RELIEF NEEDS in Oregon this winter are expected to total eight million dollars, of which the government will provide three millions while the state must provide the other five.

How?

That question will plague the legislature when it meets in special session late in October.

THERE is an old saying to the effect that "you can't get blood out of a turnip"—which is quite all right, because nobody WANTS to get blood out of a turnip.

But it is equally true that you can't squeeze much in the way of additional taxes out of taxpayers who are already squeezed dry, and in this instance it DOES matter, because if relief needs are to be provided for more taxes will have to be squeezed out.

And relief needs MUST be provided for.

THE governor's special committee to find ways and means of doing the squeezing meets in all-day session, and decides that liquor will have to provide about HALF of the amount needed.

Fair enough. Those who can afford liquor can afford to help the needy.

THE governor's committee decides also that betting on horse and dog racing can stand some more squeezing, and recommends quadrupling the present tax.

In this way, it is estimated, another half million can be raised.

FAIR enough again.

If you can afford to bet on the races, you can afford to help feed the hungry.

Nobody will contradict that.

THE GENTLEMEN who will purvey hard liquor to the masses when hard liquor again becomes legal and the gentlemen who handle the betting concessions at the race tracks, both dog and horse, will offer no objection to these taxes.

They know that vice, when TAXED HEAVILY, is tolerated by respectable people, and if vice is to continue and flourish it MUST be tolerated by respectable people.

SPEAKING of dog and horse races, by the way, the dog races have been by far the more popular of the two in Oregon, drawing the bulk of the crowds and getting the bulk of the betting.

BUT getting back to taxes for relief purposes.

The governor's special committee proposes a tax on admissions to prize fights, wrestling matches and similar exhibitions—that is to say, a SALES TAX.

We complain bitterly about sales taxes that are applied to necessities, but will probably pay (Continued on Page Four)

13 CONVICTED OF KIDNAPING IN 2 COURTS

Bailey, Bates, Shannons
Found Guilty of Daring
Abduction of Urschel

6 Sentenced in Illinois
For Kidnaping Aged
August Luer, Banker

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 30. (UP)—Seven of the ten persons accused in the kidnapping of Oil Man Charles F. Urschel tonight stood convicted of conspiracy under the Lindbergh law, the government's new weapon to combat predatory crime.

A jury of small town business men reported to Federal Judge Edgar S. Vaughn today it found Harvey J. Bailey, Albert Bates, Denver; Mr. and Mrs. R. G. (Boss) Shannon, their son, Armon, of Paradise, Texas, and Clifford Skelly and Berney Berman of St. Paul, guilty. Sam Kronick, Sam Kozberg and Isadore Blumenfeld, also of St. Paul, were acquitted.

Scene Dramatic

The dramatic courtroom scene, amid a crowd of society leaders, friends of the multimillionaire kidnap victim who paid \$200,000 for his release, lasted but five minutes. But within this time the government scored what was hailed as a signal victory in the war on gangland. The case went to the jury at 4:10 p. m. yesterday and a verdict was reached last night.

Attorneys for those convicted filed appeals for new trials or announced intention of such action. Judge Edgar S. Vaughn will rule on these motions next Friday. Sentences with life imprisonment and the maximum fine will be read next Saturday.

"It is one of the most important victories in our war to stamp out predatory crime," Keenan, the president's anti-crime general, said before leaving for Washington, "I am well satisfied."

Big, smiling Charles Urschel stepped up to the short, dark-skinned district attorney and congratulated him.

"I am very well satisfied," Urschel said. "The government did an excellent job."

LIFE TERMS GIVEN

EDWARDSVILLE, Ill., Sept. (UP)—A woman and two men were sentenced to life terms in prison and three others were given lesser terms today upon conviction of kidnaping August Luer, aged banker, and holding him for ransom.

Those sentenced to life imprisonment were Mrs. Lillian Chesney, 51, collaborator, the state charged, in writing a \$16,000 ransom demand; Randal Eugene Norvell, 32, East St. Louis, Ill., gambler, and Percy Michael Fitzgerald, 29, St. Louis ex-convict.

Klamath Falls-Weed Highway Traffic Is Increased in Year

Figures received at the chamber of commerce from the California department of agriculture, which maintains checking stations on highways entering California, show the Weed-Klamath Falls highway is the only one from Oregon with an increase in comparison to the previous year.

Travel on the Weed highway during the month of August reached the highest number since its construction. Cars traveling one way numbered 5,318. July was previously the highest travel month over the road with 4,771 cars.

During the first eight months of 1933 a total of 24,484 cars traveled the highway in one direction. The increase for the first time over the same period of 1932 is 15.1 per cent. No other road leading from northern California into Oregon has shown an increase during 1933.

Final Payment on Veteran Loan Made

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 30.—(UP)—Final installment on a \$1,000,000 loan made the treasury by the state veterans' aid commission was repaid today by state treasurer Rufus Holman. The amount repaid was \$270,000.

Only obligations of the treasury now are approximately \$1,250,000 in warrants. Following payment of second half property taxes in December this sum is expected to dwindle to \$1,487,000.

