

WHEAT INTERESTS ADOPT AGREEMENT

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 23 (AP)—Adoption by the several interests involved of a wheat marketing code for the Pacific northwest, was announced here today by Douglas McIntyre of the federal agricultural adjustment administration.

Producers, exporters, millers and bankers, McIntyre said, have endorsed the agreement under which it is expected a forty million bushel wheat surplus will be exported on a federal subsidy plan.

Differences Adjusted
Final drafting of the agreement for signature by the various interests, preliminary to approval by the secretary of agriculture, was undertaken at once. The sub-committee of four appointed by the general executive committee yesterday, worked in the early morning hours ironing out differences and adjusting terms. It was expected that the code, as finally drafted, would be ready for presentation to the full committee late today.

The committee which brought the agreement into its final form included F. B. Burke of Berry Flouring Mills, San Francisco; A. E. Sutton of Portland, representing exporters; F. J. Wilmer of Rosalie, Wash., representing producers; and Herbert V. Alward, manager of the Portland branch of the Bank of California, representing bankers.

Storm Ravaging Eastern States; 6 Persons Dead

Its wings were broken. Ten launches of the police marine division were kept busy throughout the day and tonight, assisting small boats to reach safety. Five persons marooned on Lone Tree island in Long Island sound were rescued by police.

The marine police, together with coast guards, had calls for help from more than 20 boats, most of them cabin cruisers and small yachts, during the day.

At Mount Holly, N. J., a large barn was blown down by the gale, killing 17 head of cattle. Firemen rescued two men from the wreckage.

At Oakwood Beach, N. J., on the Delaware river, 300 persons were driven from their homes by the rising tides.

Near Salem, N. J., a steamer was whirled from its wharf and into the river, where it sunk several small craft and damaged half a dozen others.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23, (AP)—A second S O S call was sent out by the coastal steamer Madison shortly before noon, E.S.T.

The message, picked up by Mackay radio and by the United States coast guard, gave the position as 20 miles northeast of Chesapeake lightship, off the coast of Virginia, and said: "Housing breaking."

Deck Washed Away
The first distress signal at 7 a. m., which was followed by five hours of silence, said the entire forward deck house has been washed away.

The coast guard intercepted an answer to the second S O S from the S. S. Emilia, which did not give its position. The Emilia reported itself on the way to give assistance.

Other vessels on the way with aid were the coast guard cutter Carabasset and the coast guard destroyer Upshur.

Passengers Aboard
The Madison had 37 passengers and a crew of 50 to 60 aboard. Captain William Heath is in command.

Officials of the Eastern Steamship line, owners of the vessel, said the forward housing contained only apartments, and nothing vital to the operation of the ship.

The Madison left New York yesterday for Norfolk, Va.

RESCUE SHIP ON HAND
NEW YORK, Aug. 23, (AP)—A wireless message intercepted by the coast guard this afternoon said two coast guard vessels, the Puskar and the Carabasset, were alongside the liner Madison, in distress off the Virginia capes.

The three vessels were reported to be hoisted in heavy seas and a whole gale. Part of the main house of the Madison on the port side, the message said, was stove in, but the ship itself was reported as riding on an even keel.

Shipping men said the fact that the Madison was riding on an even keel and her damage was above the water line indicated she was riding out the storm. No advice from either of the coast guard vessels indicated whether anyone was hurt or lost.

VIOLENT STORM REPORTED
WASHINGTON, Aug. 23, (AP)—A violent storm, described variously by naval and weather bureau officials as of "hurricane" or near hurricane intensity, was reported by the bureau today to be sweeping inland from the Virginia capes on a generally northwesterly course.

Bureau officials estimated if the storm, which weaved a sinuous, shifting, snake-like course as it came up from the south, maintained its present northwesterly

Hurricane Feared
Although it left a trail of distressed shipping in its wake, weather bureau officials were of the opinion that its force would be considerably dissipated when it moved inland.

Nevertheless, R. H. Weightman, weather bureau forecaster, said the storm, which early today battered against the Virginia coast, had done the unusual for a disturbance originating in the tropics by striking north of Cape Hatteras with great intensity.

