

Stoical Irish Coach Happy

Sophomore Shock Troops Bring Cheer at Notre Dame. Season Players Ready to Step into Vacancies. Difficult Schedule is Faced.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Sept. 19.—Sally tears are being dropped into the bowl of football coaches throughout the land. Laundry concerns are putting on night gowns to supply crying towels to mentors bemoaning the loss of last year's material and the inferiority of this year's stock.

The country's coaches have all gone Doblesque—all except Hunk Anderson of Notre Dame. For the first time since Hunk took over the reins of the Rockne organization, a smile has split his otherwise stoical pan. And the reason is that he has one of the best aggregations of sophomore shock troops that has ever been under his wing.

Hunk has plenty he could cry about. Old Man Graduation has taken Joe Kurth, Hunk's All-American tackle; Jim Harris, star guard; Paul Host, Mike Koken, Joe Sheeketski, Norm Greeney, and Ed Kosky. The loss of that material is enough to make any coach sigh and sob.

There are a lot of seasoned players ready to step into the shoes of those graduated players—juniors and seniors who have had from one to two years of play under fire, and who have absorbed the Notre Dame system thoroughly. But Hunk is rosy about his soph material.

Anderson invited 65 players to report to him for the varsity this year. Among those gridirers were 11 sophomores who teamed up last spring to shatter Notre Dame tradition by defeating the varsity in the winning game of the spring practice session.

The sophs are Wayne Miller, left end; Ken Stiller, left tackle; Jim Martin, left guard; Tommy Dunn, center; Bill Smith, right guard; Joe Sullivan, right tackle; Marty Peters, right end; Tony Maslotti, quarterback; Andy Piny, left half; Mike Layden, right half; and Don Elser, fullback. Miller is a youngster from Salem, Mass., heralded as the boy who will make Notre Dame its first All-American end. He is fast, an exceptional pass receiver and a hard tackler.

Sullivan, who prepped in Brooklyn, is a son of Tim Sullivan, who was wrestling champion of the New York police department. Young Joe is out to give Tom Roach, the veteran, a battle for the honor of filling the large brogans of Joe Kurth.

OREGON DEER SEASON OPENS

Fremont Forest Most Popular Hunting Ground

An ancient, unwritten rule of the sportsman was carefully viewed as hunters in all Oregon prepared for the opening day of the season today.

"Don't shoot until you see the forks of their horns," was the one final and simple instruction sent out by the game commission and the game law enforcement group.

There was a rush of business at the county clerk's office, the chamber of commerce and individual sporting goods firms as the prospective "deer slayers" purchased hunting licenses and obtained fire permits.

The majority of the fire permits were for the Fremont national forest—sufficient indication where the Klamath hunter will go this season.

State Officers Ready. Elton Jackson, state game warden, said Tuesday a more rigid enforcement of the game laws had been ordered. A close check will be conducted to see that all deer killed are correctly tagged.

Changes in the license system has necessitated a more thorough observance, he said. "Any hunter having a deer in his possession without the tag properly punched will be arrested," Jackson said.

"Numerous road checks will be made to see that the game commission regulations are observed." Foresters and game supervisors declared exceptional caution will be necessary this year to prevent trespasses in the game areas, inasmuch as about 12,000 civilian conservation workers are now stationed in the Oregon woods and mountains.

Most of these men are in the deer country. They are dressed in uniform olive drab garments, and of a color similar to a fawn flanks of both the Columbian black-tailed deer west of the Cascades, and the larger mule deer east of the range.

Only buck deer with forked horns may be taken. The bag limit is two Columbian black-tailed deer or one mule deer. Both tags must be affixed to the mule deer.

Referee "Whitley" Healey awarded the decision, after Yarosz won six rounds to Dundee's three. The ninth was even.

Yarosz, dark haired youngster from the same western Pennsylvania, that contributed champions Frank Klus, George Chip and the late Harry Greb, beat the hairy chested New Jersey Italian with superior timing.

GIANTS CINCH CHAMPIONSHIP

Defeat of Pittsburgh Is Great Factor; Boys Raise Whoopie

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 19. (UP)—New York's Giants danced with delight before 5000 fans today when they learned they had clinched the National league pennant by virtue of Philadelphia's defeat of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Fans, cheering a four-run lead scored by the St. Louis Cardinals, amazingly watched the Giants walk off the diamond after the first inning, gather Manager Bill Terry and then start dancing, slapping hands and slapping backs.

Pirates Drop Second. News of the Pirates' defeat came while the Giants were attempting to stop a Cardinal batting attack, that netted them a 4 to 0 lead. Philadelphia defeated Pittsburgh 3 to 2, in the second of a doubleheader.

Dejected, Manager Bill Terry walked toward the dugout. A teammate ran toward him. Terry brightened up, shook hands with the messenger and wildly motioned for his players to gather around.

