

CROWDS FLOCK TO SALEM FOR OREGON FAIR

SALEM, Sept. 6. (AP)—Cooler weather with promise of a few showers crowded onto the program day at the state fair today, but gave little promise to interfere with the scheduled events. Salem business houses were closed at noon to permit an even greater attendance than was expected at the opening day Monday, while a special train brought Roseburg and Umpqua valley visitors to the grounds early.

The racing program continued to lead the interest at the grounds as far as entertainment was concerned, despite the heavy rains of yesterday, while the exhibits were viewed by about 10,000 who braved the precipitation. Most of this crowd, however, were children, who apparently cared little about getting wet.

Races Attract Many

Wagering at the races did not fall off proportionately with the attendance, as more than \$2,500 was paid into the betting window. The peak of collections on one number reached \$2.66 yesterday while several other events paid more than the high mark of \$10.80 the opening day. It was expected betting on today's races would reach a new high enthusiasm as "playing the horses" was on the up-grade.

Despite the heavy track no mishaps occurred to mar the running of the six races, and all of the contests proved thrilling. Seven races, featured by the mayor's derby, were on the program today.

Judging continued in all departments yesterday with boys' and girls' club activities predominating. Approximately 2500 youngsters are competing in these contests of which more than 500 are housed on the fair grounds.

Future Farmers Win

Twenty teams, representing as many counties, competed in the livestock judging contest in the boys' and girls' club department. The Clackamas county team finished first. The Portland team was first in the poultry judging contest, and another team from Portland first in the rabbit-judging match.

In the future farmers and dads livestock judging contest, 45 boys won over their dads.

SALEM, Sept. 6. (AP)—Aims and purposes of the N. R. A., with a six minute technical display, will mark the close of the 72nd Oregon state fair at the conclusion of the night program in the stadium promptly at 10 o'clock.

DRIVERS RUSH FOR LICENSES AT COURTHOUSE

About 200 motor car operators are being licensed each day in the southern Oregon district by Ward McReynolds, state license examiner who ended his regular semi-monthly visit to Klamath Falls Wednesday afternoon.

Because of Labor Day, McReynolds and his assistant carried on examinations for only two days instead of the usual three this week. He will return here again for three days, September 18, 19 and 20.

"Between 35 and 50 per cent of all applicants receiving licenses are people who have never before had an Oregon operator's license," McReynolds said. "An even 50 per cent of all applications filed in Klamath Falls Tuesday were operators with licenses from other states."

McReynolds urged all drivers who have not yet applied for a renewal of their drivers' license to obtain a blank from the sheriff's office, city police or state police office and make application at once.

"Officers are making a check-up for the new operator's licenses and after the heavy rush of applications to get in under the September 1 deadline is cleaned up, officers are expected to clamp down on those who have not complied with the Oregon law," McReynolds stated.

K. I. D. BUDGET APPROVED FOR COMING SEASON

Water assessments under the Klamath Irrigation District for 1934 will not be raised above the levy charged this year, which was the lowest ever budgeted, according to A. L. Crawford, secretary.

The budget for the 1934 assessments was approved by the board of directors at a regular meeting Tuesday afternoon. For the coming year operating and maintenance assessments will amount to 63 cents per acre. The general assessment will amount to 16 cents an acre.

In addition to the operating and maintenance and general charges a construction charge which differs in various districts will be added. The total levy which is practically the same as the 1933 levy amounts to \$60,000, Crawford stated.

Last year a moratorium on construction charges was granted which amounted to approximately \$32,000. Crawford said the board was not expecting a moratorium this year from the government because of the raise in prices of farm products.

"The average levy of the district since it was organized in 1919 until two years ago amounted to \$3.27 per acre," Crawford said.

Other routine business matters were cared for at the meeting Tuesday.
