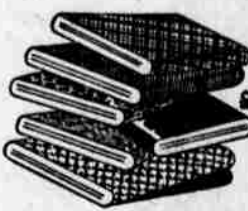

first contingent of troops, orders were issued to clear the public square of all loiterers. The town quickly assumed the appearance of a deserted village, but sharp tension prevailed. The men who had been sniping at the mine guards faded out of sight, and no arrests were made.

Constant Sniping Seen  
Indications were that the troops would remain here indefinitely. They brought full field equipment, but were quartered in Joyland dance hall. During the day they were subjected to some taunts by the disgruntled men who occasionally referred to them as "scab herders," but they made no rejoinder. For a period of approximately 15 hours the Peabody mine was beleaguered by the attackers. The guards bravely returned the rifle fire, but they were greatly outnumbered. There was no mass advance upon the workings, simply constant sniping through the night and early morning hours.

### Blaster of Elliott Home Believed In Southern City

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Klamath Falls. Further details disclosed that it was the Elliott dynamiting that was involved.

Hills has also used the names of Richard Burke and Wayne Burton. Attorney Elliott says he remembers no one using any of these names here at the time of the bombing.

The San Francisco authorities, in wiring to local officials, said that Hills was held as a suspect in a "Klamath murder case" growing out of an explosion. No one was killed in the Elliott bombing, which occurred on the night of May 10, 1926.

Elliott's office at that time was badly engaged in a great many liquor prosecutions, and the district attorney had received threatening notes.

At about midnight on May 10, a charge of dynamite exploded in the window of the bedroom in which the attorney had until recently been sleeping. A night or two before, his son Jack had begun occupying the room, and the boy was asleep in the bedroom at the time of the blast. Although the bed was completely wrecked, its occupant was unhurt except for a scratch on the forehead.
