National, Local Markets

MORE ACTIVITY OBSERVED FOR BUTTER TRADE

PORTLAND, Oct. 2 (AP) - Once again the weekly survey of the cheese market reflected general lack of price change as compared with the previous six days.

In practically all markets there was a rather quiet tone but prices were maintained generally.

Low grade stuff continued to be offered below established values but there appeared less of this than during recent weeks. Very heavy sales of cheap cheese were made during the last 10 days, passing into consumption.

Eggs unchanged
Tillamook reported a fairly steady tone generally while the manufacturer of the butter continued to appear about able to hold former values. Dullness was general.

Market was showing more activity for butter with prices somewhat steadier along the coast generally. Make locally continued to reflect a small decrease but there has recently been a big gain from outside points.

Eggs market was generally without change for the week's opening. Quality fresh goods is held at full levels. Lay continued to show a decrease within the home territory.

Quiet tone was suggested for live poultry with the exception of broilers which were quoted firm. Turkey, both alive and dressed, were in excellent call.

Frank Trade Slow
Country killed meat, market was slow but without general price changes for the week's opening. Fancy calves were about steady but there was pressure against heavy stuff. Beef was weak.

Late weather has been much aid to onion growers whose supplies were still going through the curing process. Considerable movement into the houses has been shown during the last couple of days.

Local peach trade was slow as a result of the poorer quality together with the fact that the public was getting tired of buying. Home canning was practically over and prices were therefore weaker.

Handlers of wine grapes say that current offerings were the best of the season with suitable volume of sugar. Muscats were arriving more freely and there were ample immediate stocks of Zinfandels.

Coast huckleberries were in slight increased offering with sales mostly 10c lb.

California lettuce was down again, local steady.
Beans were a trifle firmer for green stock.

Cantaloupes were steady to firm for quality; others slow.
Tomato market was generally weaker and lower.

BOSTON WOOL MARKET.

BOSTON, Oct. 2. (AP) - (U. S. Dept. Agr.) - The wool market is rather quiet but quotations are at the close of last week. Some houses are asking up to 30 cents a pound basis for short French combing 64s and finer territory wools in original bags. Some sales of these wools last week were at 77-78 cents. Estimated receipts of domestic wool here reported by the Boston grain and flour exchange during the week ending September 30 were 18,423,300 pounds compared with 1,431,300 the previous week.

GRAIN PRICES SAG AT CLOSE

CHICAGO, Oct. 2 (AP) - President Roosevelt's address in Chicago today threw no light on the administration's financial program, and grain prices sagged at the close.

Many grain traders had been inclined to look for some definite announcement from the president as to monetary affairs. Government plans to spend \$300,000,000 to purchase food, fuel and clothing for the needy fell flat as a market influence.

Wheat closed unsteady, 1/2-1/4 under Saturday's final. Corn 1 1/4-1/4 down, oats 1/4-1/4 off, and provisions varying from 35 cents decline to a rise of 17 cents.
