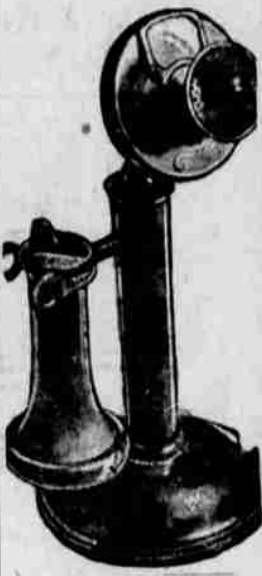

upon the state a heavy overhead, the commission chairman explained, the federal aid program. All these amounts to about \$750,000. "So," he continued, "with the loss of revenue from shrinkage of gasoline taxes and the loss of revenue from the invalidation of the motor transportation law, this will largely hamper the department in carrying out the federal aid program."

Scott said yesterday's action was not contemplated when the legislature adopted the \$5 automobile license law. The truck regulation and taxation law was passed, he said, largely to compensate the state for the difference in fees under the old license rate and the new.

The highway commission budget has been drawn very carefully, Scott said, and the department will lose \$200,000 in fees for the six month period already elapsed and about double that amount next year.

This, coupled with the reduced revenue from the gasoline tax, Chairman Scott declared, constitutes a difficult problem of finance and makes it necessary to resort to one of three measures. These are:

First: Curtail maintenance of roads and highways;

Second: Curtail federal aid; or

Third: Issue bonds.

"I do not think the people of Oregon want to issue bonds," Scott said, "and if they do, I do not think we could sell them."

GRAIN MART FORCED DOWN BY SELLING

CHICAGO, Aug. 16, (P)—Mob psychology received the chief blame from traders today for a new maximum allowable tumble of grain prices, including 5 cents a bushel collapse in wheat. Something like a flood of selling orders which had accumulated during stagnation of dealings the last three days poured into the grain pits at the opening, and forced the markets down to the furthest point that emergency regulations of the board of trade would tolerate for a 24-hour period. No recovery ensued.

Since the season's peaks were reached about a month ago, wheat has dropped 24c, corn 27c, oats 15c, rye 43c, and barley 50c. Wheat closed nominal, 1c down from the average of yesterday's finish; corn, 4c off; oats, showing 3c decline, and provisions at a setback of 50c.

WHEAT HEARINGS SET FOR PORTLAND

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 16, (AP)—The Chronicle said today the agricultural adjustment administration will open a hearing Monday at Portland "to consider paying bounties to stimulate export of the Pacific Northwest's huge wheat surplus."

"The hearing, opening the same day as does the London wheat conference, is regarded as the administration's threat to the wheat nations of the world to reach agreement or face wholesale dumping across the Pacific of the United States surplus stocks of wheat," The Chronicle said.

North Pacific Grain Growers, Inc., regional marketing cooperative with headquarters here, revealed today it has filed a plan with the adjustment administration at Washington, D. C., for organization of a huge wheat pool to be managed by the cooperative and through which the bounties would be distributed back to the farmers on pool grain exported.

LINDBERGH'S PLAN EUROPEAN FLIGHT

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, Aug. 16, (P)—Charles A. Lindbergh planned today to continue on to Europe in their northern mapping flight if weather conditions were favorable. On their arrival at Vatnagarður sound near here from Angmagssalik, Greenland, yesterday, the colonel told an attendant who brought them coffee and milk that England might be their next destination.

A large crowd from Reykjavik, disappointed because the colonel did not land here, went to Vatnagarður to greet them. The Lindberghs slept aboard their plane last night and said they would either drive here by motor or fly here this morning.

POLITICAL UNREST RISING IN ECUADOR

QUITO, Ecuador, Aug. 16, (P)—Soldiers guarded the presidential and legislative palaces today following demands for the resignation of President Martinez Mera, who was inaugurated last December.

The head of the chamber of deputies, Dr. Delacso Ibarra, moved that the chamber demand that Mera quit, but an amendment to the motion provided that the chamber will hear charges against the executive and then ask his resignation. By a vote of 42 to 22 congress approved the sending of a commission to the president to ask him, "in the name of democracy," to let the popular will rule.
