Orchestra Leader Slain in Fight at Party



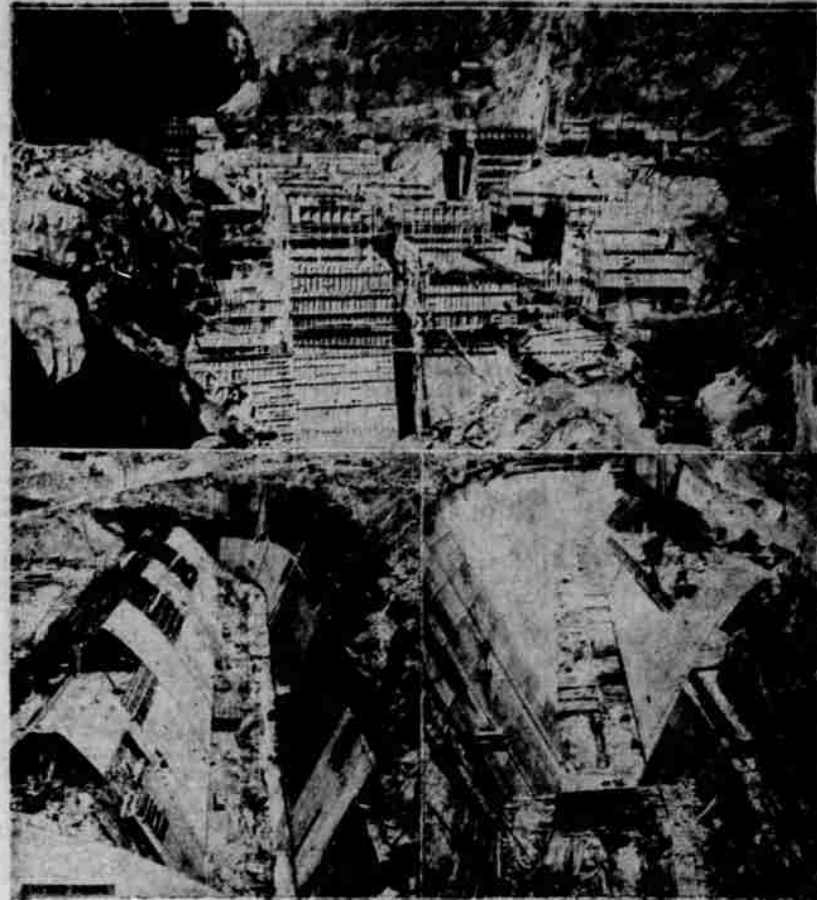

Bulls and Bears Stampeded by Tear Gas Attack

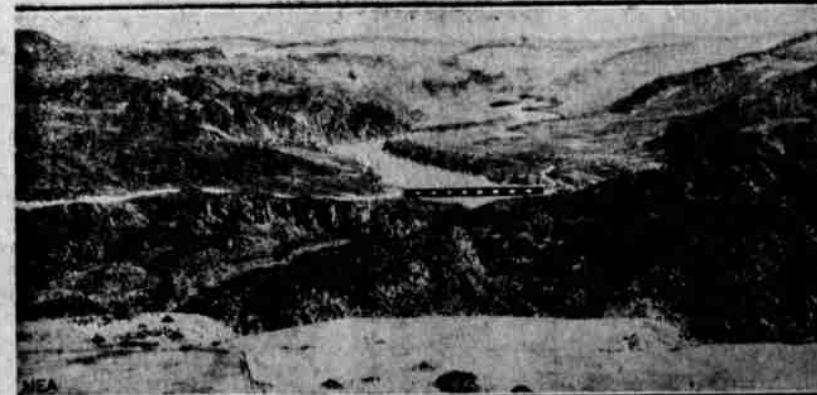


Roaring bulls and growling bears are shown tumbling out into the famous intersection of Wall and Nassau streets in the heart of New York's financial district with both factions in tears at the same time, an unusual phenomenon. Tear gas bombs inserted in a ventilating system by a gang had flooded the Stock Exchange, shown at the right, with eye-stinging vapors.

New Memorial Tower Gives S. F. Bay Vista

Another mighty project for the Pacific northwest is the \$63,000,000 harness for the Columbia river at the Grand Coulee in eastern Washington. The Grand Coulee, a deep chasm once forming the river bed, will be utilized as a reservoir. A 145-foot dam across the Columbia to generate 700,000 horsepower can later be raised to 370 feet to generate over 2,000,000 horsepower.
