

FLOODS MENACING TAMPICO REGIONS

TAMPICO, Mexico, Sept. 28 (AP)—The rain-swollen Panuco and Tamesi rivers rose steadily above flood levels today and brought further destruction to this port, still prostrate from Sunday's hurricane.

Heavy rains fell west of here, and the national observatory warned that tropical storms might continue until Oct. 19.

Scattered reports from nearby towns told of additional deaths, injuries, and property damage.

Water Supply Diminishes
Military and federal authorities put forth herculean efforts to meet their needs for food, water and medicines. It was believed the water supply could not be restored for five or six days.

With its food supply rapidly diminishing, Tampico awaited with growing anxiety the arrival from Monterrey of a train with food and medicine and soldiers to help in reconstruction work.

The train was delayed by floods. If it cannot reach this city plans were afoot to import supplies by air until the arrival of a steamship from Vera Cruz.

Relief Funds Swell
Government relief funds have been swelled by contributions from the American Red Cross, diplomats, and Mexican citizens, but the problem was to get supplies purchased with the money through to Tampico.

Belated reports brought here by boat and airplane revealed that nearby towns had suffered as heavily in proportion as did this city.

Revolt In Latin America The Dramatic Story Of Unrest

(This is the fourth of six stories on the wave of revolutions in Latin America during the past three years.)

For 14 years he had ruled Argentina as a sort of a beloved despot, a strange old man whose private life was veiled by mystery and who became a hero to the common people by overturning the rich and powerful aristocrats.

And then, with surprising suddenness, a revolution swept him from the presidency and he fled to the barracks of friendly soldiers to escape the fury of a mob.

But when he died three years later he was given the greatest funeral in Argentina's history. Two hundred thousand persons accompanied his casket as it was borne through the streets of Buenos Aires on the shoulders of admirers while others tossed flowers from balconies as the strange cortege passed.

Call it "Latin temperament" or what you will, but such, in brief, is the story of Dr. Hipolito Irigoyen, late president of Argentina.

Unrest Flares Into Revolt
Portly, puffy-faced Dr. Irigoyen, who had devoted most of his 50 years to politics, was another of those South American presidents who were tossed overboard by revolution when the depression closed in. In this case, it was the slump in the world market for cattle and wheat that brought on a political crisis.

Popular unrest, marked by rioting in several provinces, had been growing for some time, but the spark that touched off the revolution in September, 1930, was the action of Irigoyen's police in firing into a group of students who were demonstrating against the government in Buenos Aires Plaza de Mayo. That was on Thursday night; by Saturday, Irigoyen, 14-year dictator of Argentina, was fleeing for his life.

A Man of Mystery
Irigoyen's story goes back a long way. A political figure since 1892, when he had succeeded his uncle as head of Argentina's radical party, Irigoyen broke the landed classes' control of the government when he was elected president in 1916 for a six year term. In 1922, being prohibited from running for re-election without an intervening term, he dictated the election of his successor, Marcelo de Alvear. In 1928 he chose to resume the presidency and was elected easily.
A queer old man who lived in seclusion, shunned demonstra-

SILVERTON, Sept. 28. (AP)—The school bell rings daily, but those bright, shiny faces never appear at the Little Bridge Creek school house 13 miles east of here.

Miss Mollie Butler reports daily and rings the school bell, but two families moved out of the district, taking the six children who had planned to go to school there.
Miss Butler intends to appear at the school house every day—at least until the board makes settlement on her \$75 a month contract.

Irigoyen—and with it, apparently, came a return of the old hero's popularity in the eyes of Argentina's masses. Never before, or since, has South America seen a funeral like that accorded him.

Coffin Seized by Mob
A mob of thousands of Irigoyen's admirers took the funeral out of the hands of the government and hooted, jeered and drove away the government cavalry that had been sent as an escort of honor.

When the pall bearers—including former President de Alvear and former United States Ambassador Paeyrredon—carried the coffin downstairs from the tiny apartment, the mob swept aside the police and refused to permit the coffin to be placed in the hearse. They insisted that it be carried on their shoulders.

Thus, with the dead ex-president's casket borne by a dozen men, the strange march to the cemetery was begun. Ahead marched 150,000 radical party delegates from all parts of the country; behind came an unorganized crowd of 100,000.

Greatest in Death
So great was the jam at the cemetery gates that the men carrying the coffin, jostled by the swirling mob, dropped their burden into the street.

Fifteen orators extolled President Irigoyen's virtues at his grave.
And so, this strange man who for 14 years had ruled Argentina as a dictator—who lived alone in a tiny flat above a tobacco shop and always shunned formality and demonstrations of every kind—came to be honored in death in a manner he had never known in life and by the same people from whose fury he once fled for his safety.

Queer indeed are the ways of politics in temperamental Latin America.

GOVERNMENT WILL PURCHASE LUMBER

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28 (AP)—The forest conservation corps is going to buy 250,000,000 feet of lumber to build 1,466 winter camps for 250,000 corps workers.

In making the announcement today, Robert Fechner, conservation director said:
"This is one of the largest single orders ever placed for lumber in the history of the country and will give active stimulus to the lumber industry in which 1,000,000 men are normally employed."

Fechner said bids are being called for by commanding officers in the nine corps areas and that the specifications calling for number two common lumber were drawn in collaboration with the National Lumber Manufacturers' association. In the south, 50,000 men will continue to live in tents.

ROBBERS ESCAPE WITH MAIL SACKS

BOSTON, Sept. 28. (AP)—Three robbers snatched three pouches of registered mail containing valuable worth \$2,800 from a moving jitney truck at the south station today but left behind other mail sacks containing approximately \$100,000.
A check of postal officials disclosed the robbers had obtained a sack destined for a Newport, R. I., savings bank.

containing three negotiable bonds worth \$2,000 and other items worth \$500 more. A second sack contained 37 pieces of mail for Cape Cod points, valued at \$97, and a third, containing \$50 in pennies for a Tanton, Mass., bank, and other mail.
In other sacks on the truck at the time, however, were bags containing money for banks in Newport, R. I., and Plymouth, Mass., aggregating approximately \$100,000.
