PRICE STEADY

CHICAGO, Aug. 14. (AP)—Unable to get execution here on selling orders because emergency rules served as barrier, grain traders moved business mostly to Winnipeg today. As a consequence, prices in Chicago became virtually meaningless.
Interest hinged largely on a meeting of senior partners and executive officers of Chicago grain houses to be held late this afternoon. Out of the meeting it was hoped would come suggestions for a solution of difficulties under which the trade was laboring.
All grains closed nominally at the same as Saturday's finish.

CHICAGO, Aug. 14. (AP)—Strapped to fixed minimum price limits which cannot be removed until after the close of business tomorrow, the Chicago grain market stood idle early today. Brokers here did little other than watch Winnipeg wheat quotations tumble about five cents a bushel. Starting nominally unchanged from Saturday's finish, the Chicago wheat market continued flat, with sellers plentiful but finding no bids. Corn and other grains presented the same trading conditions as wheat.

STUDY OF BREAD
PRICE ORDERED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14. (AP)—Dr. Fred C. Howe, consumers' counsel for the farm administration, said today an investigation would be made in cities where the price of bread seemed out of line and where the price spread had increased sharply in the last few months.
Howe made his comment on the basis of a study by the farm administration which showed the price of bread in 16 representative cities had increased 14 cents from February 15 to August 2. The study was based on the average cost of a pound loaf of white bread, 16 ounces making a pound.
Dr. Howe said the increased cost of labor in the various cities had not been fully determined and this might have had an effect in making the price spread higher in some towns.

SMALL MINERS NOT
AFFECTED BY SHIFT

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 14. (AP)—Modification of the National gold export embargo, though of benefit to large producers, will make no difference to the small miner and prospector in California, state mining bureau officials said here yesterday.
They pointed out that the small miner deals with free placed gold, still prohibited from export, or in a few instances, with gold dust in amalgam with quicksilver. Though the latter form may be exported, the
