CLIFT SPRINGS, C. C. C.—The seven men who participated in the Golden Gloves Championship amateur boxing tournament at Medford, returned Thursday night to Clift Springs camp. They left camp Sunday morning at 3:00 o'clock. They stopped at the Wineglass camp for breakfast where they picked up five more men. Two more men were picked up at the Government camp and one at the Upper Rogue camp.

Upon arrival at Medford they were transferred to the Medford hotel where they resided for the four days they were there. All meals were eaten at the fairgrounds.

The boys met unusual luck when they were matched with experienced boxers. The boys from this camp had little training in the ring, but they showed gameness in putting up a good battle. They arrived at the hottest time of the year with the thermometer hovering around 110 degrees in the shade.

Tony Accardi, of Portland, weighing 155 pounds, fought Charles Rugh from Appleton and won a decision. The fight was one of the best fought at the tournament. He was called away unexpectedly just before his last fight, when he learned that his mother had died in Portland. Tony would have probably won the trophy in the heavyweight class as his opponent in his first fight received the trophy.

Vernon Parker of Klamath Falls, weighing 139 pounds, met Petty John and was knocked out in the first round. Petty John had the championship in the 33rd Division in Illinois in 1932. Albert Schneck and Bert Lee of Klamath Falls rated seconds.

NEW MEN'S STYLES PROVIDE COMFORT AND EASE

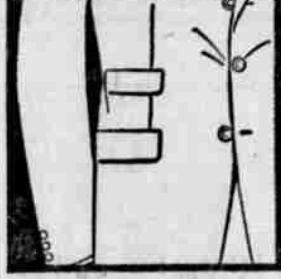
More Leisure Has Influenced Designing, Says Duncan Paige

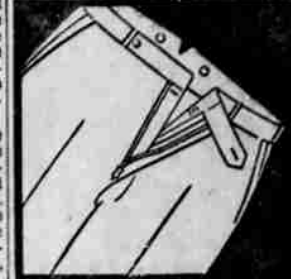


An extra pocket flap.

SEVEN FARMERS DEAD IN WRECK

LUMBERTON, N. C., Aug. 22. (AP)—Seven Lenoir county farmers were killed and three critically injured here today when their tobacco truck crashed into a SeaBoard Airline cargo-propelled passenger train running from Hamlet to Wilmington.

The truck, loaded with tobacco for the Fairmont market and occupied by a group of farmers from Deep Run, 10 miles from Kinston, crashed into the rear of the train. Bodies of three of those killed were strewn along the tracks for 300 yards.

TROUT ESCAPE EPIDEMIC IN KLAMATH RIVER

No trout have been found among the dead fish in Klamath river, according to scouts sent out by the Klamath Sportsmen's association which has been investigating reports of an epidemic which was said to be killing thousands of fish.

Many large mullets, suckers and catfish have died in Lake river below the dam and in Klamath river as far south as the Shaw-Bartram mill, investigation revealed, but no trout have been found among these fish.

The same fish are dying in waters of the government "A" canal and in the diversion canal, Sportsmen's association representatives said, and cause of the epidemic has not been discovered. The association will not request the services of a scientist from the state game commission since game fish apparently are not affected by the mysterious sickness.

MEIER CONSIDERS SPECIAL SESSION
PORTLAND, Aug. 22. (AP)—The question whether the Oregon legislature must be assembled in special session to provide funds to carry on relief work in this state, was to be determined at a conference to be held here this afternoon under the call of Governor Meier.

The source of state funds for further unemployment relief was the immediate reason for the conference. Federal officials declared unless Oregon advances \$2 for every dollar of federal money, there will be no more federal aid for relief of the unemployed.

GRAIN INTERESTS STUDY WHEAT PLAN
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 22. (AP)—Grain men from all parts of the Pacific Northwest continued their efforts here today to come to an agreement with the federal government on a plan to export from this district the estimated surplus of 40,000,000 bushels of wheat that is having an adverse effect on the price of the product in other sections of the country.

After an all-day meeting yesterday, an executive session last night, those at the conference intimated they were confident a definite plan will be agreed upon. The group met in another executive conference today.
