MILLIONS ALLOTTED FOR ARMY HOUSING

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20. (AP)—The public works administration today allotted \$54,709,358 to the war department for army housing construction.

Secretary Ickes said the money will go into construction and reconditioning work, giving quick employment to thousands.

Of the total \$53,573,397 goes for new improvements and salvage work on 22 posts.

The sum of \$1,135,961 will be used in completing facilities now under construction and providing accessories in connection with facilities at 31 posts.

Pair Arrested On Liquor Charges

HENLEY POTATO CLUB TO MEET
The Henley potato club is holding a meeting this evening at the Henley grange hall at Mt. Lak. This is the largest potato club in Oregon, having 25 members enrolled, and S. P. Deblinger, prominent Klamath Basin potato grower, is leader.

Each of these boys has grown from one-half to five acres of potatoes. They have held several meetings at the Deblinger home during the summer and received advice as to the best methods of growing good potatoes from Deblinger. The boys have excellent crops and their potatoes will run largely to U. S. No. 1. Besides raising potatoes, the boys are taught how to select them for exhibiting at fairs.

Fifteen pounds of potatoes is required for an exhibit at the fair, but a special class has been opened, in which a premium of \$25 will be divided between the four boys having the least number of potatoes to make 50 pounds at the fair. There will be much competition in this class, as all the boys are picking out their largest potatoes and polishing them up for this event.

At the meeting this evening, short talks will be given on the potato industry, and the boys will receive more instructions on the selection of exhibits and grading of potatoes.

Frank W. Sexton, county club agent, will treat the boys to ice cream at the close of the meeting.

OREGON RECEIVES SHARE FOR RELIEF

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20. (AP)—Distribution of 100,000,000 pounds of pork purchased by the agricultural adjustment administration for the needy will be started next week by the federal emergency relief administration.

The organization received word today the pork is ready. Notification was sent to the various state relief administrators.

Farm administrators said approximately \$20,000,000 has been spent of the \$50,000,000 they plan to disburse in the emergency hog purchasing program. It is designed to aid farmers in disposing of swine in areas in which feed shortages exist and to reduce the future potential marketings of hogs. So far 3,500,000 pigs and 75,000 sows have been purchased.

The allocation of pork by states was based on the April-June average number of families receiving relief, a total of 4,146,784 for the entire country. The pork was appraised by the administration at three cents a pound making the dollar value \$3,900,000. The allocation includes California, 4,190,000; Idaho 250,000; Montana 610,000; Oregon 1,000,000 and Washington 1,540,000.

CARSON FAVORS POWER BOYCOTT

PORTLAND, Sept. 20. (AP)—A boycott on electric power from the proposed Grand Coulee dam in Central Washington was proposed by Mayor Joseph K. Carson here Tuesday in event the federal government ultimately decides to eliminate the power development feature from the Bonneville project on the Columbia river, cuts the proposed dam from 72 feet to 50 feet, and approves the structure for navigation improvement only.

Mayor Carson told the city council, "I am in favor of serving notice on the President that Portland will not buy a dime's worth of power if we can help it from the Grand Coulee if a low dam for navigation purposes only is given at Bonneville."
