

EPIDEMIC IN MIDDLE WEST FATAL TO 27

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 24, (AP)—As the toll from the epidemic of "sleeping sickness" reached 27 in this city and its suburban communities, the puzzling disease was reported in another bordering state—Illinois.

Previously cases in Oklahoma and Kansas, as well as other Missouri towns, had been diagnosed as encephalitis, as the disease is known in medical circles, but the ones reported during the last 24 hours at Pekin and Pleasant Hill, Ill., are the first known in that state during the current outbreak.

New Cases Reported
The deaths of four persons here yesterday was the greatest number to succumb to the disease in one day during the epidemic which took its first victims July 30. It also surpassed the number of fatalities from the disease in the Spokane, Wash., outbreak of 1919-21 when nineteen lost their lives.

Nine new cases have been reported in St. Louis county and four in the city of St. Louis, bringing the total number since the epidemic started to 197. Meanwhile federal, state and city medical experts are concentrating their investigation in an attempt to find a cause and cure on the possibility that insects are suspected as being possible carriers of the infection.

Wounded Four Times
A few minutes later he appeared at the front, pale and near collapse. He said he had just discovered his wife's dead body in the bathtub.

There were four gaping wounds in the head.

Sheriff's investigators flatly declared she could not have fallen accidentally and been killed. Lamson himself insisted she had been slain.

More Blood Found
Location of other bloodstains in the house and on garments belonging to Lamson, the prosecution claimed, supported its theory that the intellectual sales manager killed his wife.

Around the question of motive much of the legal battle to save David Lamson's life and name will center.

The Lamsons, wed after a four-year campus romance, were known as the "perfect couple" of the university.

Prosecutor Allan Lindsay was expected to attack David's reputation as an always considerate and loving husband.

It was believed he would make much of physical evidence, allegedly supported by an oral admission to investigators by Lamson, that the wife, the night before she met death, used a subterfuge to repel her husband's advances, and that he slept in another room.

Divorce a Figure
In the background in Mrs. Sara Kelly, blonde divorcee of Sacramento, Lamson allegedly visited her. There are reports the prosecution will seek to prove the Lamsons quarreled bitterly over those visits. Mrs. Kelly says they were in connection with a syndicated gardening series for newspapers on which she and Lamson were collaborating.

Whether Prosecutor Lindsay would attempt to make Mrs. Kelly a central figure in attempting to establish a motive was a guarded secret of the prosecution.

New Witness Called
Mrs. S. P. Sorenson, mother-in-law of Delores Roberts Sorenson, one-time Lamson maid, today was subpoenaed by the state. It was indicated she would testify that Delores told her, prior to Mrs. Lamson's death, of quarrels in the Lamson household.

Delores herself is expected to testify for the defense that there was no strife or bitterness between her employers.

There was a minor clash between the defense and Sheriff Emig today. Rea filed a formal protest, accusing Emig of removing a congenial cell-partner from Lamson's cell, and replacing him with a person whom Rea said had not bathed for weeks, and who deliberately kept Lamson awake nights.

TOWNS WIPE OUT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24. (UP)—Fragmentary reports from the isolated eastern shore of Maryland told today of settlements wiped out, towns flooded and hundreds of boats destroyed by yesterday's storm. Six persons drowned in Baltimore and vicinity and two who were killed when a fast Pennsylvania and Southern railway train plunged into the eastern branch of the Potomac river near Washington were the only deaths reported from Maryland and the District of Columbia.

The train wreck injured 13 persons, two seriously, and tied up rail traffic for hours. A flood weakened trestle over the eastern branch, just inside the District of Columbia line, gave way as a crack passenger train passed over it at 3:45 a. m. The locomotive buried its nose in the mud. A deadhead coach, unoccupied, was submerged. Steel cars farther behind rolled over into the water but their occupants were able to crawl out through smashed windows.

East Scores First

The East scored first in the opening period when a quick kick by Roy Horstmann fullback, rolled to the West's five-yard line, and the East got the return punt on their rivals' 25-yard line.

Two passes, Gil Berry, Illinois, to Frank Baker, Northwestern, and Horstmann placed the ball on the eight-yard line. From here Horstmann plunged over the touchdown in three plays. Jack Manders, Minnesota, kicked goal.

The West tied the score on a blocked punt about the middle of the second period. Wes Feeler, Ohio State's all-American end of two years ago, dropped back from the East's 25-yard line to punt. He was up close, and Dave Nesbitt, University of Washington, came charging in from right end to block the attempt. The ball bounced off to the side, and Nesbitt scooped it up and ran for a touchdown, shaking off two tacklers who almost shoved him out of bounds on the five-yard line. Johnny Baker kicked goal, tying the score.

An intercepted pass by Jim Purvis, 1931 Purdue halfback, opened the way for the East's winning touchdown. With six minutes left to play, Purvis pulled one of Bill Beasley's passes out of the air and rap it back 10 yards to the West's 34-yard line. Newman slipped off tackle for 14 yards and then came the winning play—New-

man's five-yard pass to Ronzani, who scampered the remaining 13 yards for the touchdown.

West Outplayed

The statistics showed that the East gained 116 yards from scrimmage to the West's 96. The East attempted 22 passes and completed 10 for 53 yards. The West attempted 15 passes and completed only two for 20 yards. The East made nine first downs to the West's three. The total yardage gained was 199 for the East and 116 for the West. The West was penalized 65 yards to the East's 34.