"We've won," he shouted. "We've clinched the pennant." The news served as a cue for wild antics which amazed fans watching.

Fans Wild, Too. While still frolicking in front of their dugout, the Pittsburgh score was posted. The fans—4000 of them women—added their good wishes in the form of deafening cheers.

Even the umpires joined in the merry-making. McGraw, Klem and Rigler dropped their customary stern decorum and stepped into the midst of the players. Each offered congratulations while the fans continued cheering.

After nearly 10 minutes of the demonstration, the umpires ordered play resumed. Inspired, Mel Ott stepped to the plate and hit his 23rd homer of the year. But the inspiration failed to continue throughout the remainder of the game, for the Cardinals continued to build up their early lead.

The final score was Frisch's Red Birds 12, and Terry's pre-occupied Giants 3.

Before play resumed in the second inning, Terry issued the following statement: "Winning this pennant is the highest thrill of my baseball career. It certainly gives a fellow a kick to win after every body picked the club to finish in second division. I hope we can bring New York the world championship, too."

Undisturbed by today's defeat, hilarity burst away in the clubhouse after the game. Amid laughter were frequent remarks of: "I knew we'd get that pennant," "the folks back home ought to be satisfied now," and "we sure showed the experts up this season."

Stars Offer Final Test For Angels

With only two weeks of play remaining Hollywood opens a 7-game series at Los Angeles in its bid for the 1933 Coast league championship.

Trailing the Angels by four games, the Stars must take five of this week's game to start the concluding series of the 1933 season within striking distance of the powerful Leivett crew.

Season Near Close. The Stars will wind up the season next week against the Missions while the Angels have an easy series scheduled against San Francisco. Accordingly, Hollywood pennant hopes rest in the Wrigley field series.

In the only games played Monday Oakland stopped Portland 4-4 for its third victory in the 7-game series, and Sacramento defeated Seattle, 8-2.

Although they outdid the Oaks, 12-9, the Beavers could not convert their blows into runs. Glenn Gabler and Bill Ludolph did the Oakland hurling. Sacramento showed over five runs in the fifth inning to snatch its victory at Seattle just before the game was halted because of rain.

The second half of the scheduled doubleheader was postponed. Sacramento moves to Portland and Oakland to Seattle for this week's schedule, while the Missions and Seals play at San Francisco.

Senators Favored Over New Yorkers

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 19. (UP)—Although neither team has won its league championship, Washington Senators Monday were quoted slight favorites to win the world series from the New York Giants.

Tom Kearney, St. Louis betting commissioner, said that Washington backers would bet 7 to 10 and that Giant supporters would get even money.

Scottish Runner Sets New Record

GLASGOW, Scotland, Sept. 19. (AP)—Ernest Harper of the Halmahire Harriers today ran 20 miles, 1604 yards and 2 1/2 feet in two hours to claim a world record for the time.

Officials said the best previous mark for two hours was 20 miles, 1150 yards, made by Romonen at Toronto in July.

The listed world record for a two-hour run is 20 miles, 652 yards, by H. Green of Great Britain, at London, May 12, 1918.

WATER FOWL SEASON SET

Hunting on Migratory Birds Opens Here October 16.

Open seasons for hunting waterfowl, coot, and pucks in the United States this fall and winter will again comprise two months in each of six zones, opening at 12 o'clock noon, September 21, in Wisconsin, North Dakota, and northern Idaho, and closing January 15 in the most southern zone, reports the Bureau of Biological Survey in summarizing amendments to the regulations under the Migratory Treaty Act adopted by the Secretary of Agriculture and approved by the president, September 11.

Dates of Open Seasons. In detail the new open seasons for ducks (except wood duck, ruddy duck, and bufflehead duck), geese (except Ross's goose and snow geese in Florida and all states north thereof), and all states north thereof, brant (except on the Atlantic coast), coot, and jacksnipe are as follows:

In Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York (except Long Island), Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Illinois, Missouri, Washington, Oklahoma, Utah, Washington, Oregon, Idaho (except in the five northern counties), and the northern zone of New Mexico, October 16 to December 15.

The daily bag limit on ducks has been reduced from 15 to 12, of which number not more than 8 of any one, or 5 in the aggregate, may be canvasbacks, redheads, scaups, teal, shovellers, or gadwall.

Possession limits are reduced from 30 to 24 on ducks, and on the excepted species (above named) from 20 to 16.

For the first time since 1930 the new regulations include cackling geese in the list of birds that may be hunted during the waterfowl seasons.

