

Bronc Coach In Action Again

Clipper Smith invents new football phrases. "Fibre-phobia" claimed most original addition to Gridiron Vocabulary. Herb Owens visits Klamath Falls. Helen Jacobs plays on, despite illness.



Clipper Smith, head man down at Santa Clara, where his wild broncos prepare for another raid along the Pacific coast, has developed a completely new set of football phrases. Clipper, a product of the north-west, brought something new to gridiron publicity last year with his multiple spin and his elevator pass.

He used both plays—and each defied description—against Prink Callison's Oregonians on Hayward field last October. They gave the Web-foot a tremendous headache, but, recalling Oregon's victory, they were a little less effective than Prink Callison's own ideas about offense.

The celebrated football linguist from the south has turned his vocabulary to another field this year. He has invented what is known as "fibre-phobia."

Fibre-phobia becomes a very gentle manner of saying quite a lot. It does, however, take a little interpretation.

Fibre is something very durable, of course, and in the case of football it is the material used as protective material for the player's uniform.

It's tough and solid and none too pleasant when someone rubs into it in a tackle.

Phobia is Smith's own substitute for the understandable noun "fear."

Hence, fibre-phobia would indicate a player a bit reluctant to rough it up under the threat of injury.

Well, whatever fibre-phobia might be, it certainly is a way of avoiding the vulgarity of the phrase "no guts."

Herb Owens, appearing a little stout and prosperous, was in Klamath Falls Sunday after dropping down to Lakeview to see the roundup. Herb, as every follower of athletics can recall, was promoter for the Klamath Falls boxing commission before Mack Lillard.

Owens has taken over the professional sports for commissions in two cities, Eugene and Salem, and has one of the wrestling licenses at Portland.

Judging from his new—able and his general optimism, things can't have been very difficult for the ex-Klamath man.

Many, many words have been in comment upon the abrupt termination of the Helen Willis Moody-Helen Jacobs match for the tennis championship of the United States.

Mrs. Moody, seven times champion, defaulted her match in the midst of the final battle at Forest Hills.

A sprained back bothering the ex-champion all season, she held responsible all her ailments, and, despite the criticisms she has received, Mrs. Moody probably was wise in withdrawing.

There is no use in encouraging permanent injury for the sake of the "never-say-die" spirit in athletics.

But little has been said about Helen Jacobs, who is a real champion if there ever was one. Miss Jacobs probably would have defeated Mrs. Moody without the default.

Few persons have taken the time to comment on Miss Jacobs' own condition before the match. She had been advised to discontinue tournament play by her physician.

She generally ran down and her heart was "acting up" under the strain of championship play.

She continued, however, even when she was probably as ill as Mrs. Moody.

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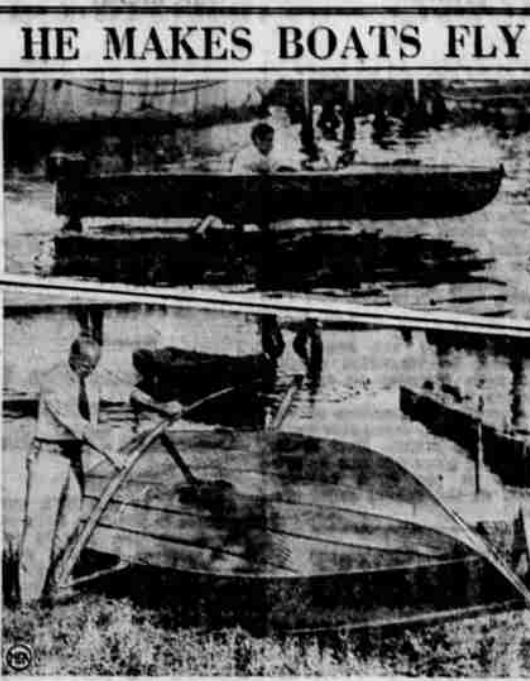
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HE MAKES BOATS FLY



A thin metal band underneath a motorboat, on which the craft lifts itself and skates across the water as on a stilt, has been designed by Dr. Oskar G. Oregon's finest boxer, Ah Wing Lee, the Portland Chinese, will come to the Legion hall Friday night to meet Frankie Monroe of Klamath Falls at the top of a fight program studded with the names of outstanding pugilists.

The Chinese athlete, an ex-University of Oregon student, will arrive in Klamath Falls Thursday. It is possible he may give a public exhibition before Friday's bout.

The stock car event was won by Al Miller of Detroit driving an Essex Terraplane 55 1/2 seconds, breaking the old record of 21 minutes 20 seconds. His brother, Chet Miller, also driving a Terraplane, was second.

STARS HOLDING TO COAST LEAD

Hollywood Is One Game in Front of Angels; Portland Splits.

Labor Day double headers left the Coast league pennant situation unchanged, with Hollywood still stepping along a game ahead of Los Angeles.

Truett Sewell of the last place Indians stole the holiday spotlight, hurling Seattle to a double victory over San Francisco, 9-5 and 3-0. He granted but seven hits in the 14 innings he pitched.

