

TURKEY FLOCK SHIFTED TO GEARY RANCH

Fifty-five hundred turkeys which have been feeding on hordes of grasshoppers on the Klamath Marsh, will have a change of diet within the next few days and will devour other varieties of the hopping pests on the Geary ranch on Wocum and Caledonia marshes on Upper Klamath Lake.

The turkeys are being shipped to Klamath Falls in trucks by Giffin and Reynolds, prominent turkey growers from Colorado.

The partners came to Oregon this spring, and purchased their turkeys at Tangent, Ore., shipping them later to the Big Marsh to feed on hoppers. Giffin and Reynolds had found this method of feeding very successful in Colorado and ridged several localities of similar pests by feeding them to the turkeys.

The birds will feed on the Geary land during the fall, and later be killed here for Thanksgiving and Christmas markets.

FRENCH DELAY ACCEPTANCE OF WHEAT ACCORD

LONDON, Aug. 25. (AP)—A last-minute hitch delayed the signing today of an international wheat agreement after it had been announced. Importing nations had accepted tariff and price provisions which had stood in the way of the accord.

The official explanation was that delay had occurred in the preparation of the French text of the agreement, the purpose of which is to associate importing countries with a broad program to boost prices by cutting production and stimulating consumption.

The wheat conference, delegates to which had been scheduled to sign the agreement late this afternoon, adjourned until 8:30 o'clock tonight.

LONDON, Aug. 25. (AP)—The international wheat conference conquered tariff and price difficulties today by arriving at a final agreement, which ties in broad importing nations with a wheat program designed to boost the price of the grain by cutting production and stimulating consumption.

The chief barrier to this agreement had been the question of how high the price of wheat must go before the importers would lower their tariffs. This problem was met by a compromise.

'CUBA SET IN ORDER BY NEW PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25. (AP)—Farm administrators expressed delight today at word from London that a final agreement had been reached at the international wheat conference.

They withheld official comment, however, pending formal signing of the agreement and until they had analyzed provisions added in the last 24 hours.

Informally, nevertheless, they expressed opinion it would be acceptable to them and in complete harmony with their program for adjusting American wheat acreage downward under the voluntary domestic allotment plan.

PROVISIONAL USE OF NRA PERMITTED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25. (AP)—A provisional use of the Blue Eagle insignia by stores and factories claiming special hardships would be wrought them by full compliance with the president's agreement was decreed today by the recovery administration.

Thomas S. Hammond, executive director of the N. R. A. campaign division, ruled a white stripe with the word "provisional" printed upon it should be pasted across the Blue Eagle in such establishments pending decision on whether the assumption asked would be accepted.

After decision, either the bar may be removed or the eagle will have to be taken down.

HAVANA, Aug. 25. (AP)—Taking a firm grip on power, provisional president De Cespedes today issued a decree wiping out all vestiges of the ousted Machado regime, dissolving congress, and calling new elections for Feb. 24, 1934.

The measure, signed with the cabinet's approval and effective immediately, declared unconstitutional the Machado administration and its acts since May 20, 1925, when Gerardo Machado was inaugurated president for a second term.

Housecleaning Demanded

All international obligations are to be observed, however, even though contracted since that date.

The action followed a widespread clamor for a thorough housecleaning of the regime that fell two weeks ago.

It was taken over the opposition of United States Ambassador Sumner Welles who, in his capacity as mediator, has maintained that it is necessary to continue constitutional forms.

Secretary of Justice Carlos Saladrigas pointed out that although the government maintained Machado acquired power through a virtual coup d'etat and hence unconstitutional, all foreign obligations contracted by Machado and all legislation passed in the last four years would be considered as "things done" and therefore still in effect.
