

KLAMATH-LAKE ENDEAVORS TO MEET OCT. 5

The fourth annual Klamath-Lake Christian Endeavor union convention will be one of the outstanding events of the coming fall. Executives of the union have been busy during the past few weeks working out one of the most unique programs to be put on by the local unit.

F. R. HARRISON TALK INFLATION

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12, (AP)—President Roosevelt interrupted his conference on finance today to receive an ardent recommendation from Chairman Harrison of the senate finance committee for "rational inflation."

"Commodity prices have got to go up," Senator Harrison said. "I favor some form of rational inflation. We have got to do more than we are doing. This will help the bankers and the farmers and the latter are the ones who really need help just now."

The finance chairman declined to discuss what President Roosevelt indicated in their lengthy conference.

The threat of a counter-revolution led by the 300 army and navy officers, ejected last week during the bloodless rebellion of enlisted men, further endangered the new cabinet of Provisional President Ramon Grau San Martin. The cabinet was sworn in today.

The officers, chief and bitter opponents of the new administration, remained "interned" at the National hotel. They took command of the elevators, deserted by the ordinary workers, and sought to aid the management during the crisis caused by their occupation of the hotel for the last three days.

They held continuous sessions, upbraiding the enlisted men's revolt and denouncing the present regime. Soldiers on patrol outside kept an eye on this opera bouffe proceeding, but made no effort to arrest the officers or place the hotel under a siege of any kind, as related in published reports abroad.

Drop In Collection Of Income Tax Seen

SALEM, Sept. 12, (AP)—A drop of \$500,000 to \$500,000 in collections of personal income, intangibles and corporate excises taxes for the 1932 tax roll as compared to 1931 is predicted by the state tax commission.

Records of the commission show that personal income and intangible taxes were assessed for the year 1931, payable last year, in the amount of \$1,641,553. The 1932 assessment, payable this year, totaled \$993,493, of which \$647,826 was paid up to Sept. 1.

Northwest Lumber Meetings Arranged

SEATTLE, Sept. 12, (AP)—A west coast lumber code bulletin issued today announced industry meetings on the lumber code in Tacoma, Portland and Eugene, September 13, 14 and 15, and contained log allocations for the month of September in the Puget Sound, Columbia river and Grays harbor districts.

The log allocations are the first made under lumber code machinery and were drawn up by the production committee of the Pacific Northwest Loggers' association.

JUDICIAL REFORM STUDIED

SALEM, Sept. 12, (AP)—A committee of 15 men, including seven laymen, was appointed by Governor Julius L. Meier today to consider proposals for reform in judicial procedure to meet changing conditions in the state, and to recommend these changes to the state legislature. Richard Montague of Portland was named chairman of this committee.

Idaho and New Mexico vote on September 19. Although Idaho is a veteran among the dry states and the home of Senator William E. Borah, outstanding prohibitionist, reports from there indicate a wet victory. New Mexico, also once considered a prohibition state, also is reported to be leaning strongly towards repeal.

LUMBER COMPANY REBUILDS FACTORY

WILLOW RANCH, Calif.—With the construction of a new box factory plant here by the Crane Creek Lumber company, starting here this week, this little town has taken a new lease on life, since its activities are centered around the local wood-working establishment.

Several weeks ago the box factory burned to the ground from a fire of unknown origin. Since that time two other towns besides this one, Alturas, Calif., and Lakeview, Ore., have sought the re-establishment of the plant within their limits. The local lumber company decided to replace their plant here, since its sawmill is located nearby on Laasen creek, and the company owns its railroad from the woods plant to this place.

Since establishment here in 1929, the Crane Creek Lumber company has suffered two major fire losses, once in 1929, when a forest fire swept away its woods camp, and again a few weeks ago, when the local box factory plant went up in smoke with an approximate \$100,000 loss.

Miss Meta C. Boutin, secretary of the Crane Creek Lumber company, and local manager, states that construction of the new plant will be rushed to completion, some of the machinery being already on the ground.

Supreme Court Ready To Hear Jordan Appeal

SALEM, Sept. 12, (AP)—Arguments of attorneys in the case of Theodore Jordan, negro, who is under death sentence for the slaying of a Southern Pacific Pullman conductor at Klamath Falls, are scheduled to be heard this week by the state supreme court.

Jordan appealed his first degree murder conviction from the Klamath county circuit court. He has remained in the state penitentiary here pending outcome of the appeal.

Oregon Included In Public Works Employment Plan

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12, (AP)—The public works administration allotted \$150,000 to the department of agriculture today for replacement of river gages in 33 states, creating jobs for about 1,200 men.

Each gage will cost about \$1,000. The weather bureau now is investigating its flood-warning service to determine where replacements will be made.

Among states receiving new gages are: Oregon 6, Idaho 4.

INCREASE EXPECTED

SALEM, Sept. 12, (AP)—An increase over last year is expected in the enrollment of freshmen at Willamette University, the registrar's office stated today. Freshmen will enroll Sept. 18, and returning students Sept. 20.

SEA SCOUTS MAKE CRUISE ON LAKE

The Sea Scouts made their fifth cruise of the season on Upper Klamath lake over the past week-end, embarking from the Oregon Boat company dock at 9 o'clock Saturday evening. This night cruise was a new experience for the scouts.

They arrived at Eagle Ridge about 11:30 o'clock where they spent the night, and early Sunday morning went across the lake to Modoc Point where they were met by W. E. Lamm of the Lamm Lumber company and N. Y. Stoddard, superintendent of the company, who took the boys to the rifle range for two hours of target practice, providing the rifles and ammunition.

