

Bob Elliott Strengthens SON Team

Ex-Klamath Fullback Takes Place on Hobson's Team With MacAninch. Injury Hurts Chances. Ashland Plays Pacific Saturday. Bailey and Brown Listed Even.

Bob Elliott, looking just as though he were going to step up and fulfill all those forecasts made for him when he was fullback for the Klamath Pelicans two seasons ago, considers Southern Oregon Normal school as one of the leading minor colleges entered in the football whirl. Elliott, a member of the SON squad, isn't attempting to compliment himself for a part in bringing athletic success to the normal school.

This former Klamath fullback, an intercollegiate conference all-star, has been listed only among the reserves this season. They put him on the "scrub" team when he turned out a month ago; now he is high up among the reserves and casts a hopeful eye upon the first string job.

Before this football season comes to a close he expects to make himself responsible for some Ashland victories.

Elliott had a large, personal share of misfortune this year. Howard Hobson, Ashland coach, had rather selected him for one of the top positions in the backfield for the Oregon State game but it couldn't be. He was kicked in the head in scrimmage at the start of the season and is just recovering. He was in Klamath Falls this week for medical treatment.

Elliott is one of two Klamath Falls athletes who have excelled at the normal school. The other, Louis McAninch, alternates at the regular quarterback position.

A third Klamath player, Red Hamaker, halfback, surveyed the prospects at Ashland early in the season and then moved on to the University of Oregon.

McAninch had an important part to play with Oregon State and aided Hobson's side in holding down the Beavers to two points until their third period.

Elliott is bigger, stronger and faster this year than when he finished at Klamath high school. He knows more football, admires Hobson as a coach and believes the normal school has one of the strongest teams in its own division along the Pacific coast.

A season with Hobson will prepare him as a candidate for the University of Oregon varsity next year.

Ashland enters one of its major games of the year next Saturday against Pacific university, the team coached by the well-known Alvin Cornell. Cornell coached the College of Idaho for many years and then succeeded Edon Jenne, who returned to Washington high school at Portland.

There are some familiar names on the Ashland roster. Elmer Brown, that romping halfback who played for Bend high school, failed to make his grades at Oregon last year and moved down to the normal school. This addition has given Hobson a halfback with a decidedly strong reputation and with Pacific Coast conference experience.

Another young man who is known here—Ward Howell of Ashland high school—has taken over a regular tackle position. Howell, tall, rangy and fast, is both a football and basketball star. He made the athletic life of Klamath Falls high pretty miserable while he was in prep school.

Cedric Fugitt, a quarterback from Longview, Wash., high school, has captured the first string position over McAninch and any player who can come to the front over this former Pelican field general has sufficient to recommend him for conference competition.

Bradford, a halfback from Alabama, is another of Hobson's leading backfield men.

The fight fan who can seriously predict a winner in the struggle between Elmer Brown, St. Paul's featherweight, and Ernie Bailey of Aberdeen, can be considered something of a miracle man. Bailey and Brown, two boxers distinctly at variance in style, appear about even this far from their main event bout Friday night. Brown, as indicated in his two victories over Johnny Snell of Portland, finds victory in quick rushes with the expectation of an early knockout. He can, however, box—something he has demonstrated well in his battles in the Legion ring.



BOXING KLAMATH READY FOR CORVALLIS

Pelicans Hold Slight Odds for Saturday's Grid Battle

The Klamath Pelicans, undefeated in their first two starts of the football season, stand today as slight favorites to win from Corvallis on Modoc field Saturday afternoon. This will be the first "big game" of the year after the Pelicans successfully put down threats from Weed and Alturas.

Corvallis, losing its opening game last week, will come to Klamath Falls eager to establish itself as one of the leading contenders for the state title. Although the team was beaten by Tillamook, 26 to 0, it still is considered one of the strongest in Oregon.

Pelicans Face Old Foes. A number of Pelicans will enter their second game against the Willamette valley outfit. Norman Taber, fullback and Lynn Propert, end, two men who led the attack against Corvallis last year, will be in the starting lineup.

Both Propert and Taber were largely responsible for the 26 to 0 victory in 1932.

Eugene Barrows, steady young quarterback and safety, Nello Giovanni, tackle, Homer Maxwell, guard, and Johnny Pasqua, guard, took leading parts in the brilliant triumph just a year ago.

Los Avila, head coach, will send his full strength against Corvallis. Formations not used against either Weed or Alturas will be tried against "Mush" Torson's outfit from the college city.

Paul In Victory Over Joe Ponce In Seattle Bout

SEATTLE, Oct. 4 (AP)—Three knockouts and an extra match hardly kept a handful of fans awake as they watched a six-bout boxing program here last night.

Tommy Paul, New York, former National Boxing association lightweight champion, was awarded a decision over Joey Ponce, Los Angeles Mexican in the 10-round main event, which was nearly as slow and dull as the other tilts.

Paul was willing but Ponce played safe all the way. The first bouts were so lopsided and uninteresting the management offered an extra attraction and it proved a fiasco—the referee stopping the fracas between Frenchy Boldt and Jimmy Ketchel, Seattle bantams, in the second round.

