LA GRANDE KILLER GETS LIFE TERM

LA GRANDE, Ore., Sept. 30. (AP)—Louis Stevens was this morning sentenced to life imprisonment in the Oregon penitentiary after he pleaded guilty to second degree murder charges in connection with the death at Cove Sept. 8 of J. A. Allen, aged recluse. Circuit Judge J. W. Knowles passed sentence after Stevens waived preliminaries and entered his plea on direct information filed by H. E. Dixon, acting district attorney.

The sheriff's office plans to take Stevens to Salem early next week.

Allen was found dead in his lonely farm home Sept. 10 and the condition of the house indicated robbery was the motive for the killing. Later a coroner jury found that strangulation caused his death.

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Sept. 30. (AP)—Dr. Earl Bryant Perkins, assistant professor of zoology at Rutgers University, will go to Little America with Admiral Richard E. Byrd to study animal life in the field.

Dr. Perkins will go to Boston tomorrow to take quarters aboard the Jacob Ruppert. Byrd's ship, Working with Paul Siple, biologist, Dr. Perkins will conduct the first investigation of Antarctic animal life in the field, including the relationship of the animals to one another and to their environment.