He said the disturbance was near "hurricane intensity," but that no winds had been reported to observers here as yet which could put it in that category.

However, at the navy department officials of the bureau of aeronautics asserted that at 8 a. m., E.S.T., the storm off the Virginia capes had reached "Force 10—the most severe recording of a storm." It was described as a "hurricane."

Jarrett was released unharmed an hour later. Friends paid \$200,000 for Urschel's release. He spent nine days, blindfolded and chained at night, in a farm house where he left evidence which may cost the lives of his abductors.

claimed were accepted by many Detroit bankers.

"The trouble with the Hoover philosophy is that he tried to cure the deplorable depression by pouring gold in at the top while people died at the bottom," he said.

Dwelling upon the local bank situation, the priest said he believed that no further aid would come to the Detroit banks until "men like Watkins (former police commissioner) enroute to Washington with petitions to reopen the banks stop wasting their money and time on petitions."

Bankers Lashed

HOOPER WITHDRAWALS
PALO ALTO, Calif., Aug. 23, (AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover, back from a fishing trip in the northern California mountains, today withdrew into the treasured privacy of his Stanford University home after announcing to investigators of the Detroit, Mich., banking collapse that his knowledge of the situation would not justify a trip to Detroit.

Mr. Hoover had been requested by Prosecutor Harry S. Toy of Detroit to appear as a witness at the investigation there into the closing of the First National Bank-Detroit, and the Guardian National Bank of Commerce.

Press dispatches telling of the request were shown to the former president who yesterday sent a telegram in reply explaining his position.

ing and shall not be restrained from joining or forced to join any union.

"These words (open and closed shop) Johnson said, "are not used in the recovery law and cannot be written into it. They have no agreed meaning and will be erased from the dictionary of the NRA."

"The plain meaning of section 7 (the collective bargaining provision) cannot be changed by any interpretation by anyone. It is the function of the administrator and the courts to apply and to interpret the law."

Deputy Administrator R. W. Lea reported automobile code negotiations were proceeding satisfactorily.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (AP)—The serious problem of shaping a final code of fair practice for bituminous coal again today overshadowed manifold activities of the recovery administration, but the only word of progress was that a "break might come any time," and that not only Administrator Hugh S. Johnson but President Roosevelt himself was keeping constant tabs on developments.

This word came from Deputy Administrator Kenneth M. Simpson, who handled the coal hearing.

Animosities Aired
While the coal conferences went on privately between officials, operators and labor leaders in separate offices, factions of retail trade began airing animosities in public hearings, advocating suppression of forms of competition denounced by witnesses as unfair.

A group of seamen representing the Marine Workers Industrial union and headed by A. H. Jones of Baltimore, arrived at the office of Johnson to present a demand for a code for ship crews, longshoremen and harbor workers.

Police Guard Removed
After a consultation outside Johnson's office, four spokesmen for the 200 men who came presented their statement to Edward F. McGrady, labor adviser to Johnson. The delegation also was received by Johnson, and the four sat around his desk and told their story.

There was no evidence of the unarmed police guard stationed for two days outside Johnson's office in expectation of the group, which had been labeled among police authorities as communistic. The delegation today denied any such affiliation.

KIDNAPING PLOT ENDS WITH DEATH

RHINELANDER, Wis., Aug. 23 (AP)—A trap laid by officers for plotters who attempted to extort \$5,000 from a wealthy hotel owner today counted its bag at one suspect killed and another in jail here.

Robert Rogers, 44, was shot to death by members of a sheriff's posse late yesterday when he attempted to pick up a package containing \$5,000 left on a highway near here. John Stokle, 33, his companion was captured.

The two men drove their automobile directly into the ambush prepared by officers after a letter demanding the money from George Goodreau, wealthy Mercer, Wis., hotel owner, had been intercepted.

Stokle, crazed with fear, crawled under the car but was hauled out, pleading for mercy. He told Chief of Police Maurice Straub of Rhineland, the chief said, they wanted money and "figured Goodreau was wealthy enough to give us that much" but later insisted he did not know of the plot.
