DES MOINES, Ia., Aug. 15. (AP)—William E. Sweet, former governor of Colorado, here to speak on the national recovery act, believes the day of huge fortunes is over "and the day of a limit on wealth is at hand." But the N. R. A., he said today, is "neither state socialism nor fascism. It is the new deal." "We propose to accomplish in many respects the same things that are proposed under fascism and state socialism but all within the structure of democracy and capitalism," he said. "The present function of capitalism has depended too much on the exploitation of labor. This must cease. The welfare of our people must come before profits."

Game Birds Stricken By Deadly Sickness; Rescue Work Started

Breaking out in the Tule Lake wild life refuge and upper Klamath lake and taking toll of thousands of water fowl, an epidemic of the deadly western duck sickness has set in during the heat, according to H. M. Worcester, federal game protector.

The disease broke out first in the Tule Lake refuge, and the birds have now become so weakened that salvage work may be begun.

Pintails Stricken
Worcester estimates 3000 birds, consisting mostly of pintails, ducks, and Canada geese, are affected in the Tule Lake refuge. Dead birds in the refuge are estimated at 300.

With a party of volunteer workers from Merrill and Tule Lake, Worcester set out Tuesday morning to start the rescue work. All sick birds will be brought to Klamath Falls and placed in the government pens on fresh water on Conger avenue and dead birds will be destroyed to prevent further contamination of waters and infection of well birds.

Salvage work undertaken among sick birds during past epidemics has proved that 85 per cent of the sick ducks and geese picked up in infected areas, recover when placed upon fresh water.

Rescue Work
Volunteer workers are providing boats and a few good dogs to aid Worcester in the rescue work. With good luck,

Worcester hopes to pick up 1500 sick ducks and 75 geese in the first day's work.

The disease is caused by a germ bred in stagnant, shallow and muddy water, from decayed vegetation, by bright sunlight and heat and other atmospheric conditions. It is not infectious to human beings, chickens or other animals, being confined to water fowl, according to Worcester.

Worcester is in need of more workers and also of retrievers with soft mouths which will not injure the sick birds. Anyone wishing to aid in the salvage work is asked to go to the town of Tulelake and ask directions there. All business houses know the route to the bird refuge and will be glad to direct volunteers.

Free Lunch, Too!
Free lunch was served to all those who assist in Tuesday's salvage work of infected birds. Worcester has also asked that anyone finding sick ducks at Tule lake or elsewhere take them to the government pens on Conger avenue, one of which will be kept unlocked for this purpose.

Upon the completion of salvage work at Tule lake, Worcester and any volunteers in the program will center efforts upon Upper Klamath lake. The epidemic broke out there later than at Tule lake, and the birds are yet weaker and more low themselves to be picked up.

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FARM EXPERT VIEWS COUNTY POTATO CROP

G. H. Hyslop of Oregon State College spent Sunday and Monday in Klamath county with the county agent in completing the second field inspection on potatoes entered for certification. The following growers met certification requirements and had their fields passed by Mr. Hyslop: D. E. Alexander and Harry Dixon, Adams Point, 35 acres Netted Gems; J. P. Haley, Merrill, 20 acres Netted Gems; C. V. Barton, Merrill, 51 acres Netted Gems; Homer L. West, Tule Lake, 4 1/2 acres Netted Gems; Henry Semon, Henley, 10 acres Netted Gems; O. A. Schults, Frank, 14 acres Netted Gems; Frank Paszy, Malin, 7 acres Netted Gems; Helbert Wilson, Malin, 2 acres Netted Gems; Walter Stannoy, Malin, 4 acres Netted Gems; Gratton-Jackman Company, Malin, 120 1/2 acres Netted Gems, 34 acres Wisconsin Prides, 5 acres Earliest of All.

A total of 310 acres passed the second field inspection, being the largest acreage of potatoes ever entered for certification in the Klamath basin. The general condition of the certified potatoes is considerably above normal at this date and more than likely the Klamath basin will produce nearly double the amount of certified seed ever produced in the past years.

The first field inspection was applied in July, all diseased plants being rogued out both before and after that field inspection. Following the last field inspection, it was also necessary for growers to rogue out all diseased plants in their fields. The third and final inspection will be given after the potatoes are dug and in the bins late this fall. All potatoes meeting the requirements of three inspections can be labeled with the blue tag of the Oregon State Certification Board, and the sacks sealed after which they can be sold as Oregon certified seed.

The production of certified potatoes is an important part of the Klamath potato program in that it provides a sufficient quantity of high quality seed for planting by all growers in the Klamath basin. In addition, a small quantity is generally shipped to outside points. Certification of a small acreage each year greatly aids in improvement of the entire potato crop of this section.