Ed DeLap was high in the shoot, making 46 out of a possible 50 at 200 yards. Charles LeVeque and Lawrence Bergmann tied for second place with 45 and Jeff Linville and Oscar Berglund tied for third with 44. In the shoot-off of ties for second and third place, LeVeque took second place and Bergmann third.

The boys making the trip were Ed DeLap, Bruce Lazotte, Jeff Linville, Oscar Berglund, Lawrence Bergmann, Charles LeVeque and James Taylor. Two more cruises are planned before the end of the fall season. With the start of school it is expected more recruits will join the Sea Scouts. WESTERN STATES SESSION CALLED

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 12, (AP)—State and regional public works administration officials of eight western states will meet here next Sunday. It was announced today, with four representatives of the national administration at Washington.

The purpose of the conference, it was explained, is to facilitate cooperation between state and federal officials in the public works program.

Attending the conference will be: Justus S. Wardell of San Francisco and Marshall Dana of Portland, regional public works advisors for western states, and members of the state advisory boards and engineers from Arizona, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah and Washington.

Theory Of Murder Investigated In Death At Astoria

ASTORIA, Ore., Sept. 12, (AP)—A theory that an elderly woman whose body was found on the shore of the Columbia river here Saturday had met with foul play was advanced today by police who have not yet succeeded in establishing her identity.

A cut above the right eye and bruises on the head led officers to believe, they said, that the woman, slight and white-haired, had met with violence. Coroner Hanson said he inclined to the opinion that the wounds had been inflicted before the woman entered the river.

Indian School Opens On Monday

SALEM, Sept. 12, (AP)—Classes at the Chemawa Indian school were organized yesterday with approximately one-third of last year's enrollment.

The school was originally slated to be closed under the federal economy act, but was later authorized an enrollment of 300 students 16 years of age or older, for the ninth and 10th grades. Academic work will be closely related to vocational training.

Local Boards Enforce NRA

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12, (AP)—A "compliance boards" are to be set up in every city and town to assure observance of the Blue Eagle agreements.

As outlined to reporters today by Hugh S. Johnson, the administrator, the duty of each board will be to investigate complaints of violations, hold hearings and seek to obtain voluntary compliance.

If this is not forthcoming, they will report to Washington for disciplinary action.

The local board will have no executive authority.

They shall consist of two employee representatives, one for industrial workers and the other for trade, two employers' spokesmen, one consumer representative, preferably a woman, and one lawyer.

These are to pick a chairman who shall be a citizen of unimpeachable high standing and neutral as between the various interests.

NIGHT WATCHMAN SHOOTS DEPUTY

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 12, (AP)—A deputy sheriff and a night watchman apparently mistook each other for burglars early today. The officer was killed, the watchman gravely wounded.

Deputy Sheriff John Hedge stopped his automobile near a wholesale grocery warehouse when he saw a man in the shadows of the building. The deputy opened fire and Watchman Frank Chavez fell, a bullet in his abdomen.

A second watchman, Norman Krachick, returned Hedge's fire and killed the officer. Chavez is not expected to live.

Civilians on Guard In Coal Mine Town

HELPER, Utah, Sept. 12, (AP)—Civilian guards, numbering 150, patrolled the streets of this coal mining camp tonight, determined to prevent a recurrence of the rush on the Price city jail of yesterday.

After 400 members and friends of the National Miners' union were turned back at Price, they returned here and authorities immediately took action to prevent further disturbances.

Field Unlikely

He held it "very unlikely" that the head lacerations which killed Mrs. Lamson last May 30 could have been produced by violent contact with a flat surface such as a wash basin.

"To produce such fractures," he said, "you would need either terrific force, or else successive blows at approximately the same point. They would hardly be suffered in a fall of a reasonable distance."

CITY STREET WORK PROGRAM STARTED

Work of preparing city streets for winter has been started by City Engineer E. A. Thomas, who stated Tuesday that the city has borrowed one of the county road graders, and is blading the unpaved macadam streets all over the city.

Thomas is also listing defective sidewalks, according to an order issued by the council at its last meeting, preparatory to ordering property owners to repair these walks. Many are found to be in a hazardous condition for pedestrians, Thomas stated.

The city street department painted safety lanes at all street crossings near school buildings Tuesday, and children are cautioned to use these lanes at all times.

Another traffic hazard to the city, a bad point on California and Nevada streets, is being removed by the street department.

Work of pouring asphalt into pavement cracks will continue for about two weeks longer, Thomas said, in order to have streets in as good condition as possible before bad weather begins.

GOVERNOR, HOSS OUTVOTE HOLMAN

SALEM, Sept. 12, (AP)—The first full meeting of the board of control in four months resulted five previous Holman resolutions by a two to one vote here yesterday.

Governor Julius L. Meier and Secretary of State Hal E. Hoss outvoted Treasurer Rufus C. Holman in erasing the resolutions. Hoss introduced the motion, stating that the resolutions were being disregarded.

Holman objected to repeal of the resolution prohibiting operation of cars in state service except from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. on working days.

New Hope for Coal Code Expressed by Recovery Leaders

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12, (AP)—New hope of an agreement on a code for the bituminous coal industry came tonight after a series of conferences between operators and recovery administration officials.

Irrked by the stubborn resistance of leaders of the industry in the past month to efforts to bring it under the blue eagle, Administrator Hugh S. Johnson today ordered action.

Five hundred operators were called into a hearing late in the afternoon and heard the administration's demand for speed. They were asked to select promptly two committees of nine members each.

One committee will consider a code; the other the administration of the code.

The possibility of separating the industry into divisions if necessary to bring it under the blue eagle was suggested by Richberg.
