NECESSITY FOR SESSION SEEN BY LAWMAKER

In discussing a possible special session of the state legislature, Ralph W. Horan, representative from this district declared Thursday: "It seems that it will be absolutely necessary for the governor to call such a session before long to meet the relief situation which is rapidly becoming acute, and to make adequate plans for revenue to match federal funds for relief purposes."

"There are other important questions that are facing the state at present and I believe that these should be thrashed out by the legislature. One of them is the need for legislation to govern the sale of liquor when actual repeal goes into effect, and the other is in regard to the bus and truck bill."

"It is my opinion," Horan concluded, "that the program for any special session should be outlined and held exactly to such a limit in order to facilitate action and to save time."

Members of the county court expressed themselves unofficially Thursday as being favorable toward a special session, emphasizing the need for speedy action for relief.

Members of the administrative offices of the county relief committee declared that they were in favor of some type of sales tax to raise revenue to match federal funds for relief. They believe that putting the burden of relief upon the state instead of upon communities will eventually work out the situation, do away with a virtual dole system, and be of assistance in providing work programs instead of direct relief for unemployed.

UTILITIES RATES INCREASE BANNED

SALEM, Aug. 24 (AP)—No increase in present rates of public utilities by reason of the NRA code will be permitted in Oregon except upon showing that general law of regulation requires it. Charles M. Thomas, public utilities commissioner, telegraphed in answer to inquiries from New York.

Thomas was asked what the action of the Oregon commission would be if earnings are reduced below a fair and reasonable return because of federal regulations under the NRA.

"Regulation in Oregon is non-existent on account of no attempt having been made through-out the years to fix rate bases and establish rates thereon, therefore any application to increase rates places commissioner in position where he is unable to determine from any facts whatsoever whether application should be approved," the commissioner continued.