Holman also announced today the 1933 highway department debt had been reduced from \$27,979,250 to \$27,041,750 with payments of bonds due Oct. 1.

Threat Hurdled At Prosecutor By Gangsters

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 1. (Sunday) (UP)—Life of Herbert K. Hyde, prosecutor in the Urschel kidnapping case, has been threatened by members of the kidnap gang who are still at large, the Oklahoma News said today in a copyrighted article.

"From the phantom master mind of the gang that perpetrated the Urschel kidnapping has come to Hyde, who successfully prosecuted Albert Bates, Harvey Bailey and the Shannons," the News reported, "a melodramatic notice."

"You will be destroyed."

"Only two pages, but in them was all the vicious, headless determination of an underworld stung to madness by the conviction of a part of their allied syndicate," the News described the letter.

The United States bureau of investigation, which ran down clues in the Urschel case, had examined the threat letter and pronounced it not the work of a crank. They were seeking a hint to identity of the sender.

PUBLIC WORKS ENGINEER HERE

Claude C. Hockley Will
Look Over Klamath's
Projects During Day

Claude C. Hockley, state engineer of the federal public works administration, is in Klamath Falls today looking over proposed local projects and conferring with local officials.

He will see the site selected for the new armory and probably will confer with city officials on the city's proposed power development. Other projects may be inspected also. Lake county representatives will meet Hockley here and talk over their projects.

The engineer is on a flying trip through southern Oregon. He will be in Ashland tonight. He has visited Bend, the Columbia river and Willamette valley cities recently.

"We are making every effort to give all possible assistance to local boards in working out their plans of construction to boost employment," he told the Klamath News in an interview last night. "The big problem is to have the local boards present their requests in concrete form and get their plans in black and white so we can tell what is to be required."

He added that the Klamath county group has cooperated well in presenting its program to his office.

"We want to get all these plans worked out right away and be sure that before the snow starts flying Oregon men will be given employment," he said.

3 Killed in Plane Crash; Air Pocket Blamed for Mishap

MANGUM, Okla., Sept. 30. (UP)—Three men were killed in a plane crash late today near Cooperston, south of Mangum.

The dead: Travis Jennings, Cooperston, pilot; Burford Casner, Clearwater, Kan.; Gail Casner, Cooperston.

All were said to be in their two-engine plane, a Cessna 401. Gail Casner, a cousin of Burford Casner, died in an ambulance en route to Mangum. The others were killed instantly.

Jennings had been in Cooperston taking up passengers. Witnesses said his ship seemed to enter an air pocket at an altitude of only 300 feet. It went into a spin and struck the earth with great force.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 30. (UP)—Dams, roads, colleges, unemployment and personalities stirred up Oregon politics this week more than at any other time since the "new deal" landslide last November.

There is an interesting story being bruited around here in connection with Senator McNary's heroic rescue of the Bonneville project. It may or may not be true in all or part of its details.

About two weeks ago a bombshell was exploded when word came from somewhere in Washington—its source was never very clear—that the dam was to be only 30 feet high, with no power plant, and was to cost only \$15,000,000.

Martin on Sidelines
Congressman Martin in Washington did not seem to be able to do anything about it. A rush call was sent to Senator Charles L. McNary. He answered it and hurried to Washington.

He talked a half hour alone with President Roosevelt. Then they sent for General Martin, who was cooling his heels in a room outside and announced that Roosevelt would see to it that a high power dam would be built and \$31,000,000 would be spent on it.

Senator McNary saved the day. It will be hard for any demagogue to defeat McNary in his next election.

McNary Powerful
Now—the wagging tongues are saying that Senator McNary is the most powerful republican in the United States senate. As chairman of the republican congressional campaign committee he can even appoint the senators who will go into states in defense of those republican senators up for re-election. Thus he can line up the republican senators at the next session of congress.

Just what went on in that private chamber where "Charlie and Frank" talked over the Bonneville project is known only to them, but there are those on the street here nasty enough to say that McNary will not oppose administration legislation during the next session of congress.

Soviet Balloon Sets New Altitude Mark Of Nearly 12 Miles

MOSCOW, Sept. 30. (AP)—The great Russian balloon, "Stratos-2," landed near Kolomoia, 71 miles from here, this evening after a flight to a new world altitude record of 19,000 meters—about 11.86 miles.

A crowd of peasants, augmented later by virtually the entire population of 65,000 persons from Kolomoia, roared an enthusiastic greeting to the three scientists who made the ascension.

Greeted At Moscow.
Also there to grasp the hands of the apparently unharmed airman were several officials from Moscow who had hurried southward toward Kolomoia when the balloonists wireless their plans to land.

Escorted by the officials, the trio quickly was started back to Moscow where the populace thronged the streets in excited preparations for a boisterous welcome.

One of the three, Georgi Prokofiev, said he considered the result satisfactory in every respect.

Temperature 67 Below.
"It was a great experience," he said. "The temperature outside the gondola was 67 below, but inside it was 30 above."
