STATE CHECKS CATTLE HERDS FOR DISEASE

The greatest menace to Oregon's cattle industry is the infectious abortion disease, according to Dr. W. H. Lytle, director of the animal industries division state department of agriculture. Tests made by veterinarians show that an average of 9.3 per cent of cattle in the state are afflicted by the disease, though in Grant county, where it is most prevalent, 36.3 per cent of the cattle tested last year were affected. Of 140,367 cattle tested in Oregon in 1932, reactors were 7,380.

Tuberculosis Reduced

Tuberculosis of cattle, once a dreaded disease, has been nearly stamped out in Oregon, the agricultural department reported. Percentage of cattle reacting to tuberculosis tests was only .34. There is no effective cure for either infectious abortion or tuberculosis, other than slaughter of affected animals to prevent spread of the disease. Presence of abortion does not impair value for beef cattle, but prevents reproduction. Carcasses of tuberculous cattle are unfit for food. County second to Grant in prevalence of infectious abortion was Lake, where 31.4 per cent of the cattle were affected. Twenty per cent of Malheur county cattle had the disease.

Other counties included Baker, 9.3; Benton, 5.9; Clackamas, 7.04; Clatsop, 9.1; Coos, 4.07; Curry, 11; Deschutes, 11.3; Jackson, 5.6; Klamath, 13.1; Lane, 5.8; Linn, 6.59; Marion, 6.5; Multnomah, 12.8; Wasco, 4.

No reaction to tests were found in Gilliam or Sherman counties. In Douglas county percentage was only .59. No tests were made in Harney or Wheeler counties.

Gilliam county, with 4.33 per cent, showed the greatest reaction of cattle to tuberculosis tests. Sherman county cattle reacted 1.97 percent; Wasco, 1.78; Morrow, 1.77, and Baker, 1.07. Others included Benton, .48; Clackamas, .35; Clatsop, .29; Coos, .10; Klamath, .65; Lane, .43; Linn, .22; Marion, .23; Multnomah, .88. No cattle reacted to tuberculosis tests in Columbia, Crook, Curry, Deschutes, Hood River, Jackson, Jefferson, Umatilla and Wheeler counties. No tests were made in Harney county.

MODOC FOREST FIRES PLACED UNDER CONTROL

ALTURA, Calif.—A score of fires started from a lightning storm in the Modoc national forest Thursday evening and all are reported under control. The fires, which were all controlled while yet small by forest rangers, guards and members of the civilian conservation corps, covered almost the entire area of the Modoc forest.

The storm moved in a large circle over an immense area of timbered country. Many fires were spotted by forest service lookouts but heavy showers, amounting to almost cloudburst proportions, extinguished the fires in some areas.

These are the first lightning fires of the 1933 season in the Modoc forest, an unparalleled record, since no other season has been known in the past quarter of a century when lightning did not start fires in the timbered areas long before this date. In the local national forest area about 45 fires have occurred this season so far with practically no timber loss whatever. Most of the fires were caused by careless smokers.

These are the first lightning fires of the 1933 season in the Modoc forest, an unparalleled record, since no other season has been known in the past quarter of a century when lightning did not start fires in the timbered areas long before this date. In the local national forest area about 45 fires have occurred this season so far with practically no timber loss whatever. Most of the fires were caused by careless smokers.
