## Seattle Club Will Have New Baseball Park

SEATTLE, Sept. 15. (AP)—The Seattle Pacific Coast league baseball club, orphaned since their ball park burned down last season, will have a new home next year.

The old Rainier Valley park will be rebuilt at a cost of \$50,000, under terms of a city ordinance passed over Mayor John F. Dore's veto.

The city council put Seattle in the baseball business by acquiring ownership of the park and leasing it to the club for 25 years. The ball club will pay outstanding taxes and assessments and contribute \$25,000 toward building a new grandstand.

King county welfare board will add \$25,000, which will be repaid from the club's annual lease payments. Mayor Dore recently vetoed the move, saying it was "improper use of taxpayers' money."

## CHICAGO TAKES GIANTS AGAIN

Cubs Capture Second Straight Over Leaders.

Whether or not they succeed in their struggle to overtake the New York Giants in the National league pennant race—and their chances look good after two straight victories over the league leaders—the Chicago Cubs at least can point with pride to their record at Wrigley field.

When they put on a ninth inning uprising Thursday and took their second rainy day decision from the Giants, 4 to 1, the Cubs lifted their home game percentage to .765. They have won 52 and lost only 16 so far.

The Giants, still 5½ games ahead after Thursday's defeat, have won 46 and lost 22 at home for a .876 percentage, but they have been considerably more successful than Chicago on the road. New York has nine more road games, including double-headers at Chicago today and tomorrow, and seven at home, while the Cubs play only two of their remaining 13 games away from home.

**Weather Slows Games**  
The weather played a big part in Thursday's game. Chilled fingers and a slippery ball made fielding difficult. The final decision was reached on Cub hitting after errors on both sides and a "bouncer" by Manager Bill Terry of the Giants and figured prominently in the scoring that sent them into the ninth inning with New York leading 3-2.

Riggs Stephenson opened the last frame with a single. Babe Herman sent the "Old Hoss" to third with a pinch double, and then young Adolph Camilli was purposely passed. Gabby Hartnett squared off against Big Fred Fitzsimmons and smashed a hit into centerfield to bring in the winning runs.

**Solons Boost Lead**  
While the National league race was closing up, the Washington Senators increased their lead in the American to nine games over the Yankees, defeating Detroit, 4 to 3. Earl Whitehill earned his 21st victory. The Yankees' game with Cleveland was rained out, as was the St. Louis-Philadelphia contest.

## Former Title Contender Pays Klamath Visit

Jack Moran, a heavyweight championship contender in 1917, paid Klamath Falls a visit this week. Moran, retiring from the professional sport in 1921, came here as a salesman for a mid-west clinical supply company.

The ex-fighter participated in some of the country's outstanding bouts 15 years ago. He fought and lost to Jack Dempsey in the first round of a Salt Lake City bout.

Moran battled Fred Fulton three times in 1917; Gunboat Smith, Jack Dillon, Battling Levinsky, Al Kauffman, Bill Mike, Bob Martin and a host of other prominent athletes.

His last fight was with Earl Morris in 1921 at Tulsa, Okla.

## WEBFOOTS TURN TO PRACTICE BRIGHT AND EARLY SATURDAY

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 15. (AP)—The University of Oregon football team will start practice for the 1933 season Saturday morning. Today will be spent in issuing equipment and taking pictures.

Most Oregon players are already on hand, marking time until practice opens. Despite the fact that Oregon loses but four regulars from the 1932 team, prospects are not particularly bright. The team will be weak at quarterback.

Bill Boyerman, destined for three seasons. Also the ends will be none too plentiful. There is a possibility that Bob Parke, plucky little right halfback, who is one of the finest kickers in the conference, may be moved to quarterback. Also, Clarence Coddins, a sub guard, is being considered, although Ralph Terjeson, understudy last year, seems to be the logical choice.

Three regular ends—Butch Morse, Chuck Wiskard and Bud Pozzo—are back and ready to work. However, Callison is seeking a fourth wingman to take the place of Red Bailey, who was graduated last summer. There is going to be a grand battle for Bill Morgan's place at tackle. The ex-Oregon captain was a tower of strength and it will be no easy job to fill his shoes. Alex Eagle and Chuck Bishop, huge 200-pounders, and Bill Lundeen, Dick Benison, Ned Simpson and Slug Nielson, sophomores, are all candidates for Morgan's former job. At the other tackle is Biff Nilsson, one of the greatest linemen on the coast, who will be hard to displace, should he continue his last year's form.

Hernie Hughes, who alternates with Mark Temple, in capturing the team, has the inside track for center, but he will find Chuck Swanson and Jim Gemio, lettermen, and Jim Withrow, sophomore, strong competitors. Halfbacks are plentiful, led by Temple and Leighton Dean, two-year lettermen. George Penjak, Stan Kostka, Art Clarkson, are some of the veterans back. They will be aided by Stew Milligan, star freshman halfback and kicker.

Practice will get under way Saturday without any preliminary ceremonies as Oregon plays her first game against Linfield here next Friday and opens her big game schedule against Gonzaga at Spokane two weeks from Saturday.

Nap Devore of Paris, star of the semi-windup bout, wrestled his way to popularity at the Legion hall last night when he decisively defeated Billy Newman of Denver in a three-fall match. Devore, the outstanding athlete on the card, easily won the position over a comparatively dull mainevent.

Harry Demetral, the bald-headed Greek from Seattle, captured what had been billed as the headliner when he upset Jose Lopez of Mexico in two swift falls. The willowy-backed youth from Mexico, almost a novice at the game, fell easily into the powerful holds of the experienced Greek.

**Newman Outclassed**  
Demetral, swarming all over Lopez, swept through to the first fall in six and one-half minutes. He took the advantage with a body slam and then returned to the ring five minutes later to win the deciding fall with a head lock. It took just about one minute to put away the Mexican for the second time.
