MILK PRODUCERS ANNOUNCE CHANGE

At a meeting of a committee of milk producers and milk distributors at the county agent's office Thursday morning, distributors agreed to raise the price to market milk producers, as follows: Market milk 15 cents a pound fat above sour butterfat prices, with a 40-cent a pound minimum. All milk received at the plant unseparated to be paid for at this basis. Sweet cream received at plant and used for by-products, 35 cents per pound butterfat. This is along the line of the agreement arrived at among distributors some time ago, when a 15-cent margin between sour fat and fat in market milk was established, but the 40-cent minimum was not established at that time. It was made necessary due to the rapid decline in sour cream fat recently. This price will be adhered to for the remainder of August and it is hoped that either a permanent code will be accepted by that time, or a temporary code established. This agreement does not affect present retail and wholesale charges of dairy products.
