

Trojans to Visit Klamath

Great Southern California Team Will Stop Off Here for Practice on October 20. Jones' Men Will Be En Route to Portland to Meet Oregon State. Pelicans Prepare for Corvallis Game.

Klamath Falls has been a 15-minute stop for every coast team heading north or south since the main line was built through this east-of-the-mountain country. But here is something different:

The greatest football team in the United States will stop here one hour for practice on October 20.

The greatest team, of course, is the University of Southern California. Its prominence holds over from last year, the year before and the year before that, and while it may not be the finest team in the nation when this season comes to a close, thus far its title hasn't been challenged.

Paul T. Jackson, principal of Klamath Union High school, announced Saturday the Trojans had requested the use of Modoc Field on Friday, October 20. This team, undefeated since that early season loss to St. Mary's three years ago, will be on route to Portland to meet Loni Stiner's surprisingly strong Oregon State team.

The time of the Trojans' arrival has not been set. They undoubtedly will come in on a special train appearing only in a light warmup session to lumber legs stiffened by an all night train ride.

There probably will be no festivities, but the whole of Klamath Falls, undoubtedly will be allowed to see the notables of football in action.

Southern California may be beaten before it marches against Oregon State.

The Trojans have scored two victories in opening games against minor Los Angeles teams. Last week they defeated that stubborn little southern outfit, Loyola.

Next Saturday Howard Jones will oppose Babe Hollingbery's Washington State Cougars in the south, and the result of this contest will be one of the chief determining factors in the conference title.

The Saturday before the Oregon State game, Southern California goes against St. Mary's, the last team to beat it.

If Jones can win both these difficult encounters, then his team still will be the greatest in America.

There was a high degree of satisfaction among the Klamath high school coaches following the Pelicans 27 to 0 victory over Alturas Saturday. It was surprising to observe what one week of practice could do.

The Pelicans were vastly stronger than when they nosed out little Weed here a week ago and failed to score except on breaks.

This week Les Avritt and Al Sinclair, the Klamath coaches, prepare for one of the major games of the year. Corvallis, sturdy Willamette valley team coached by "Mush" Torson, former Oregon State baseball and basketball star, makes its second appearance here. Klamath won that first intercollegiate battle last year by a 20 to 0 score.

The strength of the Corvallis team this year, and the loss of a number of Pelican stars from the 1932 team, indicates pretty definitely that the battle will be a close one.

WORLD SERIES TEAMS READY

Giants and Senators Open Fight at Polo Grounds on Tuesday.

By HERBERT W. BARKER Associated Press Sports Writer NEW YORK, Oct. 2. (AP)—The New York Giants and Washington Senators prepared for a last-minute "fire drill" today before they plunge into the blazing competition of world series combat at the Polo grounds tomorrow.

An overnight flood of New York money had forced the betting odds, favoring the Senators, down to 5 to 1 from 10 to 1, with prospects of a further shortening to even money unless stronger support developed for the American league champions.

Ticket sale drops and indication that the ticket sales for the first two games in New York, tomorrow and Wednesday, have not come up to expectations, took all the play away from the actual competitors and their pre-series practice sessions slated for the Polo grounds this afternoon.

The shift in betting odds failed to perturb Joe Cronin, youthful manager of the Washington club. Cronin believes implicitly in the ability of his well-rounded team to "take" the Giants, not in four games as the New York Yankees made a habit of doing, perhaps, but comfortably.

Hubbell Main Hope As for Bill Terry, who led the Giants to an amazing and unexpected National league pennant triumph in his first full year as John McGraw's successor, he's conceding the American leaguers not a single thing so long as Carl Hubbell's left arm is in serviceable condition.

He said a week ago that Hubbell would pitch the first game and nothing has occurred since then to make him change his mind. The great south paw pitched ten shutouts in winning 23 games this season and Terry thinks the Senators will find him just as much a puzzle as did the National league teams.

