GRAIN AGAIN FINISHES AT LOWEST PRICE

CHICAGO, Aug. 12 (AP) - All grains closed today in Chicago at the lowest point permissible under board of trade emergency operations.

Except for a brief interval at the start when there was something of a general rush to sell and next to no buyers in sight, business was at a complete halt. A general feeling of optimism prevailed, however, that after fixed minimum prices were abolished August 15, the markets would quickly right themselves, and that further declines would result in an excellent class of purchased grain, as many traders had remained altogether apart from grain operations while prices have been pegged.

Wheat closed flat, 2 1/2-3 1/2c under yesterday's finish, corn 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 down, oats 1/2 to 1 1/2 off and provisions showing 7c to 27c decline.

STOCK MART RAGGED DURING PAST WEEK

NEW YORK, Aug. 12 (AP) - The stock market traced a rather ragged pattern during the past week. Market interest was at low ebb with traders content to await developments of the progress of the national recovery campaign and the administration's monetary policies.

The stock exchange was closed today in accord with the summer schedule. Volume for the past five trading sessions was around the same figure as a week ago.

Grains were erratic during the week, doubling reflecting nervousness over the inability of the trade to formulate a code acceptable to the farm administration. The government's crop report, forecasting the smallest wheat crop in 35 years, apparently had no effect on prices for wheat broke, on the following day a maximum amount permitted for a single day's fluctuations.

Portland Livestock

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 12 (AP) - Cattle: 1907, calves 345 for week. Trade was practically on the same basis as ruled in the ago in steers and vealers, white bulls, calves and vealers have not shown any change for several weeks. Much off grade quality arrived during the week with extreme low values in effect.

Hogs: Steady for week. Trade appeared steady most of the week insofar as price was concerned, but the undertone was not so favorable on account of Missouri river hogs being landed here at less prices than quoted here. Late Friday there was a loss of 15c indicated with a general top of six dollars for best light butchers. Feeder pigs continued in good demand up to five dollars, for best weights.

Sheep and lambs: 3987 for week. In general there was no change in price for either sheep or lambs. For lambs the general top was held at six dollars, while Mt. Adams and Mt. Hood stock was slightly higher.

Farm Hand Hurt In Dance Brawl

BAKER, Aug. 12 (AP) - Arthur Gilley, 19, farm hand, was stabbed twice last night during a fight at a dance in North Powder. He was brought to hospital here. His left lung was punctured and he had a wound in his back. His physician expressed the belief today that he would recover. Gilley came to North Powder two years ago from Vanita, Oklahoma.

PRESSURE ON POOR BUTTER CONTINUES

PORTLAND, Aug. 12 (AP) - Pressure against poor grade butter continued on the open market for cables but top scores were holding up well. There was no change in the price list for the week end either on the open market or on the produce exchange.

Make of butter continued chiefly below top score which has created a weakening situation for the offgrade while forcing fair strength for extras and standards.

Butterfat values were at least steady.

Trading in the egg market continued to reflect more or less steadiness with the exception of undergrades which were weak. There was no change in the general price for the week end.

There was no change in the chicken trade. Heavy hens continued in strongest call in relation to supply but the big volume of business was lights which were in big supply.

General maintenance of country prices was shown for the day, a condition that has ruled in all lines except beef from the week's opening. Beef remained slow.

Betterment in the tomato market was again showing. Local stocks were insufficient to take care of needs. Operators who were depending upon low priced Yakima stock to break the market were finally forced to get their needs from The Dalles.

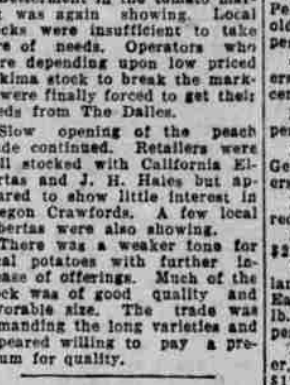
Slow opening of the peach trade continued. Retailers were well stocked with California Elbertas and J. H. Hales but appeared to show little interest in Oregon Crawford's. A few local Elbertas were also showing.

There was a weaker tone for local potatoes with further increase of offerings. Much of the crop was of good quality and favorable size. The trade was demanding the long varieties and appeared willing to pay a premium for quality.

STEAMER GROUND NEAR THE DALLES

THE DALLES, Ore., Aug. 12 (AP) - With a big hole in her bow, the river steamer Umattilla beached near here today after she had crashed on a reef at Three-Mile rapids in the Columbia River. She came to rest partly submerged, with a great section of the 200-ton wheat cargo under water.

Captain George Walker said the Umattilla failed to respond to the rudder and came up on the reef. He was able to swing her clear soon, started the pumps, and raced for the Oregon shore. The steamer was finally beached in a slough a mile above The Dalles. The worst part of the rapids had been negotiated successfully when the rudder failed.