The department is greatly concerned over the present status of migratory waterfowl and has adopted these measures to reduce still further the numbers of birds killed annually in this country. Long-continued drought on the principal breeding areas in the Prairie Provinces of Canada and in the Northwestern United States, together with overhunting, had reduced the supply of wild fowl in 1931 to the lowest point that these birds had ever reached. Conditions on the breeding grounds early in the spring of 1933 were much more favorable, but since the first of June they have been only a little better than in 1931, and the Biological Survey considers it possible that when the wild fowl arrive this fall their numbers may prove to be no greater than two years ago. In this event further restrictions may be necessary. The department urges sportsmen to cooperate with the federal and state game conservation authorities during the present emergency. It should be realized that an adequate breeding stock must be saved if the sport of wild-fowling is to continue.

PORTLAND, Sept. 19. (AP)—Taking two falls out of three, Building Jackson of Klamath Falls won the main event of last night's wrestling program here from Henry Jones of Provo, Utah. Jackson weighed 185 and Jones 181.

The Klamath Falls grappler won the first fall in 16 minutes with a hammerlock. Jones took the second in 11 minutes with a series of wristlocks, only to lose the match in 6 minutes when Jackson successfully applied a body slam.

Otis Clingman, 140, Oklahoma City, won two falls out of three from Jack Strabotto, 142, New York, to win the semi-windup. Dorry Detton, 157, won the preliminary from Hugh Adams, 159, Portland, taking one fall.

Monmouth Team Prepares For Stag's Eleven

CORVALLIS, Ore., Sept. 19. (AP)—That Coach Amos A. Stag will be in for some stiff opposition at Portland Saturday when his college of the Pacific team meets Larry Wolf's teachers from Oregon State Normal, Corvallis, is being discussed here yesterday when Wolf brought his team to Corvallis, for a scrimmage with Oregon State college team.

Although no attempts at scoring were made, the teachers showed a strong offensive with practice virtually confined to the line-backing. Several of the Monmouth players worked well against the Stagers, but the latter showed consistent ability to get their men through the teachers' line.

Albany Ball Club Fined For Deal

DERHAM, N. C., Sept. 19. (UP)—The Albany club of the International league was fined \$500 and player Earl Clark \$200 by President W. G. Braham of the national association Monday for violation of salary affidavit.

Investigation showed a side agreement between President Joseph Cambria of the Albany club and Clark to pay Clark money outside of the contract amount.

Nebraska Boxer Dies From Blow

SIoux CITY, Iowa, Sept. 19. (AP)—Whitlow Birdsall, 27, welterweight boxer from Decatur, Neb., died today in a hospital as a result of a basal skull fracture.

Birdsall was knocked out in the last round of a scheduled four round preliminary, cracking his head against the wooden floor boards of the ring.

Coroner William Krigten classified the death as "strictly an accident."

Pitcher's Injury Not Thought Serious

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 19. (AP)—Freddie Fitzsimmons, New York Giants' pitcher, was hit on the Adams apple by a ball batted by Bob O'Farrell, St. Louis catcher, in Monday's game.

Fitzsimmons fell over on his side and was removed from the game. The accident was described as "not serious."

KLAMATH MEETS WEED SATURDAY

Coaches Rush Practice for Opening Game of Season.

The struggle for positions on the Klamath Pelican football team was seriously underway on Monday field with the start of the second week of practice. The first two teams, the squads destined to carry the most vigorous work of a difficult schedule, took shape as Leslie Avritt, head coach, and his assistant, Al Sinclair, prepared for the opening game.

Dwight French, director of athletics, announced Tuesday morning the first game of the season would be played here Saturday against Weed, northern California team. The contest has been set for Modoc field at 2:00 o'clock.

Offensive Style Studied. Weed, a rugged team but traditionally defeated by the Pelicans, will offer the Pelican coaching staff to test two types of offensive, the balanced and the unbalanced. The merits of each style will be estimated throughout the contest.

Avritt, organizing his method of play to fit the prospects of a comparatively light team, introduced a rugged session of scrimmages and signal drill Monday night. The afternoon, too, served as a process of selection for untested candidates to fill numerous vacancies.

Francis Hess, a youth from Oleno, filled in at center. Hess has become one of the leading candidates to replace Don Bradley and Chas. Berry, last season's veterans who were graduated in June.

Pastega, Maxwell Guards. Johnny Pastega and Homer Maxwell, regulars from the 1932 first team, took their places at guards and Nelo Giovanetti and Bob Napier entered the lineup at tackles. Giovanetti, husky at tackle, played last year and Napier was on the reserve squad.

Lynn Propet, outstanding hold-over, and Billy Horn, 1932 letterman but not a regular, were Avritt's ends on the first squad. Eugene Barrows, Norman Taber—both veterans—Wayne Perry and Bob Leslie formed the backfield combination.

Perry was on the first squad last season and Leslie was a regular on Dwight French's Wildcat. Howard Serogins, basketball star who registered here from Commerce high at Portland, and Wilfred Rhulmir, fullback letterman of two seasons ago, were among the leading backfield candidates.