Joe Dimaggio, Carl Sever and Bruce Cunningham of the Seas and Joe Cocaret, "Junk" Walters and McLarney of the Indians hit for the circuit in the opener. San Francisco walked off with the nine-game series, 7-2.

Stars Recover

After being decimated 3-2 by Sacramento in the opener, Hollywood recovered to take the nightcap by the same score with San Francisco.

First baseman Dan Crowley driving in the winning run with a sixth inning single. Tony Borja's four bagger and Lou Vinci on base accounted for the Solon victory in the opener. Hollywood took the series, 7-1.

Pounding the ball in true holiday fashion, the Angels slugged their way to a 12-3 victory in the first game at Portland, and then wilted before the four-hit tossing of Sad Sam Gibson to drop the second game, 5-1. Jigger State, Los Angeles outfielder, hit a double and pair of singles in each game.

Pay Thomas granted nine hits in the opener, while the Angels' Hal Turpin and Jack Wilson for 17. The single labor day win gave the Angels the series, 5-3.

Trimming the Missions 16-6 and 5-1 in Monday's twin bill, Hollywood squared through to a 5-4 series triumph. The opener was loosely played, with the Missions booting four chances and the Oaks two. Only one Oak failed to hit safely as the Broaker men battered Johnny Babich, Dutch Leiber and Italo Chelini for 19 blows. Clarence Fieber was in great form, as he checked the Reds with six scattered bingles in the second game.

AVIATRIX KILLED AT CHICAGO RACES

CHICAGO, Sept. 5. (AP)—Tragedy marked the close of the International Air races. Florence Klingensmith, possessor of the woman's loop-the-loop airplane record, was the victim. She was killed while flying at 200 miles an hour in yesterday's Phillips \$15,000 trophy race.

The airplane, owned by Arthur Knapp of Jackson, Mich., plunged to earth a half mile from the flying field after the ship's tail was seen to tip as it passed the grand stand. Miss Klingensmith had completed seven laps for a total distance of about 60 miles of the 100 mile track when the mishap occurred.

PARIS, Sept. 5. (UP)—Henri Cochet, great French tennis star, recently turned professional, will meet Bill Tilden in a match at Autouil, September 22, 23 and 24, and in the United States in January, according to an official report published by L'Intransigeant.

GIANTS READY FOR PIRATES

Pittsburgh Makes Bid for Leadership in National.

The National league drama moved into Forbes field in Pittsburgh as Bill Terry's Giants swung west for the last time this year, with at least two of the first division trailers hanging doggedly to what little chance remains of catching the leader.

Duplicating the stirring scene that prevailed as the Giants battered back the bid of 4 and 5 to 2, another last week, the Pirates mustered every ounce of strength for the five-game series that will tell their tale for this season.

Reds Heaten Once

The Pirates made ready for the "crucial" conflict by edging in one game with Cincinnati before the rain poured down. Hal Smith turned in another of the masterful pitching performances the Pirates have been getting lately, winning 1 to 0 over St. Johnson as Pie Traynor's single, a sacrifice and a safe bet by the rejuvenated Tommy Thevenow scored the lone marker in the ninth.

The Cubs disposed of St. Louis' twin aces, Dixie Dean and Tex Carleton, to win both halves of a double header.

In the second game, the Cubs won 4 to 1, as Guy Lush pitched shut-out ball for seven frames.

A line drive from Pepper Martin's bat almost tore one of Lush's stanchions away in the seventh, and probably weakened him in the eighth, when five Cardinal singles counted for four runs before the Mississippi mudcat recovered and squelched the uprising.

Charley Root had all the better of the second game, allowing but four hits, two of them homers by Jim Collins and Carleton, for the only Card scores. Gabby Hartnett's homer with a man on in the sixth accounted for the winning run.

The only activities in the American league that escaped the holiday downpour were double-headers in Detroit and Cleveland. The Tigers took two from the White Sox, 5 to 2 and 5 to 4, while Walter Johnson's courageous Indians twice beat the St. Louis Browns, 3 to 2 and 2 to 0, behind steady pitching behind Hildebrand and Clint Brown.

Hank Greenberg's thumping, including a home run, gave Detroit two clusters of four runs each in the first two innings of the opener, more than enough with Vic Sorrell pitching four-hit ball. Fred Marberry came in in the eighth in time to save the second game for Eldon Auker after he had blanked the Sox for six innings in a duel with Ted Lyons.

Maratos Takes Rye Road Race In Fast Time

RYE, N. Y., Sept. 5. (UP)—Clio Maratos of the Greek-American A. C., Monday won the 16th annual Rye Community five-mile road race, although Juan Carlos Zabala of Argentina, the Olympic marathon champion, who was running from scratch, turned in the fastest time.

Maratos, starting with a 4 minute 15 second handicap, finished in 25:39, while Zabala, last man off, picked up on the field of 34 and finished 10th in 25:47.

Alfred Schilling of the German-American A. C. was second in 29:13, and Vincent Novakowski, Interstate Sport club, was third in 29:19.

The race was run over a wet, slippery course that had been soaked by an all-night downpour. After the race Zabala was presented with a silver cup by Mayor Livingston Platt for turning in the best time of the day.

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
