THIS month of September has been set aside all over the nation as Automobile Accident Prevention Month.

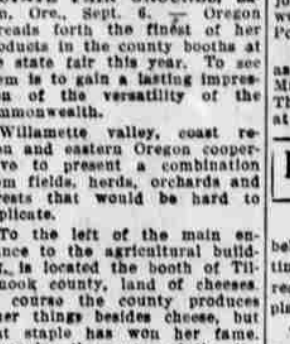
