

WORLD BENEFIT FROM NRA PLAN SEEN BY JAPAN

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 24 (AP)—Success of national recovery efforts now being made by the Roosevelt administration will lead to world-wide economic recovery, Prince Iyesato Tokugawa, retired president of the Japanese house of peers, declared in an address here late today.

"I am deeply impressed by the courage, wisdom and patriotism of your nation," the rotund and genial prince continued. "Japan, for one, cannot stand indifferent in your efforts for common prosperity, because of the interdependence of our modern international life."

On Pleasure Trip

Retired after 25 years as head of the upper house of the imperial diet, Prince Tokugawa arrived today for a leisurely pleasure journey around the world. He was to leave tonight by train for Chicago.

As president of the American-Japan society of Tokyo and an exponent of international peace, the prince planned a series of informal conferences with international leaders during his journey.

"The world is now facing a difficult situation in its political, economic and social life," the prince told his audience. "Japan is not excepted. In the Far East, political chaos and social upheaval are threatening the structure of our national life."

Understanding Needed

"There is urgent necessity for mutual understanding between nations in order to bring about a new order of international life and human progress. An encouraging factor is that the United States and Japan are bound by solid and growing ties of commercial relations."

After recalling commercial and cultural relations between the United States and Japan, Prince Tokugawa said:

"I believe that the new era of the Pacific will dawn with a new conception of civilization where the cultures of the east and west will meet in harmony. I assure you the endeavors of the Japanese people in the Far East rest with the maintenance of peace and the stabilization of our life, political, economic and social. But that endeavor will not be an easy task unless the other nations, especially America, understand the situation and cooperate with us in the same spirit."

SAPIRO RELEASED IN TOMBS COURT

NEW YORK, Aug. 25, (AP)—Aaron Sapiro, lawyer, was discharged in Tombs court today on a charge of being a fugitive from Chicago, and was immediately re-arrested at request of Chicago authorities, who said a new indictment had been returned against him in the Illinois city.

The new indictment superceded the one on which Sapiro was arrested last month and held in \$1,500 bail for extradition proceedings. Under the first indictment, which named Sapiro and 24 others, including Al Capone, all were charged with bombing, acid throwing and restraint of legitimate trade through terrorism.

PINE ASSOCIATION SHOWS SLIGHT GAIN

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 25, (AP)—A slight gain in new business in the western pine country for the week ending Aug. 19 compared with the previous week, was reported by the Western Pine association today. New business totaled 38,088,000 feet, 4 per cent above the week before, but about 26 per cent under the three-year weekly average for August.

Shipments were 44,155,000 feet and production 59,377,000 feet, putting production at 35.9 per cent of capacity compared with 34.7 per cent for the previous week, and 29.1 per cent for the year to date.

Current orders were 27 per cent of sawmill capacity.

Lindberghs Resting At Shetland Isles

LEWICK, Shetland Islands, Aug. 25, (AP)—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh decided today to remain in the Shetlands until tomorrow. With his wife, he arrived yesterday from the Faroe Islands, completing another leg of their air-mapping flight across the North Atlantic.

BAKER MURDERER STILL AT LARGE

BAKER, Aug. 25, (AP)—State, county and city officers continued their search today for the slayer of Mrs. A. Koehler, whose mutilated body was found Thursday morning in the yard of her home here, but had not found any clues at noon.

Officers are investigating two or three suspects but no arrests have been made. Twelve hobos taken into custody Thursday on the theory that they might be in a position to throw some light on the slaying were released Thursday evening.

An inquest into the murder will be held this afternoon.

Mrs. Koehler, wife of a Baker physician and prominent church worker, was shot twice and hacked with an ax by the slayer, who is believed to have stolen several dollars from the home of the elderly woman after committing the murder.

Fire Prevention Code Proposed At Salem Debated

SALEM, Aug. 25, (AP)—Charges that the proposed fire prevention code before the city council would prove ruinous to many businesses and that insurance rate reductions promised if the code were made law would eventually be evaded, were flung by attorneys and businessmen at a public hearing here last night.
