

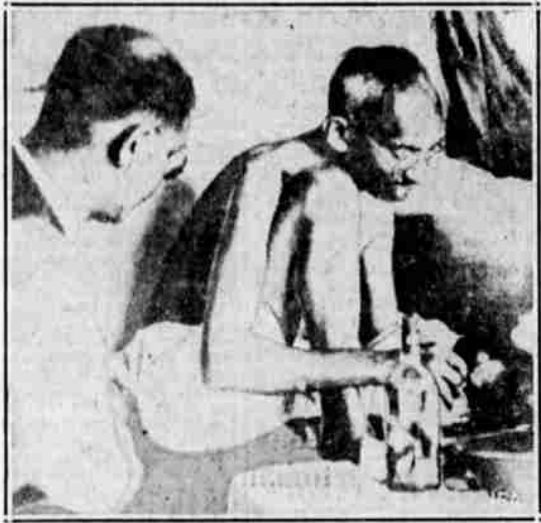

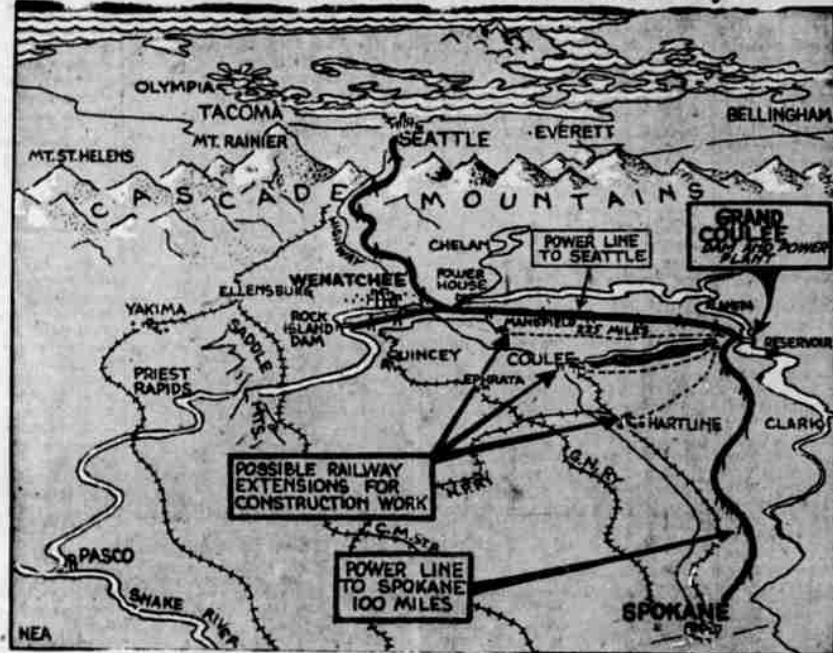


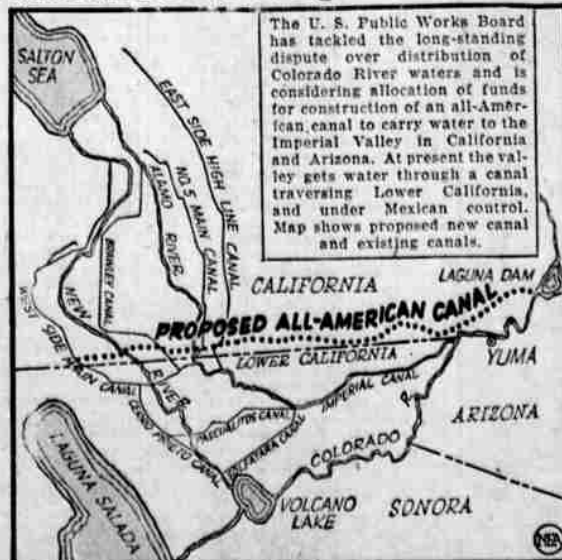
Diagram shows location of Coulee dam project and tremendous area benefited.

Federal Board Weighs Canal Plan



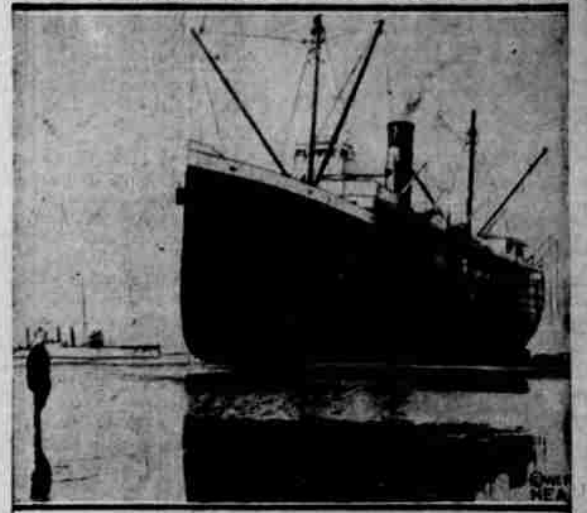

Asks Million In Corn Deal

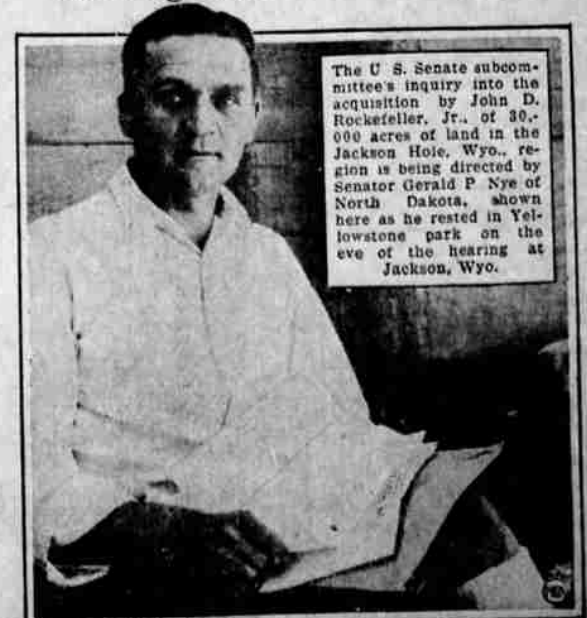
