## NEW WHEAT PLANS WILL BE FORMED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17, (AP)—Farm administrators today called a conference for next Monday at Portland, Oregon, to discuss plans for a new export movement of wheat to the Orient. The effort will be made, they said, because of a large surplus of grain in that area which they believe will have a depressing effect upon prices of wheat in other sections of the country. At the same time, Secretary Wallace told newspaper men he had received word from friends in Europe that there is an increasing prospect of an international wheat production curtailment being reached at the London conference, which will reconvene on Monday.

**TAX IN PROSPECT**—WASHINGTON, Aug. 17, (AP)—Secretary Wallace said today there was a prospect of additional processing taxes on wheat and cotton if the price of the products continued to decline. The processing tax is a levy paid by the manufacturer or processor of wheat and cotton which in turn goes to the farmer in benefit payments for his agreement to cut production.

In the case of wheat, the present tax is 30 cents a bushel and on cotton it is 4.2 cents a lint pound. The secretary would not indicate at what point additional processing taxes would be levied on the two principal commodities in the event prices continued to sag, but said if they were applied that benefits would "eventually" get back to the farmer.

**HUNGRY MAN COLLAPSES**—SALEM, Aug. 17, (AP)—Heat and lack of food were blamed for the collapse here last night of George McDonald, of Butte, Mont. Police who picked McDonald up said he told them he had eaten only two sandwiches the past two days.

## BONUS PETITIONS AWAITING FUNDS

SALEM, Aug. 17, (AP)—Recommendation that cash bonuses be paid to World War veterans whose applications have been received between September 27, 1932 and July 31, this year, will be made to the bonus commission this week by J. R. Owen, secretary. It was learned today that there are about 100 applications on file amounting to about \$20,000, he said. The commission discontinued making payments on cash bonuses last September, pending a decision by the state supreme court, but since no suit has yet been filed, and the attorney general had handed down an opinion that such payment could be made until the constitutional provision was changed, Owen will recommend the payment of bonuses as soon as funds are available.

## FUNERAL ARRANGED FOR W. B. FOLLETT

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17, (AP)—Funeral services were to be held at Trinity church here at 2:30 p. m. today for William B. Follett, first state department commander of the American Legion in Oregon. The body will be sent to Chicago for interment. Follett early yesterday shot himself to death while he sat in Huntington park. His friends and comrades of the legion said he had been in ill health since returning from war service in France. An old head injury was believed responsible for his condition. Recently his spells of dependency became more frequent and his melancholia increased.

## N.R.A. Officials Push Campaign Of Organization

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17, (AP)—Here is a quick peek at today's status of the national industrial recovery campaign. President Roosevelt wants oil program as industry and NRA leaders go over plans. Experts seek common understanding on labor for steel code. NIRA pushes efforts to bring coal and autos into campaign. Hearings held on Lumber retailers code. Modifications of re-employment agreement or blanket code announced to cover cigarette and other tobacco manufacturers, flat glass industry, gas appliances, folding box manufacturers, cooking and heating appliances, book manufacturers, farm equipment, lead, chain and other industries. Labor board prepares to deal directly with company officials in workers' charges they have been discriminated against because of union activities.

## Oregon Railway Granted Permit To Abandon Line

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17, (AP)—The interstate commerce commission has authorized the Oregon Electric railway to abandon its branch line from Gray to East Corvallis, upholding the contention that continued operation would impose an unnecessary burden and prospective traffic did not justify any hope of improvement.

## Folsom Convict In Oregon Prison

SALEM, Aug. 17, (AP)—Jack Tomlin, an escaped Folsom convict, was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary here yesterday for burglary at a Southern Pacific section house at Turner. Commitment was held up until Folsom prison officials advised whether or not they wish Tomlin returned to complete his sentence there.

## STOCK MARKETS SWING FORWARD

NEW YORK, Aug. 17, (AP)—Stocks and commodities reversing yesterday's course, registered smart rallies today. In the share market the list closed with gains ranging from 1/4 to 3/8. Grains at Chicago opened at the limit declines but later suddenly changed their direction. Wheat showed increases at the close of from 1/4 to 3/8 cents per bushel, while corn and oats pushed up to the maximum amount. Cotton, too, felt the effects of the changed sentiment and advanced \$2.20 to \$2.75 a bale, the dollar was heavy in the foreign exchange markets. The opening in stocks followed the upturn in grains. It lasted a brief half hour, but thereafter, in spite of declines in declines, prices held their early gains.

## FEDERAL RELIEF PLANS EXPLAINED

PORTLAND, Aug. 17, (AP)—Pierce Williams, western representative of the federal relief administration, today told the state relief committee that Oregon must advance two dollars for every one contributed by the federal government, or no federal money will be forthcoming. The state committee, appointed by Governor Meier and headed by Raymond B. Wilcox as chairman, met with Williams today. He said the statement of policy is backed by an ultimatum from the president, and has been applied by the relief administration to other states.
