we have assembled a comprehensive program providing for an equitable division of funds throughout the various counties of the state, and also providing for an equitable division of employment between various types of work."

"In accordance with the president's instructions this program will be turned over to the regional public works administrator and his advisory committee. This careful and comprehensive preliminary work puts Oregon in the front ranks with her application, and we hope it will be only a short time until we have a public works program under way in every part of the state."

MIDWEST CROP LOSSES BOOST SPUD MARKET

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cal growers should receive approximately \$2.35 per 100 pounds for their spuds this season.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 11. (AP)—A wheat crop of 275,000,000 bushels in western Canada, as indicated in reports received by Searle Grain Company, Ltd., whose preliminary estimates of yield are based on official acreage figures released at Ottawa Thursday.

Weighted average conditions of prairie wheat crop is 52 per cent of normal, the report says. Alberta was rated at 60 per cent; Saskatchewan at only 46 per cent and Manitoba at 61 per cent. Condition of coarse grains was set at 63 per cent in Alberta, 46 per cent in Saskatchewan and 57 per cent in Manitoba.

Scattered stations in Alberta and Saskatchewan reported frost damage. Threshing is expected to be general in Manitoba Aug. 18, Saskatchewan Aug. 24 and Alberta Sept. 4.

STOCKMEN ADVISED AGAINST UNITING

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 11. (AP)—Livestock raisers, packers and retailers of Oregon and Washington were told here today that the proposal to form a local or regional association embracing coast and mountain states and confronting with the government's regulations under the NRA, does not meet approval of the Institute of American Meat Packers, which favors only a national organization with separate regulations for the several sections of the country.

All branches of the meat industry were represented at today's meeting which was called to consider terms of the agricultural adjustment act. Representatives of packers, growers, killers, retailers, cattle and sheep association, the farm organizations and market agencies attended.

Industry Organized
H. R. Davidson of Chicago, vice president of the Institute of American Meat Packers, declared excessive competition was the cause of the legislation governing the meat and livestock industry. Since labor and other costs vary in the several sections of the country, Davidson said, zone systems of administration are necessary, but they must be directly responsible to a national organization.

W. H. Wells of Tacoma, representing a packing company, had told the representatives that nearly 95 per cent of the meat industry has membership in the Institute of American Meat Packers.

Reservation to Get Federal Road Money

PORTLAND, Aug. 11. (UP)—Oregon will receive \$105,000 of the \$4,000,000 appropriated for construction of roads in Indian reservations, according to word received here today. The appropriation was divided as follows: Warm Springs \$50,000; Klamath \$25,000; Umatilla \$20,000.

An additional appropriation of \$8,000 has been approved for the construction of a day school building on the Warm Springs reservation.