Identity of Washington's opening pitcher remained a secret. Cronin himself insists he hasn't got the slightest idea whether he'll nominate "General" Alvin Crowder, his crack right-hander, or one of his left-handers, Earl Whitehill or Wally Stewart. There's small chance now that the Senators will call on that expert mathematician, Monte Weaver, for first game duty.

Crowder May Start Some baseball critics think Cronin will send Crowder in against Hubbell, hoping to beat the Giants' ace and shatter their morale at the same time. Admittedly the Giants are placing their main reliance in their great left-hander and his defeat would leave them small hopes of winning the series.

Cronin, all season long, has made a habit of calling on the rubber-armed Crowder every time the going got a little tough and he may follow a "hunch" and toss the "General" in there tomorrow.

Another school of baseball thought inclines to the belief that young Joe and the Senators' "Old Fox," Clark Griffith, will prefer either the left-handed Whitehill or the equally left-handed Stewart on the theory that a southpaw will throttle Terry and Mel Ott, the two battering rams of the Giants' otherwise anemic attack. Both Terry and Ott hit from the "wrong" side of the plate.

Giants Scouts Deceived There's a suspicion, too, that Cronin has been taking the Giants' "bait" for a busy ride the last few days. He used all his pitching acs in last week's series with the Yankees while Terry and the rest of the National league champions sat in the stands and took notes, but there's strong evidence that Washington's scouting staff uncovered no secrets, Crowder, for instance, pitched nothing but high balls against the Yankees and took a lacing. His best pitch is a low curve, but the Giants scouts didn't see him use it.

The best guess seems to be that Cronin will start with Whitehill and follow with Crowder, Stewart and Weaver in that order.

After the first game Terry will probably call on young Hal Schumacher and then bury Fred Fitzsimmons, rich-handers both, before returning to Hubbell again. At present Terry's pitching plans involve only these three. Roy Parmelee, fast but wild, might get a whack at the American leaguers as a starting flinger but that's doubtful. He probably will be reserved for relief duty along with the ancient "Dolt" Luque and Herman Bell.

Vergez Out All the regulars of both teams except Johnny Vergez, third sacker of the Giants, will be in action. Travis Jackson, both "charley horses" tamed, will replace Vergez and round up an infield composed of Terry, Hughie Critz and John (Blondy) Ryan. In the outfield will be Ott, George Davis and Joe Moore. Gus Mancuso will catch.

The Senators' Joe Kuhel, Cronin and Orelle Rhines will take care of the inner works, with Heinie Manush, Goose Goslin and Fred Schulte in the outfield and Luke Sewell catching.

COAST LEAGUE SEASON ENDED

Angels Capture Flag and Portland Beavers in Second Place.

Six months of Pacific Coast league baseball came to a quiet end Sunday, with only the double trimming of the champion Los Angeles and the elevation of Portland to second place to enliven the final day of the 1933 season.

A 9-2 victory over San Francisco enabled Los Angeles to finish the season six and one-half games ahead of Portland, despite its double Sunday beating by the Seals, 7-5 and 2-1.

Portland Wins Three Jimmy Zinn subdued the Angel sluggers with 7 blows in the opening while his mates landed on Miller and Ballou for 12. Ballou stayed in the scrapp box and came off second best in a tight pitching tussle with Curt Davis in the nightcap. Each granted only four hits. Los Angeles won the series, 4-3.

Portland finished with a rush to win all three week-end games from Seattle, coming out ahead 3-2 Saturday and 10-4, 5-2 Sunday. The week-end cleanup gave the Beavers the series, 6-3, and sent them one game ahead of Hollywood.

Oakland Victorious Oakland concluded its season successfully with a double triumph at Sacramento, 5-1 and 4-1, after dropping the Saturday game to the Senators, 6-5. That was Sacramento's only victory in the seven-game series. Lefty Joiner limited the Solons to eight asingles in the Sunday morning game at Stockton. Wes Willie Ladd followed with five-hit tossing in the afternoon.

TROJANS MEET COUGAR ELEVEN

Coast Title at Stake in Outstanding Contest Next Saturday.

