

TAX LEAGUE HOLDS FIRST FALL MEETING

A committee composed of B. E. Grigsby, John Hessler and W. C. Townsend, appointed by the president of the Klamath County Taxpayers' League to make investigations into the district attorney's office and the justice of the peace office, made its report at the first fall meeting of the league Wednesday evening.

An investigation by District Attorney T. R. Gillenwaters into the justice of the peace court records was made exclusively for his own office and was not intended for public filing, the committee reported.

Grigsby said the county court had informed the committee Judge W. B. Barnes was paying \$50 per month to apply on an alleged shortage in his department.

Inquiring into the nature of the alleged shortage, Gillenwaters said there had been a misunderstanding over the amount of certain fees Judge Barnes

was allowed and it was being straightened up after the uncertainty was settled by his office.

E. B. Ashurst, manager of the district office of the Farmers Loan corporation, gave a detailed explanation of the workings of the corporation and how loans would be handled.

A. G. Morrison, secretary of the league, made a comparative report of reductions he had made in operating expenses of the county poor farm.

Semi-annual statements of various county office holders were also reviewed at the meeting which was very well attended and gave signs of an active future for the league during the coming months, John Irwin, president, stated.

Firemen Quench Dangerous Blaze

A threatening grass fire which started on Conner avenue and spread its way through the dry, tinder-like grass to California avenue, finally swept up over the hill into Ewanna Heights addition shortly before noon Thursday. No property damage resulted from the blaze, according to reports from the fire station.

Crews from the fire department with the booster pump on the rearview engine went into action and prevented the fire from wreaking havoc upon houses in that addition.

LUMBER CONTROL CLAUSE IN EFFECT

The production control clause of the lumber code officially became effective September 1 in the Western Pine division upon announcement by David T. Mason, manager of the Western Pine association at Portland that the association's board of directors has allocated to each concern which wishes to operate a maximum of 525 hours of sawmill operation for September, October and November. This action was taken following allocation to the division by the lumber code authority of a production quota of 750,000,000 feet for the three months' period beginning September 1.

"This allotment of hours is equivalent to approximately 40 hours per week for 12 weeks; however, in this allotment of total hours there is no limitation upon any concern as to the distribution of its plant operation during the three-month period so long as the 525 hours is not exceeded; but it should be fully understood that this allotment of sawmill hours in no way affects the rules relating to maximum hours for employees," Mason said. "Notification will be given if a change is made by the code authority or if it becomes evident later that the total hours may safely be increased or that a decrease is necessary," according to the announcement.
