EDUCATION BOARD NAMES CONFIRMED

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 30. (AP) - Roscoe Nelson, Portland attorney, and Willard Marks, former president of the state senate, were today unanimously confirmed as members of the state board of higher education. Confirmation was by the senate interim committee on appointments, composed of five members.
Nelson succeeds C. L. Starr, former board chairman, whose resignation was submitted at the request of Governor Meier. Marks succeeds C. C. Colt, who retired voluntarily several days after Starr resigned.

Chamber Receives Ruling For Maps

The chamber of commerce office will not be permitted to continue distributing national forest reserve maps, Earl Reynolds, secretary announced Saturday.
C. J. Buck, regional forester, announced in a letter to the chamber of commerce the policy of the department was changed, permitting only one map to be given free to one office or person. Additional maps will cost 15 cents apiece and must be obtained from the department office.
Reynolds stated his office would handle applications for maps of the national forest reserves.

Churches Observe Harvest Festival

Harvest festival is being celebrated in many of the Klamath Falls churches this week-end and the auditoriums will be decorated with produce of the orchard and field. Thank offerings will also be received in these churches on Sunday.
In conjunction with the harvest ceremonies, Rally day will also be observed by several congregations.
At the Salvation Army hall the produce used for decorations for the Sunday services will be sold on Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock.

OMAHA, Sept. 30. (AP) - After an informal conference with republican leaders between trains here today, former president Hoover was quoted by one of the group as urging support of the NRA program.
"We must help the administration put it over if it's humanly possible," Gould Delta of Omaha, quoted the former president as advising the group.

National, Local Markets

BUTTER TONE STILL FIRM; EGGS STEADY

PORTLAND, Sept. 30. (AP) - Market for butter continued its steady tone here with a slightly increased demand apparent especially along the coast as a result of the low prices.
Prices were being well held in the market for eggs with fresh extras and standards in good call, especially the former. Pullets were steady.

Demand for turkeys remained far in excess of current offerings of both new and old crop fowls. Prices were therefore held firm for everything available.

Overstocked Serious
Overstocking of country killed beef was proving a serious affair here with only extremely low prices available. Leading wholesalers here continued to ask the country to withhold offerings until the surplus shows signs of clearing.

Trade in the peach market was dwindling fast and becoming more or less of nominal character and prices were inclined to show more or less dipping characteristics.

Demand for good tomatoes was keen during the weekend session of the East side farmers' wholesale market but with little change in the price list. Tops again commended up to 45-50c but the bulk of the supply lacked color and sold around 35c for good stuff.

Apples continued to show increasing supply but there was little if any change in the price.

Potatoes Easy
Hood river Bone pears were held \$1.20 for best packs.
Lettuce market was steady with continued top at \$1 for best local and northern although the bulk of the former sold 75-85c and some down to 65c crate.
Cauliflower held unchanged with 55c the general top although some is were down to 75c and 25 50c crate.

Cabbage held fairly steady at 50-55c crate with red around 75c regular crate.
Potatoes were in very liberal offering and were a trifle easy. Top was held \$1 orange box for a few but most sold down to 90c.

Oregon onions are reappearing in the market with sales mostly \$1.05 to \$1.10 central.
Peaches were easy with J. H. Hale generally 75-85c with a few higher. Some Elbertas were offered 75c.

Cantaloupes were not so good as regards quality and best Grand Island was not above \$1 while Spears were 60c and some small stuff 50c crate.

BOSTON WOOL MARKET

BOSTON, Sept. 30. (AP) - (U.S. Dept. Agr.) - Early in the week some fairly good sized sales were closed in the wool market, but later demand was not quite so keen. Some houses, however, continued to transact a fair volume of business, especially on grease to combing wool. Prices were very firm to slightly stronger, although the rising tendency was checked somewhat as the demand slackened. The market continued cheerful despite slower trade, as some letup had been expected to follow the heavy buying of the past month.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Sept. 30. (AP) - Nervous financial markets dipped and rallied spasmodically today as traders, confusedly attempted to form some conclusion as to the government's future monetary program. Stocks received support after a sharp selloff and under the leadership of metal issues, climbed back to higher territory. The close was steady to firm. Transfers approximated 900,000 shares.

Equities started out in a dull and irregular fashion. Another drive started in American Telephone and some of the leaders. The telephone issue slumped to 1 1/2, but displayed resistance with other depressed shares, and soon came back to around 120 for a net gain of about 2 1/2. U. S. Smelting spurred some 7 points. Grains were soft for a while, but they rallied along with cotton and some other commodities. Bonds were mixed. The dollar was a little easier in foreign exchange dealings.

Shares of Homestake Mining, a few sales, got up 10 points, while American Smelting, Cerro de Pasco, Dome and McIntyre Porcupine advanced 1 to 3 or more in final transactions.

Fresh reports from Washington that the administration would soon define its fiscal policies did not create any unusual market excitement owing to the fact that rumors of an announcement of this sort have been floating around brokerage and banking circles for several weeks.

GRAINS REGISTER BRISK TREND UP

CHICAGO, Sept. 30. (AP) - Week-end evening up of accounts for all classes of traders led to brisk late upturn of grain prices, today, but advances were mostly transient.

Few speculators were willing to leave any important risks open until Monday, owing to uncertainties about what unforeseen Washington developments might take place. Primary arrivals of wheat today, 553,000 bushels, attracted much notice, as being the earliest since the 1933 domestic crop started to move in volume.

Wheat closed nervous, at the same as yesterday's finish to 1c higher, corn and oats both unchanged to 1c lower, and provisions unchanged to a setback of 25 cents.