By RUSSELL J. NEWLAND Associated Press Sports Writer SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 2. (AP)—Big guns of far western football will swing into action next Saturday with some of the heaviest bombardment of the 1933 season slated for three California sectors.

Southern California's Trojans make their opening bid for a second successive coast conference championship against formidable opposition from Washington State's Cougars.

Cougars Win Two Since 1930 when Washington State charged into the top ranks by winning the conference title, the teams coached by Orin Hollingbery have been respected if not feared by the West's most successful football leader, Howard Jones of U. S. C.

Washington State's two appearances to date have resulted in one sided wins over light opposition. The Cougars defeated Whitman, 48-0, and last Saturday won from College of Puget Sound, 55-0. Neither game offered a chance to gauge the true strength of the northern defense. Southern California, however, showed real power to take a strong foe into camp last week end by beating Loyola, 18-0. The present Loyola team is considered as good as last year's squad which held U. S. C. to a 6-0 win.

While Southern California and Washington State battle in Los Angeles in the week-end's only conference encounter, Stanford and California will take on old time and worthy gridiron opponents in their respective strongholds.

Stanford opened its conference campaign last Saturday with a 3-0 win over the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins and its non-conference rival this week, Santa Clara, is expected to prove equally as formidable, if not more so. Two weeks ago, Santa Clara spanned California, 7-0, and with an open date in between, should be well prepared for Coach "Tiny" Thornhill's sophomore-manned squad. On the strength of its California victory, Santa Clara will be favored over Stanford.

Bears Meet Gaels Down in the Berkeley Bowl, California will match touchdown drives with St. Mary's Gaels in the one early season game there that annually draws upwards of 70,000 fans. Last season, St. Mary's went into the contest as favorite but California pulled out with a 12-12 tie after having been beaten two weeks earlier by Santa Clara, 12-0. The same situation obtains this year and the fighting Bears are conceded a fairly even chance despite their setback of a fortnight ago.

Oregon State will face Gonzaga in a clash expected to give fans or comparison on the relative strength of the northwest members of the conference. For Gonzaga, a non-conference team, it makes three tough ones in a row. Two weeks ago it lost to Washington, 13-0 and last Saturday to Oregon, 14-0. That makes Washington and Oregon appear somewhat "even" up. Oregon State rooters look for just as good a showing.

Idaho, beaten last week by Washington, 32-6, meets Whitman, and Montana, which lost to Oregon State, 20-0, takes on Carroll. Oregon has easy opposition in Columbia. In a Friday night game, U. C. L. A. will entertain Utah University.

Whitman Wins Opening Tilt In Conference

SEATTLE, Oct. 2. (AP)—Whitman college gained a head start on the other Northwest conference football teams Saturday when the Missionaries won a close struggle from Linfield college, 7 and 6, on their home grounds, in the first conference game of the season.

It will be three more weeks before all seven schools start the conference race. Albany and College of Puget Sound enter the campaign when they meet at Albany, Ore., next Saturday. Pacific and Willamette get under way the following week and College of Idaho swings into line Oct. 21.

Other games Saturday saw Pacific nose out Columbia of Portland 7 and 6 on the latter's field; Willamette defeat Oregon Normal at Salem, 20 to 0, and College of Puget Sound take a 56 to 0 trimming from Washington State college at Pullman.

Linfield meets Pacific Lutheran at Tacoma. Pacific tangles with La Grande at La Grande, Ore.; and Whitman clashes with the University of Idaho at Moscow, next Saturday. Willamette and College of Idaho will be idle.

Arnold so far has been the only successful hunter on the force. Those other blue-coats who wandered into the forests for deer, returned empty handed.

The successful huntsman spent nearly a week in the heart of mountain country. He did most of his hunting in the Cash Cabin region near Paisley.

One of his male deer had five points and another four. The third was a husky forked horn. Arnold said he was responsible for the largest, his wife the second largest and his son the third.

