COUNTY AGENT EXPLAINS PLAN OF WHEAT ACT

One feature that appears to loom large in the minds of wheat growers of this county in connection with the wheat plan, judging from the number of questions concerning it, is the matter of use of the "contracted acreage" which is the official term used to refer to the land to be taken out of wheat in accordance with the acreage reduction contract.

Only broad principles have been laid down in this connection so far, says County Agent Henderson, leaving some important points to be interpreted finally. However, here is the very latest information he has on the subject:

In the first place, the fundamental idea of the agricultural adjustment administration is that such land as is contracted to be taken out of wheat shall be taken "in cold storage" for the present, as one high official put it. In other words that the wheat plan provides cash compensation for taking that land out of production, hence a grower should not expect to continue it as equal income-producing acreage with the rest of his farm.

Thus, it is pointed out, the government contracts to make benefit payments for three years in return for acreage reduction for only two years, as the first payments apply to the 1933 crop on which no reduction is required. This is an adjustment of the cotton situation in the south where contracts called for actual plowing under part of this year's crop.

Take, for example, a farmer who has been growing an average of 100 acres of wheat producing 25 bushels to the acre, or 2500 bushels total. He gets an allotment of about 54 per cent or 1352 bushels which at the minimum payment promised of 28 cents a bushel brings him a little more than \$375 cash in addition to the sale of the wheat. Thus, taking this first year's benefits only, he is paid from about \$18.30 to \$27.45 per acre for his 10 to 20 acres of "contracted acreage" the amount per acre depending on the percentage reduction he will be required to make.

Therefore it would appear, says County Agent Henderson, that any returns a farmer gets for this acreage taken out of wheat can be considered pure "profit" above compensation already received.

The government recognizes, however, that the land would best not be allowed to stand completely idle to become a breeding place for weeds, so here is the exact regulation as set out in the specimen contract:

"The contracted acreage of 1934 and 1935 shall not be used for the production of any nationally produced agricultural product for sale, but may be used as follows: Summer fallowed, planted to soil-improving or erosion-preventing crops, or to food crops for home consumption on this farm, or to feed crops for the production of livestock (or livestock products) for home consumption or use on this farm."

Grain Elevator Lost In Blaze

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Aug. 16. (AP)—A lake front elevator containing approximately 1,000,000 bushels of grain, was destroyed last night by fire of undetermined origin.

Harry Stratton, president of the company which leased the elevator from the Northwestern railroad, said the total loss would be about \$750,000.

HOARDERS FACING THREAT OF ARREST

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16. (AP)—Gold hoarders of the United States have about reached the end of the rainbow, for the government is going after their hidden pots of gold.

In the justice department, legal experts are quietly drawing up the case against gold hoarders. It would not surprise official Washington if warrants for the arrest of the hoarders were announced by Attorney General Cummings when he returns from his vacation Thursday or Friday.

Prosecution Ordered—Before he departed for his vacation, Cummings said that prosecution of gold hoarders who continued to defy the government would be started in two or three weeks. The three weeks expires Thursday.

The treasury and department of justice have completed their investigations into a long list of persons who withdrew gold from banks during the March crisis. At last reports, there still were 230 persons holding \$44,025 in the metal which they refused to give up, while \$27,481,498, not turned in when President Roosevelt ordered it done, had voluntarily

been given to the banks after justice agents visited hoarders. In all, justice department agents called on more than 5,000 persons whose names were on the list of those who withdrew gold. That list has been checked and rechecked, and finally returned to the justice department.

Oregon Pioneer Dies On Tuesday

PORTLAND, Aug. 16. (AP)—Mrs. Addie E. Ormsby, 32, a pioneer of the Oregon country, died in a hospital here Tuesday from injuries suffered two weeks ago in a fall. She was the widow of Captain Salmon Bell Ormsby, at one time head of national forests of Oregon and Washington.

Mrs. Ormsby had been quite active until her injury two weeks ago. In the fall she fractured an arm and a leg and lay helpless for four hours before she was found and taken to a hospital.

PRICE OF CEREALS FALL OFF RAPIDLY

CHICAGO, Aug. 16. (AP)—With the removal of "pegged" minimum prices for grains on the board of trade today, all cereals dropped the extreme limits permitted at the opening. While pegging was withdrawn, the daily price restrictions of five cents for wheat, rye and barley, four cents for corn and three cents for oats remained in effect.

September wheat opened at \$7 1-8 cents, September corn 45 1-8, September oats 33 3-4 and September rye 63 cents. Most of the interest had been centered on the interest quotations. The directors of the big Canadian exchange today put in to effect pegged minimum prices there.

PORTLAND, Aug. 16. (AP)—Release of the pegged prices cost the general domestic wheat trade several cents a bushel at least during the day. On the Portland futures market September lost 4 cents and December 5 cents a bushel.

THREE PERSONS DEAD IN CRASH

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 16. (AP)—Three persons were killed, two others seriously injured and another suffered lesser burns late last night when a seaplane owned by the Wells Transport company fell into the deep waters of Anderson lake near Bridge river, 150 miles north of here.

The dead: Mr. and Mrs. E. Dean and W. J. Butt, proprietor of McGillivray Falls lodge, near Bridge river. Dean was a former employee of the Pioneer mine.

RANCH WORKERS BADLY INJURED

O. L. Arrell was critically injured Tuesday afternoon when he became caught in a mowing machine on the James N. Givan and son ranch near Bly, where he was employed.

Arrell's ankle was severely fractured, torn and mangled, and he sustained shoulder and head injuries as well. He was brought to Hillside hospital for treatment.

Hospital attendants believe that Arrell will recover if infection can be avoided.
