COMMISSION ASKS TAXATION CUT

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—The state tax commission, in an order made on August 15, went over the head of County Assessor Chris Langset and ordered the sheriff of Lake county to cut the tax bill of most of the large timber owners in Lake county by ten per cent.

Last December the commission ordered a 10 per cent reduction in the timber cruise of several large timber owners without first having investigated the facts. Assessor Langset refused to pay any attention to the order for the reason that the timber owners had not complained to the board of equalization that the county cruise was too high and he proceeded to extend the tax rolls as if the order had not been issued. Rather than attempt to mandamus the assessor the state tax commission issued its supplemental order and directed Sheriff Herbert H. Carroll to reduce the tax bill of the large owners for the reason that the rolls are now in his possession.

Several large, and many small timber owners who have paid their taxes without protest against the county cruise or the rate of assessment will not receive a refund, the order of the tax commission confining its benefits only to the few large timber owners who refuse to pay. The long tax revenue to the county through the enforcement of the commissioners' order has not been announced.

FACTORY WORKS ADDITIONAL CREW

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—In order to comply with the NRA code 150 men are now given a five-day a week, 25 men have been added to the payroll of the Underwood Box company. By alternating these 25 extra men with the regular crew of 125, the factory is kept operating eight hours daily for six-day 40-hour week.

As this is the important season in the box factory it was necessary to make these arrangements.

ASA KEYES PARDONED

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Aug. 19 (AP)—Asa Keyes, who as Los Angeles district attorney, was convicted in 1928 of criminal conspiracy and sentenced to San Quentin, was granted a full pardon by Governor Ralph today.

Judge Skipworth Offers Praise For State Police

SALEM, Aug. 19. (AP)—Conduct of state police officers in the Jackson county murder and holdup cases was praised by Judge Skipworth, who presided at the several trials in Lane, Jackson and Klamath counties. In a letter to superintendent of the state police Charles Pray, Skipworth said the state police rendered valuable service in maintaining order and their activities were such as to commend them to every citizen in Oregon.

FOUR SENTENCED TO STATE PRISON

Gilbert E. Raff pleaded guilty in circuit court Friday to charges of attempted robbery armed with a dangerous weapon and was sentenced by Judge W. M. Duncan to five years in the state penitentiary. Raff was arrested by city police recently in connection with the attempted hold-up of a service station on South Sixth street.

Maarits Lake pleaded guilty to charges of larceny of an automobile and was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

Joe Kirk, Indian, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of burglary not in a dwelling, and received a penitentiary sentence of two years. Avery Stokes, also an Indian, pleaded guilty to a charge of receiving stolen goods in connection with the same case, and was sentenced to six months in the Klamath county jail. Kirk admitted having stolen a case of beer from the Geringer store at Chiloquin, and having later turned it over to Stokes.

W. W. Edwards also entered a plea of guilty in circuit court Friday to charges of obtaining money under false pretenses, but sentence will not be pronounced upon him until a later date, according to Judge Duncan.

Edgerton Mill Moved to Canyon

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—The A. L. Edgerton mill in Drews Valley is being moved this week to the mouth of Antelope canyon, about five miles west of town. The new plant will be in operation in time to cut a million feet of timber before the winter snows fall. The new mill will have an increased capacity through the installation of a new shot-gun feed and solid-tooth circular saw. It is estimated that upwards of 45,000 feet can be cut in an eight-hour day.

For the first time this season the full resources of fire fighting apparatus of the Fremont forest was brought into use and Friday the fire was under control. A very few trees were destroyed, the fire being confined mostly to the dry grass in the canyon and the sage brush.

The entire force of Camp Ingram, 55 men from the Dog Lake camp and 75 men from the Cliff Springs camp at Silver Lake were all rushed to the fire to aid in putting it out.

About this matter of minutes and miles
Henry Ford Dearborn, Mich.
The speedometer is a little thing, but can be a big source of wrong conclusions.
On a recent test, two cars of different makes, with speedometers set at 0, were given each two gallons of gas, and driven the same road till they stopped. The top car went 7 miles farther down the road than the low car, yet the low car's speedometer showed that it had gone farther than the top car. Paper miles and road miles may be two quite different things.
It is easier to build a speedometer that will read 70 miles an hour than a car that will go 70 miles an hour.
A Detroit man who has a summer home in Northern Michigan, began several months ago to drive his first Ford V-8. He says:
"My watch tells me that I go up north in less time than I did before, but my Ford speedometer says that I go at slower speed, and the trip registers fewer miles. In my former car the speedometer speed was higher, my mileage greater on this trip, but with my Ford V-8 I go in less time and use less gas."
There is no mystery about that. His former mileage, speed and gas consumption were delusions. He figured by a speedometer that did not measure accurately, and was not meant to. All his costs—operations, repairs, upkeep—were calculated on a wrong basis. A wrong speedometer misleads on all these items.
Some car manufacturers justify this practice. They say it is just as well for a driver to think he is going 70 miles an hour when he is going only 62. Well, let that pass as to speed; does it justify telling every driver that he is getting more mileage out of his car than he really is? A speedometer measures speed AND mileage; should it cheat on both?
Speeding up a clock cannot create more hours any more than speeding up a speed-meter can create more miles. An hour is sixty minutes long. A mile is 5280 feet long. Ford mileage and Ford speed are accurately measured—they are there—you get them—no one gets more.
Anyone can buy speedometers and have them "fixed" anyway he wants them. We deal with manufacturers who know our strict stand on accuracy and are glad to meet our specifications. The limit of variation in Ford speedometers, a limit that cannot be avoided in manufacture, is 2½ at 70 miles.
We get our speed and mileage out of our engine and wheels, not out of our speedometer.
