GRAIN IN RALLY TOWARD CLOSING

CHICAGO, Sept. 25, (AP)—Grain values rallied at the last today, although disappointment of traders who had looked for fresh stimulating business factors had served to pull values downward most of the time earlier.

Aggregate dealings in grain, however, were not large, and the markets were easily influenced. Price changes at times proved rapid, reflecting in the main individual speculative operations rather than anything in the news.

Wheat closed firm, at the same as Saturday's finish to 5/8 higher, corn 3/4 off to 1/4 up, oats unchanged to 1/4 lower, and provisions varying from 15 cents decline to a rise of 5 cents.
