Cosmic Ray Search Goes to Sea



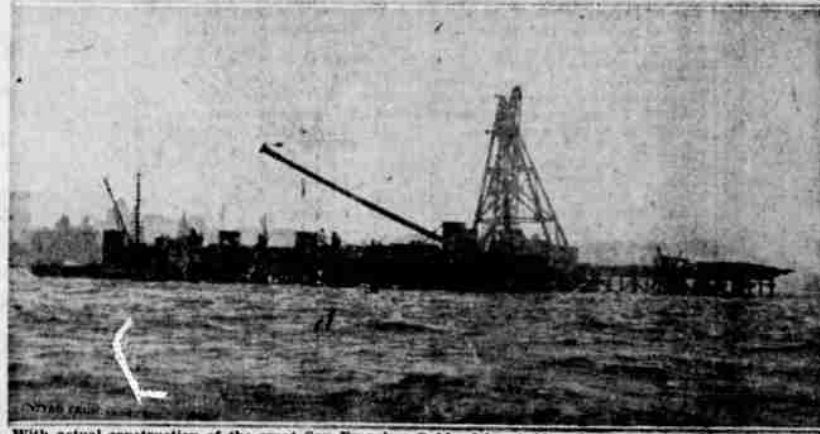
