Indian Justice of Peace

At Beatty Regains Sight After Year of Blindness

Rip Van Winkle was no more surprised when he awoke from his long sleep than was Frederick Parker Hubbard, Modoc Indian justice of the peace at Beatty, who recently rallied from a coma five days after a seizure had been removed from his right eye and found that he was able to see again after a year of total blindness.

Hubbard's blindness was brought on by diabetic cataracts, although he is only 47 years old. Popular with the Indians on the Klamath reservation where he has lived most of his life, many tried to think of ways in which Hubbard, or "Parker" as they call him, might be helped.

Finally, Media Riddle, whose father's sight had been restored by an operation, came to Mr. and Mrs. Hubbard and told them about the success of the operation which was performed three years ago by Dr. L. D. Gass in this city.

"Dick" Brown, Mrs. Riddle's father, was 84 years old when Dr. Gass removed the cataract from one of his eyes, and he was able to see again after years of blindness. The old man is still alive and healthy in the sunlight and beauty of nature, and walked more than a mile the other day picking wild flowers.

Snatching at any straw Hubbard, accompanied by his wife, came to Klamath Falls and, as Dr. Gass said, he could be made to see again, like old "Dick" Brown. Because of his other physical ailments, Hubbard was a poor risk for an operation, but after a few days' preparation, he was taken to a local hospital and the delicate operation was performed.

Several days after the operation, Hubbard fell into a stupor, and his condition was termed very serious. After receiving insulin and other treatments, however, he rallied, and awoke to find the bandages gone from his eyes, and to see the light again after living in semi-darkness for several years and total blindness for a whole year.

This operation was performed only a little over a month ago, and when I chatted with the pleased and happy Indian Friday afternoon, he looked at me, read charts on the wall with almost normal vision, and told of driving his automobile and seeing the jack-rabbits on the road. All this, of course, with glasses made with special lenses.

Father With Captain Jack
Hubbard's father was a member of Captain Jack's band of Indians, and was exiled to Oklahoma where Frederick was born. When the exiles were brought back west to their own country, the little Indian boy came with his parents, who died shortly afterwards. He attended boarding school at Yainax on the reservation and grew into one of the huskiest young Indians on the reservation.

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Canada to Get American Gold

OTTAWA, Aug. 19. (AP)—Minister of Finance R. B. Bennett announced today that the Dominion government had decided to permit the shipment into Canada of gold ore, gold concentrates, gold precipitates and unrefined amalgam from the United States to Canadian smelters.

After the gold has passed through the smelters, it will be sent to the Royal Canadian mint and refined, then shipped by the department of finance to the world markets.

The department will act as agent for selling the metal in the most advantageous market. The cost of refining, shipping and other necessary expenses will be deducted, as well as a handling charge of one per cent.

The minister of finance will have sole discretion as to the metal and time of sale. No sales tax will be levied against the shipments. The department's only charge above the out-of-pocket costs will be the one per cent handling charge.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19. (AP)—The action of the Canadian government in permitting import into Canada of American-made gold ore, concentrates, precipitates and unrefined amalgam was interpreted by officials today as providing a higher market for American gold mines.

Gold in the United States commands a fixed price of \$20.67 per ounce, while in Canada recently it has been selling for more than \$25 an ounce.

Some days ago the United States relaxed President Roosevelt's gold embargo to permit export of gold ore, concentrates, precipitates and unrefined amalgam. The action was taken after receipt of many requests from American mining companies that they be permitted to take advantage of the higher prices in foreign markets.

At the treasury today it was said no further relaxation in the gold embargo was contemplated so far as was known there.

Soviet Millions Reported Starving

VIENNA, Aug. 19. (AP)—Cardinal Innitzer, the archbishop of Vienna, issued an appeal today in which he said that millions had died of starvation in Soviet Russia in the last few months.

In the interest of the eternal laws of humanity, the Cardinal said, the world should assist in a relief campaign which he considered necessary to save further millions from starvation and "the accompanying horrors of infanticide and cannibalism."

WHEAT MOVES UP RAPIDLY WITH BUYING

CHICAGO, Aug. 19. (AP)—Big concentrated buying that totaled far up into millions of bushels hoisted wheat higher and higher in the last hour today. Topmost prices came shortly before the close.

One broker alone took upward of 5,000,000 bushels. In the past he has often represented the United States government financed corporations, and it was popularly conjectured his buying today was for a possible deal with the Orient on government account.

Profit taking caused some reaction at the last, and wheat closed unsettled, 3 1/2c to 3 3/4c above yesterday's finish: corn, 3 1/2c to 3 3/4c; oats, 1 1/2c to 1 3/4c advanced, and provisions showing 1 1/2c to 3 1/2c gain.
