Two Balloonists Found in Remote Canadian Region

Two American balloonists were found today in a remote section of Canada, weak and ill from a week's hardships, but only about 500 miles from their starting point in Chicago.

Poland's team of war heroes, Captain Franciszek and Lieutenant Zybigniew Burzyski, landed near Riviere a Pierre, northwest of Quebec, in a Canadian wilderness. Like the American team of Ward T. Van Orman and Frank A. Trotter, found today, they had wandered for days before reaching civilization.

Van Orman's distance in the Goodyear IX appeared to have won third place. Second place evidently went to Lieutenant Commander T. G. W. Settle and Charles H. Kendall, who manned the United States naval balloon.
