

FARM CHIEF BACKS IDEA TO INFLATE

CHICAGO, Sept. 20. (AP)—Secretary Wallace today told the grain dealers that he still favors controlled inflation.

Along with this, President Roosevelt's secretary of agriculture criticized high tariff psychology, and warned that attempts to fix prices "without control of production is doomed to failure."

Views Misinterpreted — "Most of the price fixers are also inflationists," he said. "If the purchasing power of farm products does not improve during the next three months, the price fixers and inflationists will have great power in congress this coming winter, and there will be passed legislation which will make the agricultural adjustment act seem extraordinarily conservative."

Explaining his attitude on inflation, Wallace said that recent views he expressed on the subject have been misinterpreted.

"For a number of years prior to March 4, 1933," Wallace said, "I urged the stabilization of the purchasing power of the dollar and a restoration of the commodity price level to that which prevailed in 1926. . . . Since March 4, it has been my pleasure to see the objective we strove for out in the Middle West become a basic principle in President Roosevelt's program for recovery. . . . In view of the progress already made in that direction, it was deemed opportune to explain to farmers what some of the results might be, especially to point out that if the previous price level is restored farmers would still face the continued necessity of balancing farm output more nearly in line with demand conditions. Unfortunately this attempt to clarify the farmer's thinking, lest he be disappointed, when the price level objectives are eventually attained, has given rise to the mistaken impression that I have changed my views. My position with respect to controlled inflation has not changed."

Higher Prices Visioned — Secretary Wallace said he looked for "decidedly higher agricultural prices within a few months" but that he felt the improvement might come to a sad end if "we are not prepared to meet the peril produced by the following forces."

"First, America is a creditor nation to the tune of one billion dollars annually, but, as a nation, she has a debtor psychology."

"Second, the American people, democrat and republican alike, are still essentially high tariff in their attitude. Reciprocal tariff agreements may be negotiated, but the increase in foreign purchasing power resulting thereby will not be sufficient to enable foreign countries to pay a satisfactory price for our surplus wheat and cotton unless the attitude of the American people and American congressmen change very radically."

Country Nationalistic — "Third: The American people are disillusioned about lending money abroad, and it will be difficult to float foreign loans in their present temper."

These three forces mean that for the time being our people are profoundly nationalistic, and that as long as they are operating on this basis, we should go at it wholeheartedly to put our internal economy on a nationalistic basis, reducing our crop land acreage by 40 million acres."

WALLACE'S STAND PRAISED — SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 20. (AP)—Praise of Secretary Wallace's analysis of the long-range outlook for the American farmer under inflation, in the secretary's speech at the Chicago Grain Dealers association convention, came today from one of his most severe critics. Seth Axley, economist and writer on national economic problems, said the Wallace speech takes into account factors which are essential to the rebuilding of the national trade.

"Here is an indication of real vision," Axley said. "It is a recognition of the fundamentals of

WESTERN STATES VOTE FOR REPEAL

The score card in the fight over repeal today: Repeal 31, prohibition 6. Idaho and New Mexico, voting yesterday, approved the proposed 21st amendment, which would strike the 18th from the constitution.

Five More Needed — This placed the repeal forces in a position where they can spot the prohibitionists three states between now and Nov. 7 and still have national prohibition out of the constitution in December.

The next state to vote is Virginia, on Oct. 3. Florida votes on Oct. 10 and six more—North and South Carolina, Ohio, Kentucky, Pennsylvania and Utah—on Nov. 7. The anti-prohibitionists need only five of them to obtain the 36 states needed to amend the constitution.

If they get the five, they expect the formalities of ratification to be concluded in December.

BOISE, Idaho, Sept. 20. (AP)—With approximately nine-tenths of the expected vote in yesterday's election tabulated today Idaho gave 52,007 for repeal to 38,172 against repeal, a majority of 13,835.

The vote came from 591 of the state's 819 precincts and those outstanding were all small, some with barely a dozen electors registered.

Exactly three-fourths of the counties in the state were aligned for repeal in the tabulation 33 of 4, but some were so close that forthcoming returns may change their position.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Sept. 20. (AP)—An Associated Press compilation of votes in yesterday's special election for ratification of the 21st or prohibition repeal amendment today showed: From 258 precincts of 785 in the state for 31,169, against 9,842.

For state repeal, the vote in 252 precincts showed: for 29,623, against 10,627.

Amendment Seeking Lower Rates Filed

SALEM, Sept. 20. (UP)—An amendment to an initiative petition, seeking to lower interest rates on small loans, was filed today by A. C. Buchanan of Portland.

The amended petition fixes maximum interest rate on loans more than \$300 at 10 per cent a year, instead of 12 as in the original.

It would also prohibit pawnbrokers from making private sales and would require holding of pledges a year, when they would be sold at public auction.

Caught Napping — A series of federal and state agents, testifying after a story of the prison negotiations was unfolded and after evidence to link three Texas farmer-defendants with the plot, told how Bailey was caught napping in the farmyard of R. G. Shannon, near Paradise, Texas.

The courtroom remained under guard of nearly a score of heavily armed officers. Shannon, his wife and his son, Armon, were taken from court in an armored truck for their own safety. Prosecutors, the judge, Urchel himself and his family were more closely guarded than ever.

As the third day of the trial ended, Kelly was believed in the vicinity of Oklahoma City, and officers feared he would attempt to carry out threats made by mail against Urchel, the Shannons and others in the case.

A man who said he was Kelly and "had a lot of work to do," held up two youths and left them tied to a tree 17 miles from here today. At the same time Texas officers several hundred miles away arrested two men near Gladewater in an automobile believed belonging to Kelly. The two occupants, brothers, said their name was Edwards and that they lived in Wilmot, Ark.

Attorney's Life Threatened — OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Sept. 20. (AP)—The life of Joseph B. Keenan, assistant attorney general leading the nation's drive against crime, has been threatened by George (Ma-

chius Gun) Kelly, it was learned on good authority today.

Keenan received the threat in an airmail letter from Chicago at the end of yesterday's federal court session in which Harvey Bailey, Albert Bates and ten other persons are on trial for the kidnaping of Charles F. Urchel, Oklahoma City oil millionaire.

Letters Authentic — Kelly, accused by the government of having aided Bates in carrying out the actual abduction of Urchel, and his wife are the only two persons indicted in the kidnaping who have not been apprehended.
