(AP)—The Oregon Pulp & Paper company here yesterday raised common labor wages to 40 cents an hour, those of other employees 10 per cent and put in a 36-hour week in some sections of the plant, in keeping with the N. R. A. Prior to yesterday's increase, common laborers at the mill had been receiving 33 cents an hour. Two 10 per cent wage cuts had been restored between June 1 and yesterday.
