AMERICAN NET STARS BEATEN

National Meet Final to Be All British Affair

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 9 (UP)—Before the largest crowd ever to watch a tennis competition in this country, the United States, whose net empire once embraced all the courts of the earth, today was reduced to a third rate power.

The British Empire's two ranking players—Jack Crawford of Australia and Fred Perry of England—gained the final round of the men's national tennis championship. With more than 15,000 spectators in the Forest Hills stadium, the invaders overwhelmed America's last two survivors in straight sets.

Crawford, playing with the magical touch that carried him to victory in the Wimbledon, French and Australian championships, defeated Frank Shields of New York, 7-5, 6-4, 6-3. Perry, playing the lashing sort of game that enabled him to win the Davis cup for England almost single handed, swept aside Lester Stiefen of California, 6-3, 6-2, 6-3.

The defeat of the Americans today produced the first all-foreign final the tournament has seen since 1926 when Jean Borotra and Rene La Coe of France dominated the final bracket. Today's sweep also completed the 1933 route of America's tennis on all international fronts.

The victories of Perry and Crawford today were decisive. Perry required but 45 minutes to blast Stiefen off the premises, and Crawford was in the club house receiving congratulations 90 minutes after he took the court against Shields.

Stiefen swamped Perry's victory according to veteran critics, was the easiest ever scored in the round of four. Stiefen, the man many experts have picked as the next big power in American tennis, was so helpless in the face of Perry's devastating attack as to be pathetic. After the first six games of the opening set the giant Californian folded completely. His forehead, usually a lethal weapon, could not keep a ball in the court, and his backhand, which Perry peppered unmercifully, was a severe handicap.

CARL HUBBELL WINS FOR N. Y., PIRATE TITLE HOPES DIMMED

Carl Hubbell's already famous ability to pitch his best when the going gets tough once more had enthroned him as New York's baseball idol and had virtually wiped out the pennant hopes of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Driven to cover and beaten in the first game of the important series between the Pirates and the league leading Giants, Hubbell came back Friday to defeat the Bucs 2 to 1 in the fifth and final clash and send the Giants on to Cincinnati with a 6 1/2 game lead.

Title Hopes Fade
The Pirates won three of the five games, but their failure to take the final clash left them with only faint pennant hopes and installed the Chicago Cubs as the next big threat to the Giants. While the Pirates lost, the Cubs beat the Boston Braves again, 8-3, and climbed into a virtual tie for second place. Next week the Giants have to tackle a six-game series at Chicago.

The fourth place St. Louis Cardinals swept their series with the Phillies by winning 6 to 5 despite Chuck Klein's 27th homer. Siles Johnson, Cincinnati pitcher, finally found the victory he had been seeking since May 26, holding Brooklyn to six hits to win 12 to 0.

Washington's Senators avenged Thursday's defeat and maintained their 8 1/2 game lead in the American league by walloping the hapless Chicago White Sox 11 to 2 to give Al Crowder his 22nd mound victory. The New York Yankees kept pace by beating the St. Louis Browns 5 to 3 when Russ Van Atta, recently recovered from an attack of "flu," pitched four-hit ball.

Jimmie Fox's 42nd home run of the season and "Sugar" Cain's six-hit flinging aided the Philadelphia Athletics to a 9-2 victory over the Cleveland Indians, their third straight. The Detroit Tigers took two decisions from the Boston Red Sox, each 4 to 3.