Managers and referees alike tried to coax several of the boxers to fight but the quiet atmosphere of the big civic auditorium, the new quarters of the show, appeared to affect the leather pushers.

Florida Evans, Los Angeles featherweight and Bobby Gray, Seattle, drew in eight rounds; Ford Smith, Kallispell, Mont., heavyweight, was knocked out by Harry Thomas, Los Angeles, in the second round of a six rounder; Poison Smith, Seattle seagro, knocked out John House, Portland heavyweight, in the second of a four rounder, and Rosey Montas, Portland welterweight, lasted only one round with Johnny Spencer, Seattle, in the fourth round starter.

Race Commission Issues Permits

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 4 (AP)—The state racing commission gave the Tanforan Co., Ltd., the first permit issued to operate under the pari-mutuel betting system.

The Tanforan track formerly used the option betting system. It was understood the track would hold a fall race meeting, Christopher J. Fitzgerald, formerly of Agua Caliente, was named steward of the Tanforan track. Track officials said improvements to the racing plant would be started at once.

Columbus Wins Pennant Series From Buffalo

BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 4 (AP)—The little world series championship was in the hands of the Columbus Red Birds of the American Association today as the result of their five out of eight games victory over the Buffalo Bisons of the International league.

The Birds climaxed their drive to the title last night with a 10-2 victory in a game featured by the brilliant pitching of their right hander, Jim Winford. Winford allowed only five hits and struck out 11 Bisons.

The Bisons qualified for the series by defeating Baltimore and Rochester in the playoffs of their league after barely squeaking into the fourth qualifying position.

Peter Jackson Defeats Datto In First Round

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 4 (AP)—With a steaming left to the midriff, three seconds after the opening gong, young Peter Jackson, 135, Los Angeles negro, knocked out Johnny Datto, 133, Manila Filipino, in the scheduled 10 round main event of last night's fight card here.

The punch was the only one of the contest. It caught Datto squarely in the pit of the stomach, and he dropped to the floor, his knees drawn up. Thirteen seconds after the fight started, it was over, the briefest on record here.

Apparently as surprised as the sudden finish as the fans, Wirt Ross, Jackson's manager, offered to let the negro fight anyone in the house, regardless of weight and without charge. There were no takers.

HUNTING N. Y. SOUTHPAW WINS NEW FAME

Brilliant Pitching In Opening Game Places Hubbell High

BY ALAN GOULD Associated Press Sports Editor NEW YORK, Oct. 4 (AP)—Carl Owen Hubbell today was no less the topic of the most feverish world series debate than he was before he stepped out and checked the Senators in the opening game before an unexpectedly big crowd of nearly 47,000 cash customers in the Polo Grounds.

Even the most rabid Washington rooters admitted Hubbell's greatness under fire, his courage and control in a closing series of difficult situations. Where American leaguers cling to the hope, if not the conviction that the Giants' southpaw may be less baffling on his next appearance, the National league forces now look for the lean left-hander to be the deciding factor and more effective as the battle develops.

Chill Breeze Felt "The answer is that they came up and looked Hubbell in the eye in the stretch—otherwise the eighth and ninth innings—and they couldn't pass him," gleamed Bill Terry, black-haired manager of the Giants. "The only thing wrong with Hubbell when he lost control in the eighth, was that he was not following through."

If the Senators think they have his number now, they will have a chance to find out. Hubbell will be in there for us again. Old Timers Meet Two grayheads of baseball, John Honus Wagner and John Joseph McGraw, brought to-gather memories of the rare old days as they put their arms around each other's shoulders in the corner of a room filled with Giant enthusiasts.

To McGraw, Wagner still is the greatest all-around player of all time. To John Honus, McGraw is still the shrewdest manager of them all. They were unanimous too, that Hubbell is the best pitcher to carry the National league banner into the world series since Christy Mathewson was in his prime.

Senators Come Close "They have qualities in common," suggested McGraw, referring to the man he regards as the foremost pitcher of all time and the Oklahoma southpaw who started his career under Mac. "Hubbell has Matty's coolness. He didn't become flustered when things went against him in the last two innings yesterday. He is unquestionably a very great pitcher and he gives the Giants a big advantage in a short series."

The Senators came so close to snatching victory, in spite of Hubbell, that they have lost little of their confidence in "taking the Giants."

"Hubbell's great but we will take the rest of the Giant staff and take them the next time," volunteered one of the Washington scouts. "You can't stop a team of hitters like our club very long. They simply could not produce the hits in the pinch yesterday. Why look at that ninth—three on, none out, and nobody could get the ball out of the infield! We give the credit to Hubbell but it won't happen again."

Former Klamath Pelicans will appear in both the Ashland and Oregon lineups. Louis MacAninch and Bob Elliott, ball carriers, are members of the Ashland squad, and Rex Hamaker, halfback; Bill Estes, tackle, and Chad Herry, center, have enrolled at Oregon.
