Agreement Reached In Packing Industry

ASTORIA, Oct. 4 (AP)—Agreement on 5 cents a pound for chinook and steelhead salmon; 4 cents for silverides, and 1 1/2 cents for chums was announced by salmon packers on the Columbia river yesterday.

Last year practically no chums were purchased by the canners, and the offer was only one-fourth cent a pound. The chum run is expected in the river in about two weeks.

COURT HEARS ARGUMENTS ON BUS MEASURE

SALEM, Oct. 4 (AP)—The state supreme court today heard arguments on the appeal in the bus and truck bill, known as Anderson vs. Thomas, in which the plaintiff, A. C. Anderson, representing the Oregon Truck Owners and Farmers Protective association attacked the validity of the 1933 law. The case was brought against Charles M. Thomas, public utilities commissioner, placed in charge of execution of the law.

The Marion county circuit court previously held unconstitutional some provisions of the law relating to private and contract carriers. The utilities commissioner appealed.

Attorneys for the plaintiff alleged the law discriminatory and if enforced would prevent operation on highways of 15,000 to 20,000 small trucks. A motion filed in the supreme court recently asking restraint from enforcement of the law was denied.

Plaintiff was represented by P. R. Cupper, while the defense was represented by Assistant Attorney General Willis Moore and J. M. Devers, highway attorney.

The fight relative to the truck and bus law will be carried to the state legislature during the special session. It has frequently been declared.

FORD SALES MOVE AHEAD FOR AUGUST

NEW YORK FLIER WINS AIR DERBY

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., Oct. 4 (AP)—Crossing the continent in two night flights with an elapsed time of 24 hours and 26 minutes, M. J. Chumley, New York, landed here today ahead of what was left of the starting field in the transcontinental night air race. He carried off \$1,500 first prize money.

Merle Nelson of Los Angeles flew the two legs—Los Angeles-Wichita and Wichita-New York—in 30 hours, 16 minutes for second place, with Frank Bowman, Jr., of El Paso, Tex., third with an elapsed time of 30:41.

These three were the only ones of a starting field of seven to finish. L. E. Root of Compton, Cal., was forced down at Kansas City last night with motor trouble—a difficulty that also put out Al Russell of Hollywood at Dillonvale, Ohio. E. G. Bush and Robert Buck, the other two starters, both went out on the first lap.

The "darkness derby" was run as a preliminary event to the national air pageant here Saturday and Sunday.

BOSTON, Oct. 4 (AP) (U. S. Dept. Agr.)—The bulk of a moderate demand for wool is on medium quality fleeces and territory and on the finer western grown lines. Most sales of strictly combing 56s, 1/2 blood Ohio and similar fleeces are at 40-41 cents in the grease although some wool of this grade has been sold at 42 cents. Strictly combing 48s, 50s, 1/4 blood wools of similar lines bring 40-41 cents in the grease. Strictly combing 56s, 1/2 blood territory wools bring mostly 76-78 cents scoured basis.
