

RECOVERY ACT RELATION TO FARM OUTLINED

Arthur M. Geary, accompanied by his father and mother, Dr. and Mrs. Edward P. Geary and his brother, Roland W. Geary all of Portland, were visitors over the week-end holiday with Mr. and Mrs. Edward A. Geary on Wocus ranch.

Arthur Geary, as attorney for the Farm Rate Council for the Mountain Pacific Northwest, and the Livestock Shippers' Traffic League, spent several months in Washington, D. C., this spring and summer transacting business relative to freight rates, the N. R. A. and agriculture adjustment administration work. Relative to these matters Mr. Geary says:

"An important issue raised in operation under the N. R. A. and agricultural adjustment act is that of farm versus democracy. This issue crops out in the proposed set up for the livestock and meat industries, as well as in many others. Are the well organized, corn belt meat packers with their scattered branches to dominate the industry, or are the stockmen themselves, through representative regional committees, working in cooperation with regional associations of packers with national coordination through the secretary of agriculture, to have the carrying out of plans for rehabilitation and stabilization?"

"The American people," continued Mr. Geary, "will not in the long run stand for the drift toward fascism, which is the domination of each industry by a few."

"It also happens that each section of the country has its own problems, and too great a domination from national headquarters is likely to work unfavorably and less effectively for the Pacific slope," Geary concluded, in speaking of the present situation.
