LUMBER SURVEY SHOWS GENERAL IMPROVEMENT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (AP)—A definite improvement in business conditions in September was forecast today by the lumber survey committee of the commerce department's timber conservation corps.

"September probably will show marked improvement over last year and the early months of 1933, continuing the start made in June and July towards a genuine upturn in industry, building and general business conditions," the committee said.

Adjustments Sought—"The lumber industry should continue efforts to adjust its production and its stocks to current consumption and not to uncertain future prospects; to improve the manufacturing and marketing of its products and to promote and extend their uses."

A reduction of 2,000,000,000 feet in lumber stocks for the third quarter of the current year was recommended by the committee.

It pointed out that lumber stocks have been reduced four million feet since January 1, 1932, and added that after drastic reduction a substantial revival in use of lumber is indicated.

Prices Go Up—The committee said striking increases in lumber prices have been recorded in the last three months which have gone far toward restoration of price levels that will avoid further capital loss. Rapid and unbridled price advances should be discouraged, it said, and gradual advances to cover expected advancing costs made.

"The great public and industry need is consumption increase which awaits increased public buying power," the committee said.

"Every effort should be made to promote this purchasing power by cooperating with the action of the national recovery administration towards increased employment and wages without excessive or too rapid price advances."

Committee Selected—The committee consists of Thomas S. Holden, vice president of the P. W. Donnell company, New York; M. W. Stark, lumber and coal economist of Columbus, Ohio; Calvin Fentress, chairman of the board of Baker, Fentress & company, Chicago; Dr. Wilson Compton, secretary and manager, National Lumber Manufacturers association, and Agel H. Oehlm, chief of the lumber and paper division, department of commerce.

MOODY TO CONTINUE AS STATE ATTORNEY—SALEM, Aug. 14 (AP)—Ralph H. Moody of Medford will continue as assistant attorney general in place of the late William S. Levens of Salem. Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle announced late Saturday following a conference with Moody.

Moody was placed in charge of the state's prosecution in the murder trial of L. A. Banks of Medford, after Levens died suddenly. Subsequently, Moody handled the prosecution of a number of Jackson county persons who were charged with theft of ballots.

Van Winkle said Moody will wind up the details of the Jackson county prosecutions and then make his headquarters in Salem. He will fill permanently the position vacated by Levens' death, though his duties may not be precisely the same in the reorganization, Van Winkle stated.

MILWAUKIE PLANT SWEEP BY BLAZE—MILWAUKIE, Ore., Aug. 14 (AP)—Smoking ruins were all that remained today of the wood-cutting plant of the Hawley Pulp and Paper company, swept by fire early Sunday. Through an official estimate of damage was not obtainable unofficial sources placed the amount at between \$100,000 and \$150,000.

The fire, of undetermined origin, spread quickly after discovery and the Milwaukee fire department, on the job in a few moments, was in action by equipment and could do little but protect nearby property.

Charles C. Mullan, 66, fire chief, was overcome by heat and smoke and was taken to Portland Sanitarium, where his condition is reported serious.

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INDIAN WOMAN BADLY INJURED IN ACCIDENT

Violet Lynch, Klamath Indian woman of Beatty, sustained a fractured arm, severe lacerations and bruises and a concussion of the brain in an automobile accident which occurred Sunday afternoon between Beatty and Bly. Mrs. Lynch was with a party of Indians, whose names had not been learned Monday, en route to Bly to witness the rodeo, when the accident occurred.

Circumstances of the accident remain shrouded in mystery, with a number of conflicting reports given to officers of the state police department.

One theory is that Mrs. Lynch fell from the car into the road when a door flew open and another unofficial report stated that the driver of the car stopped suddenly and that the automobile turned over.

Mrs. Lynch was brought to Klamath Falls by the ambulance of the Klamath Valley hospital, and is receiving treatment there. The accident occurred at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.