HUNTERS ENJOY BIG DAY SUNDAY

One of the biggest hunting days in Klamath history, so far as the number seeking game concerns, was ended Sunday evening at the end of the first day for quail and Chinese pheasant hunting without mishap or injury being reported to a single hunter.

In addition to the several hundred Klamathites out after the "early bird," nearly as many sportsmen were seen coming from the favored deer hunting grounds of the Bly district and Greenspring mountain.

Pheasant hunters swarmed into the farming districts south and east of the city to comb the brush land and grain fields for the gala colored birds. Few are believed to have returned with the best limit, however hunters were few who had no luck.

The pheasant supply is believed by farmers to be greatly decreased in comparison to previous years.

Few hunters reported killing any number of quail Sunday. Most successful hunting for the proud little fowl was reported from the Bonanza and Dairy districts. A few covies are still seen along the Mt. Stokel road to Merrill but the quail families have been decreased in number during the past few years.

MUSSEL POISONING REPORTED ON COAST

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Oct. 2. (AP)—New instances of mussel poisoning were reported from Port Orford and Gold Beach today, although only one fatality, that of Delos Gardner of Bandon, had resulted.

Mussels were the only shellfish tainted by the mysterious poison, and southern Oregon residents continued to enjoy all other types of seafood.

The theory gives the most credence as physicians tried to account for the poisoning, is that seasonal low tides, which leave the higher mussels exposed to the sun, are responsible.

The body of a cat which died apparently after eating mussels, was sent to the University of California medical school last night by Dr. John Simpson, city health officer. A report on the case is expected within a few days.

WM. STRIBLING BADLY INJURED

Famous Fighter Loses Foot in Sunday Accident.

MACON, Ga., Oct. 2. (AP)—William Lawrence (Young) Stribling, heavyweight boxer, his ring career ended by the amputation of his left foot as result of an automobile accident yesterday, was given a "fair" chance for his life by physicians today.

His mother and father reached his bedside early this morning. The elder Stribling, his son's manager and adviser, came from Texas and Mrs. Stribling from the Stribling plantation in south Georgia.

Mrs. W. L. Stribling, Jr., wife of the fighter, is in the same hospital convalescing following the birth of a third child, a son. Her family physician informed her of Stribling's injuries, which also included a fractured pelvis.

She was permitted to speak to him. She bore up well after they exchanged greetings.

"How's the baby?" Stribling asked.

"Fine," she replied. Mrs. Stribling was crying when she was wheeled back to her room.

Travelling 35 miles an hour yesterday on a motorcycle, the "king of the canebrake," en route to a hospital to visit his wife and their third child born two weeks ago, waved a greeting to a friend passing in an automobile. He failed to observe another car behind that of his friend, Roy Barrow.

The ring veteran who packed 300 engagements into 15 years of fighting without receiving a permanent scar, attempted to dodge the second car but was too late. The fender of the automobile struck Stribling, crushing his left leg and sending him sprawling to the pavement.

Stribling's foot was left dangling and he was brought to the hospital where where the member was amputated.

"The foot was torn off at the ankle and the bones are broken so that another operation will be made as soon as the patient is strong enough," Dr. A. R. Rozar, the surgeon, said.

Even as his recovery remained in doubt, Stribling fought off sleep, awaiting the arrival of his parents. "Pa" and "Ma" Stribling, whose names have been closely linked with his fight career.

The elder Stribling, en route from Texas, was located in Birmingham and started immediately for Macon.

In giving his version of the accident, Stribling said he was on the right side of the road when "all of a sudden a car loomed before me. I cut as far to the right as possible, and then it happened. The car hit me."

San Francisco Loses Contest To St. Mary's

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 2. (AP)—Victorious 7 to 0 over the University of San Francisco, the St. Mary's college football Gaels went back to their Moraga training field today to prepare for the California Bears.

The Gaels, who will meet the University of California eleven at Berkeley Saturday, defeated San Francisco at Kezar stadium yesterday in their first 1933 appearance.

A blocked kick in the third period put the ball in scoring position and the Gaels crashed through the line in straight power plays.
